## Edison Searchlight 3,000,000 C. P.

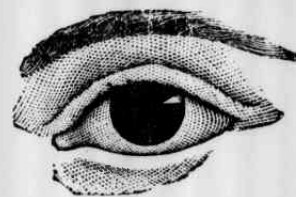

## Villa Forces Desert

El Paso, Texas, June 22.—The Carranza agency at El Paso tonight made public a message from Vera Cruz stating that Carranza troops were waiting in the suburbs of Mexico city the outcome of military operations in the South and the arrival of food supplies for the people. The Vera Cruz advice also quotes Gen. Obregon as reporting many desertions from Villa's army in the vicinity of Lago and saying, "Your (Carranza) manifesto strikes the key-note of every patriotic Mexican heart."

American arrivals here today said Carranza soldiers had wrecked the Masonic lodge at Guanajuato and were marching northward.

## Ex-Gov. Jarvis Passed Away Last Friday

His character was one of the most brilliant and pure that the world has ever seen. What has he been worth to the state? His value cannot be calculated in dollars and cents, but were his last will and testament read, he would bequeath to the young of Carolina just three things: Honor, Integrity and Truth. Today the smiling wheat fields are characteristic of the death of one who loved the cause of the people so well.

The magnificent church that bears the name of Jarvis was filled and packed to overflowing with a host of local friends of the deceased, and there were also a large number of out of town people here to be present at the last ceremony held over the state's grand old man.

The casket presented the aspect of a huge rosebud profusely littered with sweet smelling flowers that seemed to mix and pervade with the atmosphere. The silent sobbing of the bereaved family lent even more solemnity to the occasion and as the pall bearers bore the beautiful casket outside of the church to take it and its noble contents to their last resting place, sobbing was evident throughout the audience.

The funeral procession was one of the longest and most gorgeous seen here in many years. The hearse bore the noble old man out to Cherry Hill Cemetery, where he was quietly laid

to rest to await the dawning day when he may claim his reward for the noble work he has done in his long and well spent life.

His whole life has been one of inspiration to the state.
