SHALL WE HAVE WAR?
Are we to have war with England? This is a serious question. War is always a calamity, but it is often resorted to in order to prevent a greater evil. Are we in condition to successfully cope with England? If we are not, it would be just now our part to attempt it.
Just now our navy is being severely criticised. Many of the criticisms are unjust. But, supposing that our navy will be all that could be desired when completed, it will be months, and in some cases years, before the vessels under contract will be ready for service.

Of the four first-class battle-ships, the Indiana, Massachusetts and Oregon are approaching completion, and will be ready for the acceptance of the Government within the coming year. Work on the Iowa is progressing satisfactorily and that vessel will be completed during the latter part of 1896.
Of the second-class battleships, the Texas and Maine, the former is practically ready for the machinery trial, and in a few months after the trial will be ready to be commissioned. The Maine, which is under construction at the Brooklyn navy yard, will be prepared for commission by the last of June 1895.

Of the two armored cruisers, the Brooklyn will be completed early in 1896, and the New York, already completed, is the flagship of the North Atlantic Station.
We have a number of fast-sailing cruisers afloat, but none of them are at all comparable to the battleships of Great Britain, with the single exception of the New York.
It will be seen, at a glance that our navy is in no condition to meet the British navy. But if our vessels were all ready the question of manning them would be a serious one. We have no skilled seamen; these are as essential for actual war as ships and guns.
Our tars are brave, and our ships would be fought as long as there was a plank afloat, but it is evident that we are not ready for the combat.

What then is to be done? Why, the Secretary of State must make his masterful diplomacy successful. Mr. Gresham must vindicate the wisdom of President Cleveland in going out of the Democratic party to find the leader of his cabinet. He must hold back the dogs of war; and, when war becomes inevitable, he must be able to show the justice of our cause.
Whenever affairs on this continent become complicated with European problems there is much to say about the Monroe Doctrine. Mr. Gresham must be able to show conclusively that President Monroe was right, and that President Cleveland is bound by the Monroe declaration.

What is the Monroe Doctrine? At the risk of making this article too long, we here incorporate a part of President Monroe's Message of Dec. 2, 1823, as follows:
"The citizens of the United States cherish sentiments the most friendly in favor of the liberty and happiness of their fellow-men on the other side of the Atlantic. In wars of European powers, in matters relating to themselves, we have never taken any part, nor does it comport with our policy to do so. It is only when our rights are invaded, or seriously menaced, that we resort to arms or make preparation

for our arms. The political system of the allied powers is essentially different in this respect from that of America. The difference proceeds from the fact that which exists in our respective governments; and to the defense of our own, which has been bloodied by the loss of so much blood and treasure, and matured by the wisdom of our most enlightened citizens and under which we have enjoyed unexampled felicity, this whole nation is devoted. We owe it, therefore, to candor and the amicable relations existing between the United States and those powers to declare that we should consider any attempt on their part to extend their system to any portion of this hemisphere as dangerous to our peace and safety. With the existing colonies or dependencies of any European power we have not interfered; but with the governments which have declared their independence, and maintained it, and whose independence we have, on consideration and on just principles, acknowledged, we could not view any interposition for the purpose of oppressing them, or controlling in any other manner their destiny, by any European power, in other light than as the manifestation of an unfriendly disposition toward the United States.

"Our policy in regard to Europe, which was adopted at an early stage of the war, which have so long agitated that quarter of the globe, nevertheless remains the same, which is not to interfere in the internal concerns of any of its powers; to consider the government de facto as the legitimate government for us; to cultivate friendly relations with it, and to preserve those relations by a frank, firm and manly policy; meeting in all instances, the just claims of every power, submitting to injuries from none. But in regard to these continents (North and South America) circumstances are eminently and conspicuously different. It is impossible that the allied powers should extend their political system to any part of either continent without endangering our peace and happiness."

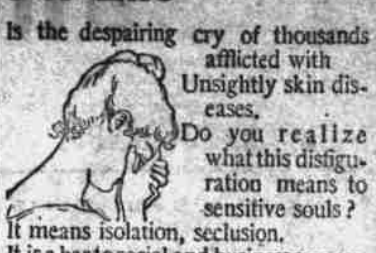

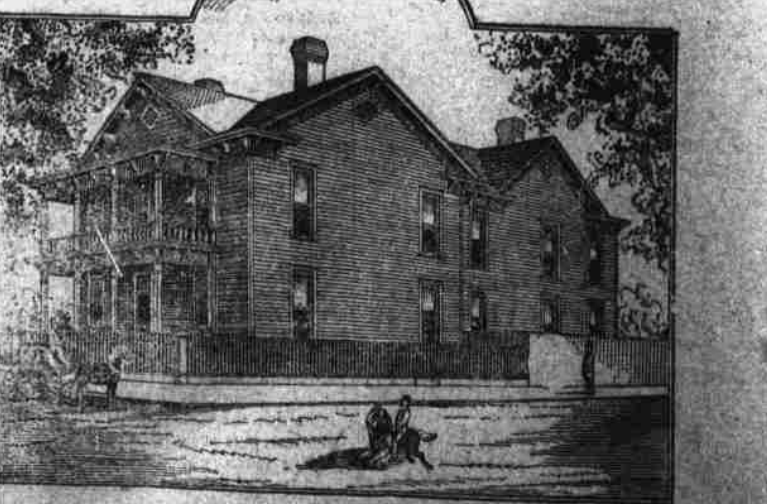
