To Determine if Vaccination Will Give Safety from Texas Fever-How it Stands Now.

Dr. C. F. Dawson, of the United States Department · f Agriculture, after spending a couple of days in the city at Mr. R. P. Williams' in the interest of the Governing to Washington City.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, 18th and 19th inst., Dr. Dawson had the seven cows, all that were left alive of the thirteen the government had been experimen ting with killed and portions of the heart, lung, etc., of each were saved for examination.
