The whole surface of his skin was unpleasantly chilled: and the coldness running up and down his spinal column and radiating over the body and extremities. He then began to take in deep foreed inspirations, holding the air as long as possible before expulsion.

After a few inhalations the surface of his body grew warmer, with a general sense of comfort. The warmth extended to his ears. They new agreeably warm, and in a came warm and he soon became as comfortable as if he had been before a glowing fire.

These happy results obtained from this simple method are probably owing to several causes.

The cold chills the surface of the body and contracts the superficial blood vessels, usuall, affecting first-hands, feet and ears, and afterward thy general body surface. Contraction of the blood vessels results in less blood and stagnation of its current, thus rendering tissues less able to resist cold. Deep inspirations stimulate the blood correct and by expanding and compressing the lungs hasten the flow of blood through this organ and by the increased oxygen in-haled, the blood is thoroughly ox-ygenated and more heat necessarily produced.

The suggestion is valuable in counteracting the effects of cold, in riding, driving, standing etc., in stimulating the flagging circula tion without moving a step. It may arrest fatal congestive trou-bles, such as pleurisies and pneu-monias.



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

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
