ENGLAND AND SOUTH AFRICA

A few days ago General DeWet, a British subject of South Africa, was tried and convicted of treason. General DeWet had incited a revolution against the English crown, and for this he must serve six years in prison.

General DeWet is to be pitied in a small measure. It will be remembered that he was one of the most important of the leaders that fought for the independence of South Africa in the Boer War several years ago. General DeWet has been fighting for his country in the same manner that George Washington and our forefathers fought for the freedom of this country in 1776.

These are things that she should remember and she should also remember that General Christian DeWet was fighting for the freedom of his native country, and that the world will not give her any praise for the treatment she may accord him if brutal.
