SPORTSMAN'S PARADISE.

With the Arrival of Cold Weather, the Hunting Season Ilas Opened.

Greater Variety and Quantity than in Eastern Carolina-Land Game Ten Thousand Ducks Killed in One Day-Investigate at the East Care lina Fair.

A special Elizabeth City correspondent of the Raleigh News and Observet, J. W. Albertson, Jr., writing under date of Nov. 19, gives the following write-up of game in the sounds of North Carolina and in counties bordering upon the sounds:

"With the cold weather has come if sportsmen with re-avimated zest for the pursuit of game.
