

The Ball Nozzle to be exhibited.

The recently invented and celebrated  
Ball Nozzle, which is creating so much at-

tomorrow morning at the steamer dock,  
foot of Craven St.

It is a round ball with a bell-shaped  
nozzle. This simple combination reverses  
the accepted initial law and bubbles scientist,

Successful Extinguisher Test.

The test of the Stewell Fire extin-
