Wallace, the young man who was drowned off the steamer Neuse last week was found floating near Brant Island light-house, last Sunday morning. Keeper Hinnant, of the light-house, secured the body and a few hours later hailed the schooner Two-Friends, which was passing, and put the remains aboard the boat to send them to this city. The schooner arrived here yesterday morning. In the absence of Coroner Street, Dr. Duguid, Superintendent of Health, immediately held an inquest. From the testimony given it was learned that the deceased was last seen alive aboard the steamer Neuse. He was rushing around the saloon with a broom in his hand and only had on one shoe. Passengers in the saloon reported to one of the officers of the boat that a crazy looking man was running about the cabin. The officer went at once to see about the man, but arrived only in time to see him standing on the outside of the rail. In an instant he had leaped into the water. The officer jumped to the rail and looked down into the water. By the lights on the lower deck he saw the upturned, haggard face of the drowned man, and the glassy eyes of the man sank. With a smothered cry the man sank. The officer says he will never forget the face. The coroner's jury decided that the body was that of W. N. Wallace, who jumped overboard while insane. Mr. I. T. Wallace, brother of the drowned man, is in the city and having claimed the body put it in the hands of Undertaker Simpson. The deceased was the son of Rev. I. T. Wallace, and leaves a wife, sisters, brothers and a widowed mother. The body will be taken to Richmond for interment. A Jumbo Tomato. Mr. Freeman S.
