## A JOINT CANVASS.

### WATSON AND GUTHRIE TO MAKE IT.

The Two Nominees Start Out Sept. 12th. Republican Headquarters Opened. Interior State Has Good Rain.

Special. **Raleigh, N. C., August 18.**—By Watson accepts W. A. Guthrie's challenge for a joint political canvass.

It will probably begin about September 12th.

Republican State headquarters will be opened here tomorrow, with a State and central chairman, and three central committees, in charge. There will be several clerks and stenographers.

Fine rains have fallen last night, and today in the interior of State.

### Hanns's Movements.

Special. **New York, August 18.**—Mark A. Hanns has wired that he will be here tomorrow, and will remain until next week.

He will arrange for heavy campaign work, then leaving Jas Manly and Senator Quay in charge here.

### Royal Engagement.

Special. **CETINJE, Montenegro, August 18.**—The engagement of Vitorio Emanuele, the Prince of Naples, to Princess Helene, of Montenegro, is reported.

### To the Convention.

Special. **BELLEVILLE, Vt., August 18.**—The National Democratic Convention of this State has selected delegates to attend the Indianapolis Convention.

### Will Send Full Number.

Special. **INDIANAPOLIS, August 18.**—Chairman W. D. Bynum says New York will send a full delegation to the gold Convention, which meets here, next month.

### Restraind from Collecting.

Special. **CLEVELAND, O., August 18.**—The National Base Ball League has been restrained by Judge Noble from collecting the fine imposed upon Capt. Tebeau, of the Cleveland team.

### Gov. Matthews, Better.

Special. **INDIANAPOLIS, August 18.**—Governor Matthews' condition is improved. He was at the office today.

### Gail Hamilton Dead.

**HAMILTON, Mass., August 17.**—Miss Mary Abigail Dodge (Gail-Hamilton), the famous authoress, died last night at her beautiful home, from the effects of a paralytic stroke. Miss Dodge was stricken while at breakfast and immediately became unconscious. Medical aid was at once summoned, and Miss Dodge removed to her bed, but while every possible means were adopted to restore her, she never regained consciousness.

Miss Dodge had a similar attack while in Washington about a year ago. Miss Augustus Dodge and other relatives were at the bedside when she died. Too much work in writing her last book, "The Valley of Death," during the hot weather broke her strength.

Her funeral will take place Thursday at three o'clock, and will be a private one.

### Approved by the Sultan.

**LONDON.**—The Daily News is stated that further diplomatic correspondence will be issued shortly, showing that the Armenian outrages had their origin in the Sultan's "look," the residence of the Sultan, and that they were approved by his Majesty, for the purpose of warning the Turkish empire, in part what to expect unless its members desisted from their propaganda.

The paper declares that the correspondence will also show that 100,000 Armenians were massacred.

### Fighting Indians Captured.

**NOBLES, Ariz.**—Captain Dodge, of the infantry company dispatched northward, arrived in Nogales, having in charge three Yaqui Indians captured a few miles east of Tubac. The Indians were traveling toward Tucson, and were all heavily armed. They claim that they were on a hunting trip, and deny complicity with Friday's raid on Nogales.

Captain Douglas is reported as being on the way to this city from Oroblanco, with thirty more manning Yaquis captured in that vicinity.

A company of Mexican cavalry, arrived late Saturday night from Buenos Ayres, Arizona, fifty miles west of Nogales. The officers report that a great number of Indians are going toward Sasaca, Mexico, seven miles west of Buenos Ayres. Some of them are armed, and it is supposed that they are up to mischief of some kind.

### Winn's Campaigning.

Special. **New York, N. Y., August 18.**—Capt. B. Winn, with brother, Sam B. Winn, and others, are now campaigning in the State, who have held the double in the State lately.

### Fleets of Letters and Invitations, Goes Fishing.

The headquarters of the Populist party will be located at Washington. Senator Butler says the Populists will not support A. C. Sewall.

**No Says Chairman Manly, Joint Discussion to be Settled Next Week.**

Special. **RALEIGH, N. C., August 18.**—In speaking tonight, about a joint canvass proposed for W. A. Guthrie and C. B. Watson, Chairman Manly said nothing should side track the Democratic party and divert its attention from the fact, that its worst enemy this year is the Republican party.

Watson who speaks at Aberdeen, tonight will be here Thursday, and then the matter of a joint debate with Guthrie will be discussed and settled.

### Sent Back by Weyler.

**QUARANTINE, S. I.**—Among the cabin passengers living on the steamer Cuba from Havana were three deserters from the Cuban army, who were given passes by General Weyler. Their names are Samuel McNally, James T. Quinn, and Maximiliano Jortuca. They went to Cuba with the Lourada expedition.

### Death of an Editor.

**WINSTON, N. C.**—Captain J. W. Golen, editor of the Union Republican, the organ of the Republican party in this State, met with a fatal accident when attempting to step from the car before it stopped. His head struck a stone, which produced concussion of the brain and caused his death.

### Telegraphic Items.

Two men were killed and four injured by an explosion of dynamite at New Holland, Pa.

The annual report of the Manhattan Elevated Railroad Company shows a decrease of \$259,838 in net earnings and an increase in deficit of \$399,850.

At Drachensville, Pa., Saturday night Leon D. Gage while endeavoring to stop a fight, was stabbed to death by Michael Kelley, of Brookdale. Kelley has been arrested.

Joseph Treasurer, of Potter's Mills, Pa., was run over by a Lehigh Valley freight train, and cut completely in two. He was trying to catch onto a moving freight car east of Geneva Station, where three of his companions were riding and fell beneath the wheels.

A train on the Ontario and Western while passing Peak's Brook Crossing, three miles from Delhi, N. Y., struck a wagon containing Mrs. Leroy Reynolds and her young daughter. The woman was killed, and the child so badly injured that its recovery is uncertain.

Gay Soren, an immigrant, was killed while swimming in a pond at Oak

Cliff, a suburb of Dallas, Tex., when within forty feet of the earth and falling gracefully, his big umbrella struck an electric wire pole, almost capturing the machine and throwing the man into a small elm tree near by.
