ANOTHER FANCY POULTRY YARD.

A. J. Finch Joins the Grand Army of Chicken fanciers.

He has a pretty flock of one dozen grown fowls and 100 young chickens; 86 of the young ones are at Mr. C. E. Foy's and the remainder at Mrs. Banger's. QUICK A. & N. C. R. R. SCHEDULE.

An Hour Saved in Each Direction-- Fine for Morehead Visitors and the Travelling Public Generally.

A new schedule goes into effect next Monday on the A. & N. C. R. R., which eclipses any which the road has yet had. Under its workings the regular mail and passenger train will make the run from Morehead City to Goldsboro an hour quicker than it now does and make a similarly quick run on the return trip.

Under the new schedule the train leaves Morehead City an hour later in the morning and yet reaches Goldsboro five minutes sooner than now, and coming back it leaves Goldsboro at the same time as now but gets to Morehead City nearly an hour sooner.

The morning train, on and after Monday, leaves Morehead City at 8:07 a. m., arrive in New Berne at 9:17 and leave at 9:30 and arrives in Goldsboro at 11:25 a. m.

Returning, it leaves Goldsboro at 3:20 p. m.; arrives in New Berne at 4:35; leaves at 5:25 and arrives at Morehead City at 6:37.

This is a fine schedule and Morehead visitors this summer will appreciate it.

Enormous Fish Shipments.

We have been informed that the estimated value of the fish shipped from Roanoke Island this spring is \$150,000.

To realize this properly it must be remembered that the island is not a large one, by any means. If we mistake not, less than a hundred families reside on it. Others than the residents engage in the fishing during its season but the inhabitants get their full share of the benefits.

During a portion of the shad season from 700 to 1,000 boxes passed through Elizabeth City daily. Some of these fish came from other points, but Roanoke Island sent more than any other place.

The fish furnished a large amount of freight for the steamers Neuse and New Berne which run from this city.

North Carolina and the Civil War.

Elsewhere in to-day's paper, in our Washington correspondence, appears an extract from the New York Times, which is the most appreciative article in regard to North Carolina's position in the late war that has ever appeared in any Northern paper. It is based upon statistics that will go into the official history of the war, and is, therefore, a final proof that will be accepted by all the world, and for all time of the claim that well-informed North Carolinians have always made.

The article shows the loss by States of six Southern States. The following table, which we have prepared from the Census reports of 1860, showing the white population in each State, when contrasted with the number mortally wounded and killed, gives a clear idea of what the New York Times calls "the heroic valor of the North Carolina troops."

The Times also gives the fact that North Carolina alone sends the list in the number that died of wounds, and 20,602 of her sons died of disease. North Carolina's military population in 1861, was 115,369, but she furnished 125,000 to the Confederate cause.

The fame of North Carolina is now secure in history.--News & Observer.

NON SUIT AND APPEAL TAKEN.

In the Libel Case of Chas. L. Gaskill vs. Sheriff Lane et als.

The libel case of Mr. Chas. L. Gaskill, of the former New Berne Courier, brought against Sheriff W. B. Lane, County Superintendent of Health, Dr. Leinster Dully, and E. E. Harper, publisher of the JOURNAL, came up before Judge Bryan yesterday. The suit was for \$5,000.00 damages, Mr. Gaskill claiming that his character had been damaged to that extent.

The case was called early in the morning, but nearly half of the day was consumed in sequestering a jury. Besides examining the regular jury and persons subject to jury duty in the court room, Coroner Street, acting sheriff was compelled to make a special summons from outside.

After jury was empaneled, attorneys for plaintiff moved for judgment for the defendants but failed to properly verify their answer. Motion refused by Judge Bryan. Defendants allowed to amend verification of answer, whereupon attorneys for plaintiff announced that in deference to His Honor's intimation the plaintiff would enter non-suit and prayed an appeal to the Supreme court.

The attorneys for the plaintiff were Messrs. W. W. Clark and L. J. Moore for the defendants Messrs. O. H. Gison, M. DeW. Stevenson, P. H. Pelletier and Hon. F. M. Simmons of Raleigh.

THE HOT WEATHER.

The Thermometer Still Climbing--Reaches 96.5 Yesterday.

The government weather record shows that Friday was three degrees hotter than the previous day. The highest point reached was 96.5, the lowest 69.5; range 27.

The temperature got to the highest point in Chicago, before it did in New Berne. We cannot say whether the present mark has ever been passed in May before or not. There was one day last May that came close to it but did not quite reach it. On the 17th of last May it was 94.5, lacking just two degrees, of being as hot as the last day of this May, which is hotter than any day of last 1894, which we have just spoken of was the hottest of that year. The next hottest was in August; it then reached 93.5. There were four days in July when it stood at 92.

The hottest day of April last year was 84; and of this year it was 85. And yet when talking of all this heat, it may perhaps be a little refreshing to remember that only 14 days before this hottest day there was frost. There was a slight frost on the 13th of May, and one on the 17th heavy enough to do some damage.

A. W. Wright, of the firm of Wright & Warner, St. Louis, manufacturer's agent, has been missing for nearly one week. He is alleged to have taken with him nearly \$200,000 in negotiable bonds and warrants (deeds to valuable lands. His partner, Prof. Clarence D. Warner, claims to be ignorant of his whereabouts and says his personal loss will reach nearly \$100,000.

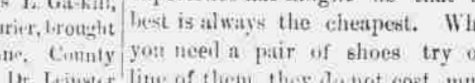
