GRAND OPERA.

The Press Agent of Signorina Moreska in the City to Arrange for Her Coming.

Mr. G. A. Coko, the press agent of Signorina Nico Moreska, arrived last night to make arrangements for an exhibition in New Berne. He is registered at the Albert.

Mr. Coko speaks of Signorina Moreska as the most promising young singer and dramatic soprano of the day. She made her debut a year ago. She is only sixteen years of age and her voice is spoken of as being as fine and limpid as that of an adult.

A REFORMATORY NEEDED.

What Judge Meares Had to Say in Court Upon This Question.

THE JOURNAL has repeatedly advocated the establishment of a reformatory for young criminals where an effort could be made to reclaim them instead of placing them, as now, in the penitentiary and jails along with older and hardened criminals where they are likely to come forth as much, possibly more, confirmed evil ways than when they entered it.

There was a case before Judge Meares Friday which caused him to express himself with emphasis upon this subject. It was that of the negro girl, Mentoria Bryan, who gives her age as fourteen years, but appears older. She is the one who struck a small child of Mr. W. H. Hancock with a brick bat on the street recently.

A plea was made for the prisoner on the ground that her mother was a good woman, but Judge Meares said that while he was sorry he could not take a prisoner's family into consideration and keep justice from being done; that in this case a great outrage had been striking that baby with a rock upon no provocation whatever, that it showed a malicious wicked heart and a devilish disposition.

The Judge however, notwithstanding the aggravating circumstances attending the commission of the offense, made the sentence light. He simply sent the girl confined to the county jail instead of to the penitentiary and made the term only two months.

Judge Meares took the occasion to remark that there is hardly a day in which he is holding court but what he sees the need for a reformatory.

JOLLY YACHT CRUISERS.

From Jersey City, Who Took Their Trip South to Visit the Exposition On an Elegant Naptha Yacht, Run by Themselves--Homeward Bound.

One of the prettiest naphtha yachts ever in our waters was at the E. C. D. wharf for a short time Friday afternoon. It was the Anania, belonging to the Jersey City yacht club on which a pleasure party of five had taken a trip South to attend the Atlanta Exposition. They have spent a month in recreation and are now home-bound. They came up to New Berne for a fresh supply of naphtha. They briefly visited several coast places of interest on their cruise.

There were several there aboard when she reached New Berne, the two others had to get back home earlier than those who remained. They all seem to have enjoyed the trip hugely.

The yacht is a fine little one, with white hull, oak deck and house with cherry trimmings, brass railings and almost continuous windows. Inside everything corresponds with the exterior appearance. It is ornamentally finished in walnut, well carpeted and cushioned and the various apartments supplied with everything needed for convenience and comfort. She was pronounced by those who viewed her, "a regular dandy."
