RUSSIANS DRIVE GERMANS BACK

Von Hindenburg Says He Is Closing In Around Russian Port of Riga Now Very Rapidly.

BERLIN, OCT. 22. (Via London.)—The German advance on the Russian Baltic port of Riga, for possession of which a great battle has been under way for several weeks, has been carried forward further. The war office reported today that Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's army had occupied the bank of the Dyvina river northeast of Mitau, from Borkowitz to Borsnanche.

Russian reports of successes on the central and southern end of the line received partial confirmation in the statement. German forces on the Styre were compelled to retreat, losing a new canon.

The announcement follows: "Western theatre of war: "There were no incidents of special importance.

"Eastern theatre of war: "Army group of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg: Northeast of Mitau we occupied the bank of the Dyvina from Borkowitz to Borsnanche. The booty taken up to the present time in the engagements in this district amounts to six machine guns and 1,725 prisoners.

"Army group of Prince Leopold: East of Parnovsk, a Russian attack was repulsed by a counter-attack.

"Army group of General Von Linsingon: On the Styre, in the region of Charlorsk, local engagements developed to a great extent. Part of a German division fighting there was forced by the numerical superiority of the enemy to retreat to a position further to the rear, whereby a few canon which had been held in their positions to the last moment were lost. A counter-attack is proceeding."

VILLA ASKED TO STOP FIGHTING

Is Advised That Carranza Is The Head Of The De Facto Government.

NEW YORK, OCT. 22.—Leaders here of the Mexican conventionalist party were reported today to have notified General Villa that he must give up the fight against Carranza and come to the United States. Unless he does so, it was stated, all of his generals of prominence will quit him.

It is understood that the conventionalists in New York believe the fight for constitutional government in Mexico can best be won by a waiting policy and that they will not attempt to violate the neutrality of the United States.

Villa is now said to be considering the ultimatum and to be undecided whether to come to this country or to continue fighting the Carranza government with such men as remain with him. Manuel Chao and Raoul Madero, two of Villa's principal generals, are here.

LECTURING ADAM AND EVE

Somewhat Humorous Painting in German Church, Work of Artist of the Middle Ages.

In the Church of Saint Sebaldus at Nuremberg there is a delightful mural painting which makes one merry even to recall it. The subject is the Garden of Eden. Adam and Eve are being lectured by an elderly man in flowing robes with a long white beard. His beard alone would more than supply Adam and Eve with the covering they lack.

In as easy attitude, with neither haste nor anxiety, he is pointing out to them the error of their ways. He is as detached in manner as though he were a professor lecturing at Leipzig on the fourth dimension of space.

Adam is somewhat dejected and reclines upon the ground. Eve, unabashed, with nothing on but the apple she is munching, is evidently in a reckless mood. She looks like a child of fifteen, with her hair down her back; the defiance of her attitude is that of a naughty little girl.

The world-old problem is under discussion, but with an air of good humor and cheerfulness on the part of the lecturer, as though there were still time in the world, as though hurry were an undiscovered human attribute, as though possibly the world would still go on even if the problem were left unsolved, and this first leafy parliament adjourned sine die.—New York Telegraph.

BARRED FROM HALL OF FAME

Painters of Humorous Pictures Unjustly Treated, Is the Assertion Made by Writer.

In literature a man has every chance, if he can, to be as hilariously unbridled as Mark Twain and still take his place unchallenged on the shelf with the greatest; on the stage he may be as essentially a humorist as Joseph Jefferson, and yet go down in history with a halo around his memory; even in the uncorporeal sphere of music he may be as light and bizarre and impish as fancy will permit, without in any way jeopardizing his artistic dignity.

But let him attempt any such gale-hearted display in terms of paint and the most perfidious Futurists hang their heads with equal visor in his face, writes Louis Henry in the Bookman. Which in this day, when there is more talk than ever before of the development of a really national art, seems just a trifle rash.

That a brilliant spirit that without mission or message or school craves only the privilege of making holiday with facts and politics impartially with their own gay, inimitable, irreverent content every head that holds up in the carnival of civilization seems too thoroughly American to be consigned always to the lighter, more ephemeral pictorial avenues.

Value of Mother's Stories.

Sarah Louise Arnold says: "Life shows us that the stories which are heard at the mother's knee are an essential part of our heritage. The child who is deprived of this possession will always miss the charm of literature, the joy of poetry, the swift imagination which enables us to share in that which is foreign to our intimate experience. Except as this appreciation is assured, in childhood, it is never won."

Aside from the literary and artistic value of stories there is no greater force than they for the preservation of the purity of a child. Fill his mind with their rich imagery, their stirring deeds, their ideals—set his fancy roving about the mysteries of nature, let him follow the adventures of great heroes, and there will be little room left in his life for sordid or evil things.

The best way to banish darkness is to let in the light. To tell stories to your children is your duty and your privilege.

Cosmopolitan Nation.

The Roumanian is a lover of the mountains and the woods. It is, indeed, to the peaks and forests of the Carpathians that he owes his national existence.

Isolated in them, the Roumanian has clung more tenaciously to the ways and customs of his ancestors than any of the Latin races, and it is said that today his language contains more pure Latin words than the Italian. He is a composite nationality, however. About twenty towns and villages of Roumania have been positively identified by archeologists as of Roman origin, but there were Dacians in the land before the Romans and other racial stocks have left their mark on the language and character of the people.

Exercise and Health.

Take exercise. Take daily exercise. Have a hobby that gets you out of doors. Walk to your business, to your dressmaker's, walk for the sake of walking. Join a walking club and keep your weekly score of miles. Keep chickens, make a garden, wheel the baby or play golf or any other game, but take two hours outdoor exercise every day. Gymnasium work is good for those who like it and can afford it, but avoid heavy athletics. Don't try to be a "strong man," the champion athlete often dies young. Be a moderate, persistent, daily exponent of exercise. You may not burn the family carriage, as Benjamin suggested, but at least, as he advised, walk, walk, walk.
