**THE COLORED MASONIC LODGE.**

Quarto Centennial—Addresses—Parade—Adjournment.

Wednesday, Dec. 12, 1894.

EDITOR JOURNAL.—The most wonderful Grand Lodge reassembled at 7 p. m. and turned a procession and marched to the court house where the Quarto Centennial of the formation of the Grand Lodge was celebrated. The exercises were introduced by music: "Hail Mysterious Masonry," by the entire audience.

Grand Master Geo. H. White then announced the order of the evening, led by a select choir under the direction of B. S. Stevens and W. J. Heritage, which was superb during the evening. First Speaker, P. G. M. Jas. Walker Hood, who gave a success history of the Grand Lodge of colored masons in North Carolina. "The Moral Qualifications of a Mason," by Rev. J. J. Worlds. The speaker in beautiful language portrayed the true moral qualifications of a mason. "Our Masonic Dead," by Rev. W. J. Moore, who spoke feelingly and reverently of the sacred dead.

"An Ideal Worshipful Master," by Prof. J. B. Dudley. The speaker gave a beautiful denunciation of an Ideal Worshipful Master. The climax was reached when Hon. Geo. H. White, M. W. G. M. of the State, rose and delivered in a forcible manner an address, "Masonry Among Colored Men." The speaker electrified his auditors who punctuated the address at every point with applause. That he charmed and pleased his audience he need doubt. The personnel and splendid appearance of the order was all that could be wished.

The large audience which witnessed the exercises, showed its appreciation by close attention. Though G. M. White was pretty severe on white masons, they took it in good humor. The citizens of the city without regard to race, showed a generous and kindly spirit to the visiting masons.

Resolutions of thanks to A. Cohn Organ, Piano and Music Co., of New Berne, the custodians of the court house, and the citizens generally were passed for their generous hospitality.

The order reformed its procession and returned to its hall and took a recess until Thursday at 9:30 a. m.

Thursday, Dec. 13th, 1894.

The Grand Lodge convened at 9:30 a. m. Minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Charlotte, N. C., was chosen as the next place of meeting.

Officers for the ensuing masonic year were then elected as follows:  
G. M., Geo. H. White; S. G. W., Elijah Lane; J. G. W., R. E. Clemmons; Grand Treasurer, Jas. H. Young; Grand Secretary, B. S. Stevens; Grand Tyler, W. M. Pethel. The Grand M., after making the necessary appointments, the officers were then installed by P. G. M. Jas. W. Hood.

At 6 o'clock a Post-master's Lodge was opened and the degree conferred on new W. M's.

**PARADE.**

At 12:30 p. m., a procession was formed headed by the Star band of this city and marched through the principal streets, thence to St. Peter's A. M. E. Zion church, where an oration was delivered by Rev. J. N. Perry of Tarboro, and a paper of Dr. E. E. Smith, "Why I am a Mason," by Prof. J. B. Dudley, which sh. uld have been read at the court house Wednesday night. The choir rendered some fine music. \$30. was taken up for Oxford Asylum. The procession then returned to the Lodge room.

The most important matter which occupied the Grand Lodge was the establishment of a Masonic Benefit Association. The session closed last night at a late hour to meet in the city of Charlotte the second Tuesday in December, 1895.

A vote of thanks was tendered THE JOURNAL, a daily newspaper of the city, for kindly publishing a synopsis of the Grand Lodge.

All the visiting Masons seemed delighted with the city and its people. Most of them leave this a. m. for their homes.

### THE IMMIGRATION MEETING.

Strong Sentiment in Favor Thereof.

Several Addresses—Invitation Extended to the President and General Agent of the International Company.

About fifty people, representative of the business and professional population of the city assembled at the City Hall pursuant to the call of Mayor Ellis to consider the Immigration movement by the International Colonization Company.

Mayor Ellis introduced Mrs. Beard who briefly stated the object of the meeting, the work proposed to be done by the International Colonization Company and the point to which the work has now advanced.

She stated that the company now has 3,000 families ready to commence moving; of the better class of agriculturists, men who would not come to sea for work but to buy lands and make homes.

She stated these intended immigrants have asked to be placed in Eastern Virginia. This was the way the most understood and it remained for the people here to say if they wanted them. She stated an additional and a prominent object of her work here was to secure the making of Morehead the port of entry, the receiving and distributing point for all who come. Those coming did not wish to go farther south than Wilmington nor to the bleak north.

Mrs. Beard spoke very highly of the character of intended immigrants, as hardy, northern and sturdy, industrious, Christian people.

Mr. J. W. Waters, who three years ago met and became strongly impressed in favor of Mr. Ellis and his work, spoke warmly in behalf of the scheme, saying that it would have cost our people great sums of money to attain to the point already reached and offered by this company. He said it was proposed to settle three or four hundred families of them here. It seems the intention is to place a number which can be easily accommodated and assimilated in several localities.

Mr. Jas. A. Bryan followed and spoke along the line, not only of the immigration, but the establishment of factories, our adaptability to them and the benefits that would accrue. He concluded by making a motion that Mayor Ellis be requested by the citizens to cordially invite Emil Lindburg, the General Agent of the company and his associate, Mr. D. T. Turner, the President to visit here and see for themselves what we have to offer and to obtain a direct interchange of ideas with our people. The motion was carried unanimously as was also a motion by Mr. H. B. Duffy that Mayor Ellis appoint a reception committee, with the Mayor as chairman to meet and entertain the visitors when they come.

Mr. Chas. Halleck being present was called upon and gave experiences of such settlers which had come and his observations. He presented what were his views upon both sides of the question. He spoke of the disadvantages and to some extent undesirability of placing large bodies of people who could not speak a word of English in any community, but he said such as these, etc., do make good people, they were somewhat disposed to be clamish but would disintegrate as it became to their interest to do so. He said the Governor of Minnesota was a Swede and many other others were held there.

The meeting passed off very pleasantly and we await with interest the development of the next move.

### THE NAVAL RESERVES.

Order of the County Commissioners Appropriating \$25,000 per Month Towards the Maintenance of the Company.

Ordered, That the New Berne Naval Reserves be and said organization is hereby allowed the sum of \$25,000, per month, and said sum is hereby appropriated from the general county fund for the maintenance of said military company the same being deemed for the benefit of the county of Craven; the said sum to be paid in utility to the commanding officer of said Naval Reserves, and for a period of two years beginning on the 1st Monday of December, 1894, and ending on the 1st Monday of November, 1896, upon his account duly verified and audited to be by him turned over to said Naval Reserves for said purpose. Provided the said military company shall comply with the requirements of the law, in the matter of organization, equipment, uniform, number, discipline and all the requirements of the law and regulations of the State or United States governing active militia, or State Guard or North Carolina.

And, provided further said military company shall hold themselves in readiness to serve the county of Craven; or its civil authorities, or the municipal authorities of the city of New Berne, without charge to said Craven County for such services, whenever and wherever under the provisions of the laws, it shall be necessary to call said Naval Reserves into actual service in enforcing the writs of the courts or in aid of the civil authority or otherwise, or in case of insurrection, riot, invasion, guarding jails, or other emergencies requiring the services of a United States military Company.

And provided further, that the said Naval Reserves, release and abandon, and this order is made with the understanding that the said Naval Reserves release and abandon, any further claims against the said county of Craven for compensation on account of services heretofore alleged to have been rendered said county.

And, it is further understood that in the event of a failure of said Naval Reserves, to comply with the foregoing provisions and conditions or any one of the same that said appropriation shall ipse facto cease and determine without further order of the Board relative thereto.
