A COLORED NIGHT PROWLER.
Around the Premises of Citizens—A Lady Attacked by Him.
Sunday night about half past seven Mrs. J. D. Jamieson, who lives at the foot of Orange street, was out for a few minutes on her back porch and while there she was startled by suddenly finding a negro man near her and to see him grasp towards her throat. She shrieked and sprang inside closing the door. She then failed from fright.
No one was in the house at the time, except Mrs. Jamieson and two small children, but her son Henry, a young man, arrived and entered about the time a man, as he could see him what was amiss he took an observation and found the negro was still near though he had got on the opposite side of a fence.
Mr. Jamieson then proceeded to the Revenue Cutter Wharf which was lying near and got his father Mr. J. D. Jamieson who is the master of arms on the boat and several other of the men and attempted to capture the fellow. He ran up the street, his pursuers after him, at one time almost upon the villain, but being very fleet of foot he distanced them, leaped over into the lot of Col. John D. Whitford and escaped.
The pursuers were so close upon the negro when he crossed East Front street that they could see the kind of clothing he wore well enough to partly describe it, and also to see that he wore rings in his ears.
Quite recently someone was noticed prowling about a residence near and an effort made to shoot him by one of the occupants but he got away.
Whenever the recitals intensify with it is a pity that he was not captured and duly punished.

GOOD LAYING HENS.
Two Hundred Eggs in Two Weeks from Twenty-five Brown Leghorns in 30 Water.
Mr. R. A. Richardson has a flock of twenty-five brown leghorn hens which have supplied him with two hundred eggs in the last two weeks, and he has sold every one of them for breeding purposes at a fancy price. The hens laid a dozen eggs Monday with the ground covered with snow.
An egg record like the above could be expected in the spring of the year but to get so many from so small a flock in mid-winter is a good showing and marks the advantage of having good breeds even when the eggs are only for family use, or for regular market purposes, and when the fowls are best according to the standard and sold for breeding purposes the profit is greatly enhanced.
From a flock of thirty of these fowls Mr. Richardson sold \$55.00 worth of eggs in three months last spring.

NEWS IN BRIEF.
Col. Beckenrich's lecturing tour pausing to-day.
At Erkin, a little mountain in the western part of the State, the mercury got down to even zero.
Gladstone, as a result of his "Grand old Man" has just celebrated his 85th birthday. The same day he delivered a strong and zealous speech in condemnation of the Armenian outrages.
Dr. Paul Dressbach and Carl Muller, prominent Germans, are in Western North Carolina making arrangements for the steady and large supply of monazite for export to Germany for use in the manufacture of electric lamps.—Baltimore Sun.
In a murder trial at Düsseldorf lately the jury after being locked-up, made its way out through a window and went to a bar saloon, where it agreed on a verdict. The result is an appeal for new trial.
J. W. Durham, of Raleigh, is awarded the contract for building the \$2,500 monument over the grave of L. L. Polk in Oakwood Cemetery at Raleigh. The corner stone will be unveiled by the National Farmers' Alliance in February.
Keely, the inventor, was committed to jail in Philadelphia last week for contempt of court, and afterward set free on habeas corpus. It has now been over twenty years since Keely commenced to try to make his engine work, and during that time it has worked his sci-fidlers very nicely.
The executive committee of the board of agriculture has unanimously decided to urge the legislature to make appropriations for an exhibit at the Atlanta exposition. Governor Carr will recommend an appropriation for this purpose.
More resolutions have been created by the investigations of the Lexow investigation committee to support the resignation of Governor Carr but before doing so he underwent a searching examination as to how much he is worth and how he acquired his fortune.
