These replies show only one case of the measles in the whole city and there are oly nine cases of scarlet fever and four of in so are in one house, leaving only five

To make sure that there were no cases thich were not under a physician's care, he Fourth and Fifth wards, the two larest in the city, were carefully canvassed from house to house, and only one case of sickness found in both wards. With such showing as this the people can rest sat-fiel, what little trouble there is will no lount soon be entirely over.
