LOST IN A SNOW STORM.

Two Young Ladies Likely to Die from Exposure to Cold.

SHELBYVILLE, IND., December 28.—Yesterday evening William Leavitt, accompanied by Minnie Maple and Susie Mitchell, started from their homes, four miles south of Shelbyville, to attend a party, ten miles distant. After the party they started home, but in the storm that was raging, Leavitt, who was unacquainted with the roads, missed his way and got lost.

This morning at 2 o'clock County Commissioner Henry Ortman, who lives in the southern part of the county, was awakened. Going to the door he met Leavitt, who was so cold he could hardly explain what was the matter. Finally Ortman was made to understand and they went out to Leavitt's buggy. Both the young ladies were unable to speak, and unconscious. They were carried to the house and everything done to restore them to consciousness, but up to ten o'clock this morning all efforts had proved futile. Should they regain consciousness amputation of their limbs will be necessary. All belong to prominent families.

An Easy Mode of Keeping Warm.

The Scientific American calls attention to an easy method of keeping warm when other and more common means are not available. It is well known to the medical profession but probably not often used. It is simply taking deep inspirations.

It mentions the case that occurred to the writer last winter when, walking briskly along, he became uncomfortably cold; feet and hands very cold, and his ears so that he had frequently to apply his heavily gloved hands. The whole surface of his skin was unpleasantly chilled; and the coldness running up and down his spinal column and radiating over the body and extremities. He then began to take in deep forced inspirations, holding the air as long as possible before expiration.

After a few inhalations the surface of his body grew warmer, with a general sense of comfort. The warmth extended to his ears. They grew agreeably warm, and in a short time his hands and feet became warm and he soon became as comfortable as if he had been before a glowing fire.

These happy results obtained from this simple method are probably owing to several causes. The cold chills the surface of the body and contracts the superficial blood vessels, usually affecting forehead, feet and ears, and afterward the general body surface. Contraction of the blood vessels results in less blood and stagnation of its current, thus rendering the tissues less able to resist cold. Deep inspirations stimulate the blood current and by expanding and compressing the lungs hasten the flow of blood through the organs and by the increased oxygenated and more heat necessarily produced.

The suggestion is valuable in counteracting the effects of cold, in riding, driving, standing etc., in stimulating the flagging circulation without moving a step. It may arrest fatal congestive troubles, such as pleuritis and pneumonia.

SINGULAR PHENOMENON.

Volcanic Underground Noises Resembling the Tolling of a Bell.

A singular phenomenon occurs on the borders of the Red sea at a place called Nakous, where the intermittent underground sounds have been heard for an unknown number of centuries. It is situated at about half a mile's distance from the shore, whence a long reach of sand ascends rapidly to a height of almost three hundred feet. This reach is eighty feet wide, and resembles an amphitheater, being railed in by low rocks. The sounds coming up from the ground at this place recur at intervals of about an hour. They at first resemble a low murmur, but before long there is heard a loud knocking, somewhat like the strokes of a bell, and which, at the end of five minutes, becomes so strong as to agitate the sand. The explanation of this curious phenomenon given by the Arabs is that there is a convent under the ground, and these are sounds of the bell which the monks ring for prayers. So they call it Nakous, which means a bell. The Arabs affirm that the noise so frightens their camels when they hear it as to render them furious. Scientists attribute the sounds to suppressed volcanic action—probably to the bubbling of gas or vapors underground.—Philadelphia Ledger.
