### A SERIOUS ACCIDENT.

**Mr. Charlie Scott Badly Crisples His Right Hand and Receives a Painful Neck Wound by the Accidental Discharge of His Gun.**

Mr. Charlie Scott the sixteen year old son of Mr. Solomon H. Scott met with a very serious accident yesterday. While out after birds with companions about his own age, his gun was accidentally discharged while he was getting over a wall near the upper part of the macadamized road.

His right hand was badly injured, by the discharge, the first joints of the three finger fingers being blown off and the little finger and thumb injured. He was also wounded in the throat by one of the shot.

It lacked but a hair's breadth of being a fatal accident.

Capt. Hyde, keeper of the National Cemetery sent the young man down to the city in his buggy, and Drs. Frank Duffard and Frank Hughes carefully dressed the wounds.

Mr. Scott is a serious and promising youth and he and his family have the sympathy of a wide circle of friends in this town.

### LYNCHED BY A MOB AT IDALIA.

**J. F. Bergeron, Murderer of J. H. Watson, Hung and His Body Riddled With Bullets.**

**Indignant Citizens Take Revenge for the Foul Murder Committed on Christmas Eve—A Disgraced but Determined Body of Men do the Work.**

On Monday evening Dec. 21st, a terrible murder was committed at Idalia, Beaufort county, twenty-five miles from New Berne and on Wednesday night a masked mob of seventy-five armed men, headed by James H. Watson, a 45 year old and esteemed citizen; his slayer was J. F. Bergeron.

The circumstances of the crime are as follows: Bergeron, who was from six miles from Aurora on the 19th inst. Bergeron farm, came to Idalia on Christmas eve drinking, and with general acquaintances threatened the life of R. H. Thompson of that place, and other gentlemen, his weapons taken from him and he required to give a \$400 bond to keep the peace.

At his request, Mr. Watson, the constable, attended to Bergeron's home, his brother-in-law Hung, Ross, and other men were in one buggy, Bergeron and a colored man were in another. Bergeron, who was sobering up had been given back his weapons and it seems he had some cartridges in his pocket.

On the Bergeron road, half a mile from any house, Bergeron, who was better than any other, stopped, got out and came back with a bottle of liquor, and wanted Watson and Hamilton to drink with him. Watson declined. Then Bergeron went back to the buggy, got his gun, went to Watson and demanded the warrant. Watson refused to give it up, but on a second night with a threat to kill him, Watson took it out of his pocket, and was in the act of handing it to him when Bergeron shot him in the breast. Watson fell out of the buggy and shot him twice on the ground, killing him instantly. Tom Watson, the colored man who was with Mr. Watson and Mr. Thompson, who was with the same men, testified to these facts of the killing.

After the murder had been committed Bergeron went home and was arrested there the next morning (Christmas).

The examination was held before Justices Mayo and Littlefield and he was placed in R. H. Thompson's jail and a guard of four men he could remain in jail at Washington which was to have been done on Thursday by steamer.

### WILMINGTON MINSTRELS.

**Perform to a Large and Appreciative New Berne Audience on Christmas Night.**

The Wilmington Minstrel Troupe, consisting of about thirty of Wilmington's clever young men, arrived on the 12 o'clock train of the W. N. & N. road Tuesday, (Christmas day). A number of the New Berne boys met them at the depot and escorted them to Hotel Albert where, after about five minutes' recess, they assembled by large call for the street parade.

**THE PLAY AT NIGHT.**  
Considering the several engagements at the different churches etc., they had a very good house—most of the seats on the lower floor being filled. The stage setting was very pretty, and Mr. Robert W. Vincent took his part as interlocutor most ably.

The first part opened with chorus, "A Christmas Carol," and consisted of solos and duets by the end men, all receiving loud applause.

The second part opened with a one-act farce entitled "Who Stole the Ham?" by Messrs. Cronin and Marshall.

The correct solo by Mr. Holt, Westcott was very highly rendered, and being called back, he gave the audience the usual bugle call. He was cheered lively.

Mr. Henry Newman, the comedian entertained the audience for about ten minutes with humorous songs, recitations, etc. Mr. Newman is one of the finest and best comedians ever on the New Berne stage. The troupe should feel proud of him.

Mr. Henry Angel was good, both on the stage and in his impersonation of the auto-stellum darkey. His singing was one of the features of the show, he having thoroughly mastered the negro dialect. Mr. Johnson Graham, with Mr. Angel, we think needs mention for his very clever and work—famously known as "Coxey,"—he was ind of a veritable "Coxey," in black lace.

Messrs. John Marshall and Henry Howard made very clever hit as "Parson do-on and Parson Jones"—a clever pair.

The tableau, "The soldier's dream," was one of the most beautiful specialties that we have ever seen from either amateur or professional, and this feature reflects great credit upon Esigro Morrison of the Wilmington Division who originated and perfected it for the minstrels.

Messrs. Marshall and Cronin, youngsters in their teens, gave a tumbling performance that was remarkably good—so fine as we ever saw by amateurs, old or young.

The closing feature, "The Darky's Dream," was indeed most comical and carried the audience away from their seats of the performance.

**THE BANQUET.**  
After the performance the minstrels were tendered a "Light" Banquet by the New Berne Reserves, at the old New Berne engine house. The room was handsomely decorated for the occasion, and most all the visiting young men participated.

Several toasts were made. Lieut. Commander Winslow being among the respondents.

The young men left on the 9 o'clock train Wednesday morning for their home. They all seemed to enjoy their Christmas in our city, and they will remember that Wilmington is always welcome here.
