

The Raleigh correspondent of the Wil mington Star calls attention to the following miscarriage of Fusionist plans through their blundering Legislature.

"It was evidently intended by the new ounty government act that the magistrates should meet in June with the county commissioners for the purpose of levying the county tax and for other purposes. And in order to give control to the fusion ists in all of the counties of the State three new magistrates were appointed by the Legislature for each township in the

"But lo and behold, by some fatuity section six of the county government act repeals section 717 of the Code, which was the only law that enabled the magistrates to meet and carry out their pur-

"There was a special law passed for the election of tax collectors for every township in Wake county. This act virtually robbed the sheriff of his prerogatives. But since the time of meeting for magis-trates has been abolished, that act and several others cannot be carried into ef-
