 Treason, Treachery and Spoils are triumphant. The Democracy of North Carolina has done its duty. Since the moment it overthrew Republicanism and led the people out of Radical bondage to the present time, it has been the steadfast defender of right, justice and liberty. Why then has it fallen? Treason and Treachery entered its camp, and marshaling all of their forces under the Moloch of Hate, marched under the banner of Spoils to the accomplishment of their hellish purpose.
 The contest is not ended. The treason of Arnold could not hinder the independence of America; the treachery of Judas could not prevent the establishment of the Kingdom of Christ. The progress of Democracy has been retarded. It has passed through a fiery ordeal. The dross has been consumed, and the true gold will shine all the brighter. There will no longer be any question as to who is a Democrat. The false pretenders have gone to the Republican party where they belong and are welcome to the companionship for which their natures fit them.
 The earthquake, the cyclone, the arrival of the powers of darkness, has inflicted incalculable injury upon Democracy, material progress and social order; but it has utterly destroyed popularism in this country. The Republican forces have been swelled into a mighty host, but the populists have been whittled down to the little end of nothing. The People's Party, falsely so called, have lost Kansas, and Jerry Simpson and the rest of them are in the long list of the defeated. They have lost Colorado, and the bright star of Pence has gone out in utter darkness. And where is Waite, who wanted to ride in blood up to his horse's side "Governor Waite and his followers are buried under an astonishing big landslide." The verdict of the late

election is "Exit the Populist Party."
 What more! It will not do for the Republicans to stretch the meaning of the election too far. It cannot be made to stretch to 1896. The Presidential election of that year will not be affected in the slightest degree by that of this, except in so far as this year's popular rebuke will tend to strengthen and solidify the party in New York. A thrashing does a party good sometimes, and it is likely to help the party in New York. New York's position as a Democratic State, on distinctly Democratic issues, is not affected. As far North Carolina, she is as sure to return to Democracy as the sun-shine. The Republican party was four years ago the victim of such a landslide as that which the Democrats have just experienced. The causes which have given the Republican victory will just as certainly cause their defeat in 1896. Hard times will continue. The Republican party has always been the party of contraction and National banks. It will not change its policy. The Populists have assisted it to power, but they are no longer needed and will be treated as a useless incumbrance to be rejected and thrown away.
 In the next contest the Democratic and Republican parties will meet on their own merits. In such a contest we have no fear of the result.
