

LATEST CABINET.

SEN. ALLISON PROMINENT FOR SECRETARY STATE.

A Man Capable for Position. Senator Quay Named. Pacific Coast to be Recognized. Gold Democrats Chances.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 11.—The up to date Cabinet state now contains the name of Senator Allison as premier of the new administration.

Senator Allison fills all the requirements. He has been a possible Presidential candidate. He has a wide experience. He is from the middle West, the great battle ground of the campaign, and he is a warm personal friend of the President-elect.

Besides these qualifications the Senator possesses an ample fortune and can hold his own in the social world. He is about seventy years old, and four years as Secretary of State would be a fitting close to his long and honorable career.

The name state contains the name of Senator Quay for one of the portfolios. The Senator is known to be enamored of the Navy Department, and would like to retire from political life after a term there.

But it is thought his great executive ability would show to better advantage at the head of the Postoffice Department. But that as it may, it looks as if the Senator could have either portfolio if he so desires.

The guessers have come down to the fact that the Secretaryship of the Treasury is to go to New York. Cornelius N. Bliss is to be the man. Mr. Platt will come back to the Senate if he chooses; if not, he will send one of his lieutenants.

From Wisconsin will come either Mr. Babcock or Mr. Payne. The latter gentleman seems to have the call, if he wants anything. His work during the campaign deserves recognition, but his health and his business may require him to decline any offers.

In such an event Mr. Babcock would be first choice for either the Interior or the Postoffice Department. For Attorney General it is thought Major McKinley will go to his own State.

Hon. B. W. Taylor, now representing Major McKinley's old district, is said to be the man for the place. He is a good lawyer, and the portfolio would lose no dignity while in his hands.

The Pacific Coast is to be recognized in this official household. It is thought that Representative Hermann of Oregon, will finally be decided upon. He lost his chance of returning to Congress by resigning at his post here last summer. He refused to go to his State thinking his place was here. His long service on the Rivers and Harbors committee would aid him for the Navy Department.

The gold Democrats are to be put in line if the new administration can do it. All recognize the service done during the campaign, but it is not thought that any of them will be invited into the Cabinet.

On some of the planks of the Chicago platform there is an irreconcilable difference and this would make it unpleasant. Two of the most important foreign embassies, it is thought, would be the very thing for them. Gen. Buckner may be invited to go abroad. The only objection would be his age. Senator Palmer is too old. He will retire from political life after March 4. So these plums may go to some of the younger and more active men of the National Democratic party.

A number of the lesser lights will be taken care of by judicial and other appointments. Mr. Byrum it is said, would be glad to be appointed to the vacancy in the U. S. Court of Claims, caused by the death of Judge Richardson. If he does not secure this Major McKinley, it is claimed, will find some judgeship equally to his liking.

THE COTTON MARKETS.

November 11. The cotton markets have been rather "soft" today and further declines have been established. In New York January closes at 7.96, a net loss of 5 points for the day. Texas is a steady absorption of cotton going on, but receipts continue on a most liberal scale. The receipts up to date from September 1st are 900,000 bales in excess of the corresponding period last year. It is wonderful that prices are hard to maintain under such a weight of receipts. The question is when will there be a diminution of this gigantic movement? Cotton is not without friends, and if there is a sharp falling off in receipts a higher range of prices will follow; on the other hand if receipts continue to "pour in" it will not be easy to prevent further weakness. New Orleans market has been firm at 7 to 7.20.

KNIGHTS OF LABOR.

Sensation at Their Meeting at Reported Attempt to Disrupt its Organization.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., November 11.—The Twentieth General Assembly of the Knights of Labor, met here today. The report of General Security Treasurer Hayes was read and created a sensation by an attack upon the so called New York triangle of the Socialistic party for their efforts to get control of the party.

The report denounced them as unscrupulous men, who would stop at nothing to accomplish their object in view. It also accuses them of trying to ruin the order after their failure to get control of it.

Secretary Olney's Ambition.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 11.—Secretary Olney has brought the Venezuelan question to a satisfactory issue, with honor and credit to himself and the administration. It is now known that he is ambitious to dispose of the Cuban question before his retirement, as Secretary of State, at the 4th of March, next.

To Claim Big Indemnity.

PANAMA, November 11.—The Transatlantic Government has decided to claim one million pounds sterling as an indemnity from the British South African Company, to cover damage sustained by the Japanese raid.

Book Bonds and Cash.

NEW YORK, November 11.—Some one evidently familiar with the combination of the lock took \$200,000 worth of stocks, and \$450 in cash from the sale of the Twine store, of Henry Gade.

Telegraphic Items.

The boiler of Roderick Baker's steam mill in Perry County, Ky., exploded, killing Roderick Baker and J. Francis, and injuring nine other persons.

Rev. J. D. Mantor, of Troy, Mont., has lost his life in a desperate encounter with a bear in the mountains. His body, badly mangled, has been recovered.

H. P. Heath, of Greeley, Colo., proprietor of the largest saddlery and harness stores in Colorado, has made an assignment to the Colorado National Bank. No statements of assets and liabilities have been given.

Ex Senator Stephen W. Dorsey has raised in London the capital necessary to develop a group of the gold mines, twenty eight miles from Yuma, Cal., in which he is interested. He will erect a 100 stamp mill and employ 400 to 500 men.

Incendiaries fired James Abbott's house at Hamlin, W. Va. Cora his daughter, aged twenty, was burned to death. She was recently acquitted for alleged blowing up of Squire Vance's house with dynamite, killing one and injuring others.

The three story wooden factory occupied by the Deer's Horn Comb Company, located about a mile and a half from Clinton, Mass., was destroyed by fire, loss, \$30,000.

Sheriff Holman, of Richmond, Mo., dispersed a mob of 600 men, who demanded the surrender of Jesse Wimer and son Lucky, the alleged murderers of Mrs. Wimer and her two children. The prisoners have been found over to await the action of the Grand Jury.

Gov. Morton, of New York, has issued papers of requisition upon Gov. Altgeld, of Illinois, for the person of the alleged forger, Peters, who is now under arrest at Chicago with being one of a gang of expert forgers who have worked nearly every city in the country.

The body of a man believed to be William E. Lambert, of Lynn, at one time a member of the Chicago and Boston baseball teams, was found on Franklin Square, Boston, and in the pockets the police found a note which announced that it was the writer's intention to poison himself.

John Rogers, a coachman, employed by Richard Brantley, at White Plains, N. Y., killed William Smith, a man who worked about the place, during Monday night, and after attempting to kill Henry Wells, coachman for Gustav Brantley, blew out his own brains with a shotgun, the weapon with which he slew Smith. Rogers was insane.

Alonso J. Whiteman, ex-Mayor of Duluth, legislator and prominent citizen of Minnesota, who was convicted of forgery and sentenced to San Quentin, went north Monday a free man from Judge Wallace's court, in San Francisco. Superior Judge Wallace dismissed the three indictments against him at his own request, and a most interesting case was brought to an end.
