A BASIS OF SETTLEMENT.

Between United States and England on Venezuelan Question. An Amicable Arrangement.

LONDON, October 22.—It is learned from the Foreign office, today, that Sir Julian Pauncefote, the British Ambassador to the United States, who is returning to Washington is the bearer of instructions, which are expected to effect a friendly settlement on the Venezuelan differences between Great Britain and the United States.

It is stated that a basis of settlement was determined by Chamberlain after a conversation with Secretary Olney, during a recent visit to America, and since revised by Salisbury.

The present negotiations between Great Britain and the United States are of the most amicable character.

RALEIGH, [October 22.—There were over twelve thousand people at the State Fair today. There were no accidents. The racing was unusually good.

Telegraphic Items.
A white man named J. H. Rook was shot and killed by a negro on the place of Rook, near Sunnydale, Lenoir County, Miss. On Monday night a posse took the negro and hanged him.

A freight train north-bound crashed through the Chicago, Great Western bridge over the Platte river, seventy miles south of Des Moines. Three men were killed, including H. T. Rhodes, conductor, Des Moines.

William McFarland, alias "Kid" and Thomas Butler, were arraigned in a Police Court in Brooklyn, charged with prize-fighting in violation of the penal code. The prisoners pleaded not guilty, and were released in \$500 bail for examination on Monday next.

Within the past few weeks a number of miners from abroad have arrived at Hot Springs, Ark., and are busy prospecting for gold in the mountains adjacent to the city. Rich finds are reported six miles northwest, and the mining fever is becoming intense. The woods are full of prospectors.

The big distributing reservoir of the Oakland Water Company, at Oakland, Cal., broke its walls Tuesday, and 2,000,000 gallons of water was let loose with a rush. A wall of water seven feet high tore down Oakland avenue, but beyond flooding the streets in the vicinity, no great damage was done.

While the Dunsen family was doing its aerial act at Barnum's circus in the Coliseum of Chicago, one of its members, John, met with an accident which is likely to prove fatal. Dropping from a tree eighty feet to a net below, his body turned too much and alighted, almost full on the head. The spine was severely injured.

A farmer named Bulka, who has a large income from oil leases, was murdered on his farm about seventeen miles south of Toledo, Ohio, by robbers and his wife was seriously injured. Two masked men opened the doors of the family were at supper, shot Bulka dead, and Mrs. Bulka through the wrist. Afterward she was knocked down and severely injured by blows. The robbers secured nothing of consequence.

Cruelty to a Spaniard.

CHICAGO.—A San Francisco correspondent to a local paper says:

Cuban atrocities are mild compared to those taking place in the Philippine Islands, where the Spaniards are trying to suppress a revolt of the natives. Some indication of affairs have been learned from oriental papers. The most shocking incident of the blood eprials was the treatment of a Spanish lieutenant and his family.

The Spanish had captured a number of prisoners and as an object lesson to the natives disembowled two and hung their bodies on one of the gates of the town. The infuriated rebels, eager for vengeance, gathered a force and entered the home of a Spanish lieutenant in the outskirts of Manila. They captured the officer, his wife and a five-year old daughter and then began a bloody scene of torture.

The most savage instance of the natives were aroused. Before the eye of his wife and daughter the lieutenant's skin was slit all over his body. Then the torturers crucified him, planting him outstretched to a tree with their long knives. They turned to the woman and girl, giving the fullest play to their animal instincts and wreaking disgusting vengeance before the dying eyes of the husband and father.

The Spanish are doing their best to keep the news of these atrocities from leaving the islands, opening and in peeling all the mail. They particularly desire to keep unknown the death of thirty-eight prisoners in one night in "The Black Hole."

THE DAUNTLESS CAPTURED.
Stopped as a Filibusterer by Cruiser Raleigh.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla.—Officer Smyrna bar the United States cruiser Raleigh captured the filibustering steamer Dauntless and her tender, the R. L. Mabey. The latter steamer was putting out to sea with coal and supplies for the Dauntless, when the Raleigh fired a blank cartridge for her to stop. The Mabey turned about and tried to escape, when up in the Raleigh sent a solid shot across her bows, and the tug dove to. An officer was put in charge of the Mabey, and the Dauntless was brought to St. John's bar, and now lies inside in charge of officers from the Raleigh.

The Cubans here are greatly excited over the news, but claim that the Dauntless had no arms nor men on board.

In chasing and capturing the Dauntless the Raleigh used her guns several times, and the alleged filibuster came near being sunk.
