District Endorsements.

RALPH, September 23.—The Sixth district Republican committee endorses Martin, Populist, for Congress. It is asserted that the Republican committee in the Third district will endorse Fowler, Populist.

RALPH, N. C., September 23.—Patrick Massey, the Republican Congressional nominee in this district was yesterday notified by the State Committee in favor of a Populist, but the District committee, which nominated him, refused to acknowledge the State committee's right or power to dispose of him.

RALPH, N. C., September 23.—A letter received here, today, says Tom Watson is coming to North Carolina to speak and that he will attack the Populist State Committee for not demanding all eleven votes for him.

Predicting Missouri's Vote.

St. Louis, Mo.—Chairman Samuel Cook, of the Democratic central committee, said he had returns of the house-to-house canvass being made by the committee in 138 school districts. Basing an estimate on these returns, he says Missouri will go Democratic by 100,000 plurality.

Quiet in Leadville.

LEADVILLE, COL.—In spite of the continued manufacture of rumors, the camp remains quiet. The militia are here and in camp in the baseball park near the Denver and Rio Grande depot, while details continue to guard the threatened points of attack.

The absence of the president and secretary of the miners' union is still noted, and the sentiment of the camp has found voice in favor of law and order.

The presence of 900 well-drilled militiamen with gaiting guns and a troop of cavalry has had a most salutary effect, both upon the miners and timid citizens.

Killed His Whole Family.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind.—Charles Pfeifer, a telegraph operator, was found hanging dead to his doorway at his home, in Brightwood.

In the house his wife and two-year-old child were found dead. Pfeifer had cut their throats and then hanged himself.

Pfeifer was twenty-two years old and had been married three years. His wife was nineteen years old. They had apparently lived happily, and no one suspected that there was trouble pending.

Drowns Himself While Insane.

CHICAGO—Edwin Keith, for forty years one of the prominent and influential citizens of Chicago, threw himself into the lake at the foot of Thirteenth street while temporarily insane as the result of chronic dyspepsia and insomnia. He was drowned.

Mr. Keith is best known as a member of the wholesale millinery and notions firm of Edson Keith & Co. He was also a member of Keith Brothers, wholesale hat dealers, and of Keith & Co., elevator owners. He was sixty-three years old.

Telegraph Items.

An ordinance has been introduced in the Chicago City Council for the abolition of vaccination in the public schools. It is said to be backed by the homeopathic school of physicians.

About 700 employees of the carpet mills of Smith & Sons, in Yonkers, N. Y., have resumed work. They had been out of employment during the last three weeks, on account of the mills being shut down.

By the giving way of the leg of a derrick that was being used to hoist stone at Buffalo, N. Y., Martin Duda, aged twenty-one, was instantly killed and Martin Haller and John Karver were fatally injured.

The Hodgman Rubber Company, at Broadway and Grand street, New York, has passed into the hands of R. W. Todd as receiver. Stringency of the money market is cause assigned. Assets about \$350,000; liabilities not known.

At the convention of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, at Cleveland, Monday, it was resolved to have nothing to do with political questions, and a circular calling a silver mass meeting under the auspices of the brotherhood was repudiated.

Rev. James H. Morrison, of Laconia, N. H., committed suicide by gassing himself in the Bellevue Hotel in Boston. Mr. Morrison left Laconia recently on account of charges about to be presented against him for immoral conduct. He had been pastor of the Unitarian Church in Laconia for the past six years.

What is believed to be a genuine case of leprosy was accidentally discovered in the waiting room at Bellevue Hospital, New York. The supposed victim was quickly transferred to the Willard Parker Hospital.

Parade of Odd-Fellows.

DALLAS, Texas.—The second day's session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of Odd-Fellows was opened with the biggest parade ever seen in Texas. It was over two miles long.

The 5,000 Odd-Fellows and Daughters of Rebekah who were in line, in carriages, on floats or afoot, were viewed by nearly 50,000 people along the line of march. Every available vehicle in the city was in service, and private carriages had to be used to convey the grand representatives and officers.

Ovation to Buckner.

NEW YORK.—General Buckner spoke after General Palmer had concluded at the Madison Square Garden meeting.

When Governor Flower introduced the Kentucky General the scene was dramatic. The Northern audience evidently thought that to the brave soldier of the South it should accord a special welcome, and cheer upon cheer rent the air, the speaker being for several minutes unable to begin. Ex-Governor Flower said:

"At the Indianapolis convention we nominated a Union General and a former Confederate General. In the last year of thirty years past the grass has grown green over both the graves of the Union and the Confederate dead. (Applause.) And at Indianapolis we buried all the heroes of the past with military honors. I introduce Gen. Simon B. Buckner." The vice-presidential nominee made an eloquent speech and was frequently applauded.

A Conference with Watson.

ST. LOUIS.—A conference was held here by Thomas E. Watson, of Georgia, candidate for Vice-President on the Populist ticket, George W. Washburne, of Massachusetts, who is in charge of the Populist Western national headquarters at Chicago, S. W. Reed, Populist national committee chairman for Georgia and chairman of the finance committee, and A. Rozall, chairman of the Populist State committee of Missouri.

It was stated that Candidate Watson had called the conference to discuss the advisability of issuing a manifesto calling on the Democrats to withdraw Mr. Sewall from the Democratic ticket or fusion would be declared off in all States.

The conferees declined to say whether or not they had reached any result.

Princely Gift.

CHICAGO.—Mrs. Julia Bradley, an aged woman, of Peoria, Ill., has bestowed all her fortune, estimated at \$2,200,000, upon the University of Chicago, on condition that a branch school be built at Peoria. Mrs. Bradley has planned for the gift for fifteen years, but the fact has only now leaked out.

Some time ago she decided she would like to see the school at work before she dies, and the incorporation papers are now drawn. It will be called "The Bradley Peoria High Institute," and two of its seven directors will be connected with the University of Chicago.
