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SECOND DAY.

SEN. WHITE, CALIFORNIA, PERMANENT CHAIRMAN.

Hours Given to Speeches. Long Discussion Over Michigan's Contested Seats. Great Confusion at Times in Convention.

Special.
CHICAGO, July 8.—Weather today was clear and cool. Senator White of California, will permanently preside over convention.

24 of Pennsylvania delegates have decided to vote for Bland.
Convention called to order 10:51 a. m. The sub-committee on platform agreed on draft and it was read to full committee.

Sergeant of Arms has been ordered to allow no one on the floor except delegates. Chairman called for report of committee on credentials to which there was no response.

The convention awaited the report of committee, but none seemed to be ready. Committee on credentials was called on to meet in committee room immediately.

Governor Hogg (Texas) was requested to address the convention. Hogg took the platform amid cheers, the band playing "Dixie." In his speech Hogg advocated a friendliness of spirit among the delegates in the convention, there and hereafter. He predicted success in November if Democratic party would work harmoniously together.

He denounced the Republican platform as a mass of glittering generalities, made to deceive the public. He denounced Protection as being only in the interest of the wealthy, and against the farmer and working man.

He said a Republican corruption fund was being formed for carrying Illinois, Ohio and other States. He read the plank in the Republican platform of 1892, at Minneapolis, favoring bimetalism, and said if it meant anything it was gold and silver on equal terms.

Calls were made for Hill, Altgeld and Blackburn.
Senator Blackburn in a speech said the majority of the American people are suffering, and are looking to this Convention to right their wrongs.

He said the people will not longer submit to class legislation (cheers). That Christ drove from the temple a better set of men than those now in the money power or who had been for many years.

W. J. Bryan not being present, Gov. Altgeld was asked to address the Convention. Cheers and confusion. Senator Hill was called upon to address the Convention. The confusion increased.

Senator Hill not being in the hall, Overmeyer, of Kansas addressed the Convention. He said that the seat of empire was yesterday transferred to the great Mississippi Valley.

Gov. Altgeld asked to speak proceeded to the platform and was given a great reception.

The Governor said that nearly everything was under mortgage, from farms to the sewing machines of seamstresses, and that all was in the interest of the English money lenders. He advocated bimetalism and pointed out that the gold standard has lowered prices of farm products, while the farmer has had to pay more for what he had to buy. This was loudly applauded. He referred to the gold Democrats as wanting to put bailers on the Americans in favor of the English money lenders, asked if they will be allowed to do it. Cries of no, no, all over the convention. The gold Democrats claim they love their country and still are doing all they can for these English money men and tending to make the producers of this country their vassals.

Williams says convention is no wise sectional. New England represented and has much at stake as West and South, and speaks for 5 millions of people now silent. Williams pleaded for harmony and doing away with sectionalism.

The committee on credentials report against gold delegates from Michigan and Nebraska. Committee asked for further time to consider the individual credentials of Michigan delegates, but asks that the Bryan delegates from Nebraska be seated.

The Credentials Committee's report as to seating of the Bryan delegates of Nebraska was declared amid much confusion.

W. R. Russell, of Massachusetts, demanded roll call on report of committee on seating Bryan delegates. Russell after ward withdrew his motion and report of committee stood.

Committee retired to consider the Michigan case.
Bryan delegates took their seats amid cheers. Time being filled in with music, while delegations were conferring and fraternizing.

Convention adjourned until 5 o'clock p. m.
Delegates slowly assembled. It has been agreed that when platform is proposed each side shall be given an hour for discussion. Then vote on it. Committee on credentials were not quite ready in report.

Convention called to order 8:15 p. m. Members of committee on credentials stood to report to the room adjoining.

The time was filled in with music. Committee on credentials were not quite ready in report.

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to seat the four Michigan gold delegates at large, and unseat the four district gold delegates. Not result on Michigan action gives silver men 16, gold 12.

C. Crosby, of Massachusetts presented minority report, favoring seating of Gold delegates in disputed districts, in Michigan, and moved its adoption.

Gov. McLaurin, of Mississippi advocated endorsement of action of majority of committee.

McLaurin went into technical explanation of Michigan case. He was frequently interrupted by galleries. The delegates asked that the galleries be cleared. Galleries were warned by chairman.

A delegate arose to a point of order, saying that speaker was not speaking to the question that he was referring frequently to other matters.

Stephenson protested in emphatic terms against action of the majority in nominating gold men. He said that the silver contestants have credentials from State of Michigan and this question as to who were delegates was unanimously approved by the Michigan State convention, asked that this convention do not go behind them.

Stephenson at the finish was loudly applauded. Speechman of N. Y. addressed convention in favor of minority report.

Speechman cited action of National Committee in Indiana in which gold men was thrown out by unanimous vote and silver man was seated because he had the State's endorsement. He said the object of the majority was to enable the two thirds rule to be overridden in favor of silver, and he appealed to the convention not to resort to revolutionary measures.

Clayton, of Texas, spoke in favor of majority report. Blake of Texas, said committee went behind returns of Michigan, because they found fraud had been perpetrated. Cheers and confusion. Blake appealed to every silver man on the floor to sustain the action of the majority in the interest of right and against fraud (cheers and hisses).

McKnight, of Michigan, addresses the Convention favor of the majority report. The speaker referred to Stephenson, as having been called to Washington by the great Chief, Stephenson at this jumped on a chair and shook his fist and said "there is not one word of truth in that."

Confusion all over the convention. McKnight said the will of the people of Michigan was thwarted by the action and fraud of certain districts in that State, asked the convention to support the majority report and the Democrats would carry Michigan by 25,000 votes.

Bruicker, of Michigan, claiming to be a silver man, advocated the minority report, said the endorsement of the action of the majority report would be highway robbery, excitement.

Judge Powers, of Utah, asked convention to endorse the action of the majority of the credential committee. He claimed the silver men had a two third majority already. Cheers.

Senator Grady, of N. Y., addressed convention in favor of minority report. He asked if all precedents of the party shall be violated in order that the action of the majority be sustained? (Cries of no, no in galleries.)

Great confusion in hall with much commotion. Every one on his feet. Chairman beckoned for the music, which started to play. Grady standing on the platform while the commotion was going on. Police pulling out disorderly men from hall.

The roll call was demanded on the question shall minority report be accepted. Alabama's vote challenged. Vote was called amid much confusion and excitement in hall.

Chairman announced that unless order was maintained he would have the galleries cleared.

New York voted 72 yeas, great cheering. Including New York, yeas 242, nays 326. Cheering on New York vote continued with audience on its feet, waving hats and handkerchiefs. Cheering was renewed with increased vigor. Cheering breaks out afresh.

Chairman rapped for order, cannot be heard. Has given the signal and the music started up but could hardly be heard for cheers. About one third of delegates standing on their feet and cheering continues throughout the hall and drawing the band.

Chairman rapped vigorously for order and audience quieted down for an instant, then broke out again into cheers.

Chairman Harry of National Committee endeavoring to restore order in the convention. Uproar continued about 20 minutes.

Roll call was resumed.
Some one called for three cheers for Senator Hill. Chairman Daniel said proceedings would be stopped till order was restored.

Gov. Altgeld endeavored to make a statement, but cheering broke out again. Cries of "roll call." Sergeant at Arms clearing the aisles. Altgeld was ruled out of order.

Disordered yeas 266, nays 556. Motion lost.

Chairman rapped for order. Stephenson, of Michigan, ascended platform in order to make a statement. Cheering and confusion continued. Many delegates and others waving small flags. Some of the Kentucky delegates giving a break down in the case.

Convention quieted down somewhat delegates resuming their work.

Order being restored the motion of Virginia for the adoption of the report of the majority, was adopted. Committee on permanent organization reported for President of Convention, Senator White, of California. Cheers. Report of committee Permanent organization adopted.

MEXICAN OFFICERS VOLUNTEER To Assist Spain Against Insurgents. American Built Boats Picked up Adrift.

HAVANA, July 8—Eighteen Mexican officers arrived here, today, to offer their services to the Spanish Government in its operations against the insurgents.

The schooner Isle De Cuba, picked up three boats, of American build, which were found abandoned on the coast of Boca de Coiga.

One boat contained some cartridges which are supposed to belong to the expedition which was recently landed from Key West.

Floods in Japan.
YOKOHAMA, July 8—Disastrous floods have occurred in the prefectures of Toyama and Shiga.

On the West coast of Japan houses have been destroyed. The loss of life is not stated.

To Protect Government Survey.
SANTA BARBARA, CALIF., July 8—United States Marshal Cavanaugh, with twelve deputies, left today to take forcible possession of San Miguel and protect the government survey which the occupants of the place will not permit. Trouble is expected.

DEGREE TO SELL.
The Lynchburg and Durham Railway Filed, Favor Mercantile Trust and Deposit Co.

RALEIGH, N. C., July 8—The consent to a decree for the sale of the Lynchburg and Durham railway was filed here, today, in the Circuit Court, in favor of the Mercantile Trust and Deposit Co. of New York.

The road is 115 miles long and cost \$2,500,000.

It was leased to the Norfolk and Western railroad for 99 years.

Democratic State Committee.
RALEIGH, N. C., July 8—Chairman J. H. Poir was here today, and says that the Democratic State Committee will meet next week.
