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WASHINGTON LETTER.

BOTH SIDES STILL CLAIMING THE PRESIDENCY.

Carlisle in Kentucky, Kansas and Nebraska Given to Bryan, A Printer's Duel, Appeal to Populists. Wheat Advance.

JOURNAL BUREAU, WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 23.

There is nothing in sight at the Bryan or the McKinley headquarters in Washington to show that either is licked. On the contrary, there is an increased show of confidence among the followers of both. Senator Butler, chairman of the Populist National committee, who has done comparatively little boasting during the campaign, now declares his belief in the most emphatic language that Bryan will be elected. He says he this week received information which he thinks makes it absolutely certain that Bryan will carry Michigan, Minnesota and Illinois, which will elect him with a big margin. The McKinley men will not even discuss the probability of Bryan's winning. They say that the fight has been won for several weeks, and that it is now only a question of how large McKinley's majority will be, and Vice Chairman Apsey, of the Republican Congressional committee, has just put out the largest claim yet made for McKinley and he insists that he expects from information in the possession of his committee that McKinley will get more votes than he has claimed for him. It requires no microscope, however, to see that the gentlemen who put forward these claims for both sides are very nervous, and they would doubtless be very glad to be able to feel as confident as they wish the public to think they feel.

Secretary Carlisle has gone to Kentucky to take the stump against Bryan. He will make a number of speeches, but will not remain in the State to vote, which seems a little strange in view of the belief that Kentucky will be a close State for whoever carries it.

Some idea of the enormous amount of campaign literature sent out from Washington recently may be gathered from the 40,000,000 speech envelopes which have been printed at the Government Printing Office, upon orders from Congressmen. 5,000,000 were ordered by Senator Faulkner, chairman of the Democratic committee; 4,000,000 by Representative Babcock, chairman of the Republican committee; 4,700,000 by Representative Linton, of Michigan, and the remainder by other members. The literary part of the campaign is now over, and the fight is hand to hand.

The more conservative among the McKinleyites have been putting Kansas and Nebraska in the doubtful column, notwithstanding the claims made by the campaign managers, and some of them are now almost ready to put both States in the sure Bryan column, owing to a statement made in Washington by Mr. A. H. Plumb, son of the late Senator Plumb, of Kansas. Mr. Plumb has excellent opportunities to know the political sentiment of his own State and of Nebraska, as his business takes him to all sections of both, and he says that both States are absolutely certain to be carried by Bryan and free silver.

Everybody in Washington stopped discussing the money question long enough to extract a little amusement out of the reading of a challenge to fight a duel by one printer to another printer, both employees of the Government Printing office, which was all the more surprising because of the general belief that printers are as a rule boundlessly endowed with common sense. The receiver of the challenge had so little respect for the "code of honor" that he had the would-be duellist arrested. Heavy penalties are provided by law for sending a challenge to fight a duel in the District of Columbia, but, fortunately for the intelligent comp., the Judge of the Police Court didn't take the affair seriously and discharged him with a warning not to repeat the offense.

An appeal to Populists, issued by Mr. M. A. Dunning, who was editor of the National Watchman, the Populist organ, before that paper was absorbed by Senator Stewart's Silver Knight, is creating talk among politicians. It accuses the Populist National committee of having "betrayed the trust given to it, made merchandise of the party creating it" and of being "guilty of the crimes of fraud, treachery and deception against those it should have honestly served." and is especially severe on chairman Butler whom it accuses of wishing to force Mr. Watson off the ticket. Mr. Dunning has been known as a middle-of-the-road Populist and a warm friend of Tom Watson, and there is much surmise as to whether Mr. Watson knew of this appeal before its publication and whether he endorsed it. Mr. Dunning states that he intends to vote the Republican ticket, owing to his disgust at the treatment of Mr. Watson and the Populists by Mr. Bryan's managers.

That the increase in the price of wheat is playing an important part in the present political campaign is not denied by anybody, but there is a radical difference in the value of the gold and silver men as to its cause and the effect it will have upon the votes of the farmers. The silver men are divided, some saying that the price has risen and that it has been caused by the gold men in the interest

of McKinley, and others that it is the natural result of the prospect of the free coinage of silver in this country. The gold men are unanimous in ascribing it to natural causes, shortage of the wheat crop in various sections of the world, and in expressing the belief that it will cause many farmers who have been favorably disposed towards silver to vote against the white metal, by convincing them that there is no connection between the price of silver and the price of farm products. Which ever is right the farmer who has wheat to sell is getting the benefit of the increased price, which he enjoys.

ALL ARE QUIET.

Electoral Tickets Going Around. No Changes on Populist Ticket.

Special. RALEIGH, Oct. 23.—A profound secrecy is observed about the election tickets of all three parties. All are sending them out.

There is a rumor that the Populists had made some changes in their ticket, but Chairman Ayer says this is untrue, that the printed ticket is the same as that printed in the Caucasus.

Populists Claim 50,000.

Special. RALEIGH, Oct. 23.—Populist Chairman Ayer says that a poll of his party shows it has fifty thousand votes.

Republicans give it only half that number.

W. Watson's Address.

Special. RALEIGH, Oct. 23.—The Democratic State Committee is sending out one hundred thousand copies of Cyrus B. Watson's address.

\$1,300,000 Gold Withdraws.

Special. NEW YORK, October 23.—Laidlaw, Thalmann & Co., withdrew \$1,300,000 gold from the Sub-Treasury in exchange for legal tenders.

Storm Coming.

Special. NEW YORK, October 23.—The storm center is in the Mississippi Valley, with high winds, moving on the Atlantic and North Carolina coast.

Bradstreet's Weekly Review.

Special. NEW YORK, October 23.—Bradstreet in its weekly trade review, says:—General trade continues along conservative lines, buyers and sellers preferring to defer business until after election.

The heavy demand for money to move wheat has caused higher rates. Collections are slow.

Planters are holding cotton for an advance.

Bank clearings show five per cent increase. Failures have increased.

The general trade is fairly satisfactory.

Telegraphic Items.

Special. The case of Altona Walling, the alleged murderer of Pearl Bryan, is set for hearing by the Kentucky Court of Appeals November 6.

The Ward Line steamer Yucatan, from Havana, brought a case of yellow fever to the New York quarantine. The victim was detained, and has died. Five other passengers, Chinamen, have also been detained.

Robbers entered the Bank of Casville, at Casville, Mo., Wednesday night and blew open the safe, securing the contents. The amount obtained by the robbers was large, but the bank officials refuse to give it exactly. The robbery was the work of professionals.

THE COTTON MARKETS.

October 23rd. THIS market in Liverpool opened at unchanged prices on spot, but 3/4 higher on futures. There was encouraging news from the fact that a decline had been expected. NEW YORK opened under this stimulus 6 points higher and has gradually gained 10 points at a time during the day finally closing at 8.09 for January. It is not likely much of an advance can be maintained pending the election. AMERICAN spinners cannot stock up until the financial situation is less disturbed. This support is much needed. NEW BERNE market has been steady at 8 1/2 to 7 1/2.

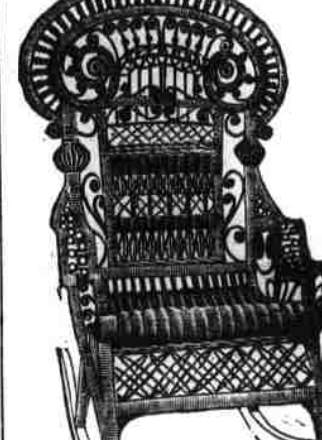

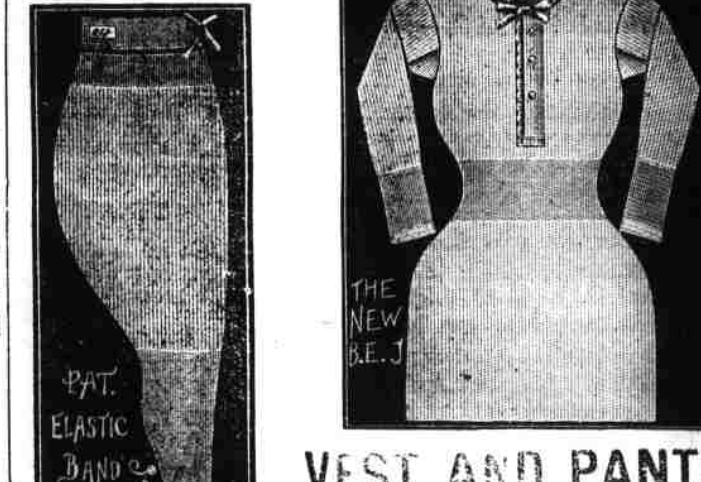
