## BIKCYCLING EXTRAORDINARY.

Feats of Balancing, &c., That Appear Almost Impossible.

Prof. Harry Kramer of Washington, D. C., "astonished the natives" W. T. Hill, the bicycle man included with feats on his wheel at the corner of South Front and Middle streets. He would ride forward, backward, stand upright on the bicycle, stand on his head on it and most astonishing of all take off the hind wheel and ride with only the front balancing himself perfectly and even riding backward and riding in circles in that position. Mr. Hill says he has witnessed exhibitions by some of the noted wheelmen but Prof. Kramer beats all he ever came across.

Prof. Kramer is only nineteen years old and has been riding but two years. This makes his skill all the more wonderful. He uses the Columbia or any, the old high bicycle with one large and one little wheel and says he will use no other. He informs us that he has ridden down the capital steps three times with the wheel in his hand and he also rode a mile in three minutes with it. He has some thought of giving exhibitions of his skill here and possibly of being here at the Fair. He is now on his way to Florida.

### CORN CROP OF THE STATE.

Eastern Counties' Surplus the Cause of their being Called the Granary of North Carolina.

Our neighbor, the Wilmington Messenger, in an article on the corn crop of the State, mentions that there are a number of counties in the State that produce much larger quantities of corn than Hyde and others of the eastern counties, remarkable for their large production of that grain.

This is true, but there are no counties, probably that have so large a surplus for sale and export. Most of the counties consume at home all, or nearly all, of their large crops, and some of them even have to supplement their crops by purchase.

It is not the quantity of an article made by any community that gives it prominence in that line, but the amount of surplus, after supplying home wants, that it has to dispose of elsewhere. This proportion in the case of Hyde, Currituck, Tyrrell and other eastern counties is very large, and it is that, that has won for them the name of the "Granary of North Carolina."

### REV. L. W. CRAWFORD, D. D.

By Request he is Again Assigned to Pastoral Work Instead of Educational.

Friends of Rev. L. W. Crawford all over the State who love and admire him, like to know of the work in which he is engaged. We copy the following from the Greensboro Record:

Rev. L. W. Crawford, who was four years ago elected Professor of Practical and Systematic Theology in Trinity College, and who has for two years acted also as financial secretary of the college, was, at the recent session of the Western North Carolina Conference at Statesville, elected by the Educational Board, Secretary of Education for the conference, but declined that position and requested the presiding bishop to assign him to a pastoral charge.

Prof. Crawford, previous to his connection with Trinity College, was a regular pastor. For twenty-two years he was in regular work and during that time served only five congregations, remaining the full limit of the law at Hillsboro, Salisbury, Fayetteville, Greensboro and New Berne, and was filling out a second pastorate at this place when chosen a professor. He is now assigned to Redville station. That congregation consists of 450 members, have just completed a fifteen thousand dollar church and is a pleasant people.

Fire destroyed the gin house, engine, 4,000 bushels of cotton seed, press and about 50 cords of wood, belonging to Mr. Noah Rowe, two and a half miles from Grange Monday night. The loss is estimated at \$2,000; with \$600 insurance. The actual insurance recoverable, however, was \$425, as \$175.00 was on lint and seed cotton, and there was none lost.

## CRABBING INDUSTRY.

Pickett & Co., of Norfolk, to Operate at Morehead—The Headquarters of Their Branch House to be in New Berne—A. J. Phipps, Manager.

Mr. A. J. Phipps, connected with Messrs. Pickett & Co., fish shippers of Norfolk, who has been down to Morehead City yesterday, prospecting for crabs, was in the city yesterday. He was en route to Norfolk. He is perfectly satisfied with the results of his visit. He reports millions of crabs in the sound and that they can easily be caught.

In Lynnhaven Bay at the present time a barrel of crabs a day is as much as can be caught by one man, but Mr. Phipps informs us that in the test he made at Morehead one man caught four barrels full in five hours, or at the rate of eight barrels per day of ten hours.

The method employed is as follows: A line 450 feet in length was stretched between two stakes in the sound. This long line had 300 short ones with bait on each one at intervals of every eighteen inches. This being stretched a boat with one man in it at once commences going back and forth, the occupant pulling along by the line and taking in the crabs with a scoop net whenever one is seen.

The first time this line was passed along, 69 crabs were taken, 19 the next time and 1 from 30 to 40 each time afterwards during the five hours in which the four barrels were caught.

Mr. Phipps considers the Morehead waters the best crabbing place on the coast. He is satisfied that five barrels per day or thirty barrels per week can be relied upon as an average catch now per hand at which rats good money can be made by the crabbers.

The crabbing at this season however has to be done a few miles from Morehead in a portion of the sound where the bottom is muddy—it is sandy directly around Morehead. In the summer time the crabs can be taken anywhere in abundance.

The crabs will not be shipped whole—a packing house will be established and that work done there.

Mr. Phipps, who spent several months here this spring will return the first of January to have charge of the firm's branch business at New Berne and Morehead and will establish himself in New Berne as a buyer.

### NEWS IN BRIEF.

There is a rumor that the Seaboard Air Line has become the property of the Southern Railroad.

An unknown colored man at Asheville forged the name of County Treasurer Courtney to a check and tried to cash it at Battery Park Bank. The forgery was discovered but the man escaped.

Mrs. Nellie Jefferson, who died in New York on Monday, at the alleged age of one hundred and nine years, claimed to have been a servant in the family of President Jefferson at Charlottesville.

Future articles of agreement between prize fighters should include a clause providing for the coroner's fee.

Arguments were heard on the afternoon of the 18th, last, in the case of Carnegie against the Richmond and Danville company for \$125,000 for steel rails furnished. The court reserved its decision.

The Tillmanites in the South Carolina legislature set a precedent that is unlikely to be extensively followed, when they reduced their own salaries.

It is a law that will not apply to all. Now that Judge Woods has sentenced Eugene Debs to six months imprisonment under the Sherman anti-trust law that law might be tried on the trusts, for which it was supposed to have been made.

Senator Daniel has been asked what he thought the prospect was for the passage of the Nicaragua canal bill. He said he thought it would pass, and he would support the measure. He had no information however, as to when the vote was likely to be taken, but doubted if it could be reached before the holidays. From what he had been told by members of the House, he said, he took it for granted that the bill would be favorably acted on in that body.
