MARKING OF BATTLE SITES.

North Carolina, Not Louisiana, Leads in Cooperating With U. S. Comm in Determining the Post tion of Confederate Troops.

The statement has been pretty extenely that the recent co-operation of the Louisiana commissioners with the United States Commissioners in marking the posinon of Confederate troops in the battle of Gertysburg was the first instance of any Southern State joining with the General Government in locating the position of troops in any battle of the late war. So far from this being the case the

State of North Carolina co-operated with the United States commissioners over a year ago in locating the position of the North Carolina troops on the battle-field of Chickamauga
The report of this commission to the Governor by the Hon. Clinton A. Cilley,

Secretary of the N. C. commission was published in full in the News and Obserer of Nov. 26 1893, the commissi having met and organized on the battlefield in the October previous. A similar commission was appointed by the Governor to locate the positions on the battle-field of Sharpsburg in May, 1894. Their report is published in full in the Wilmington Messenger of Sept.

23rd, 1894, and a supplementary report with a diagram of the battlefield is also published in the Messenger of Oct. 7th 1894, Another commission had previously reported the position of some of our troops on the coattlefield of Gettysburg. The names of this commission we have not at hand butgamong them were Col. S. McD. Tate and Col. Thos, S. Kenan, It will thus be seen that in three instances, at least the action of the State of North Carolina had preceded that of Louisiana, and we hope our State papers will make the cor-


