STATE NEWS ITEMS.

MORE CERTIFIED CAMPAIGN EXPENSE ACCOUNTS.

Large Majorities For Elected State Officers. To Consider Coast Fortifications. Republican Vote Count Big For Populists.

RALEIGH, November 13.—Among today's arrivals is Mr. R. P. Williams, of New Berne. Richmond Pearson certified to his campaign expense account, today, as being \$1,530. This is the largest amount thus far certified to.

Pearson says that he has made a careful calculation of the majority for Ayer, Worth and Cy Thompson and that it approximates seventy thousand. The Governor of Florida asks Governor Carr to appoint delegates to the convention to consider the matter of fortifying the ports on the Gulf of Mexico. It is asserted that less than four thousand votes were cast by the Populists for the Republican Congressional candidates, while the Republicans cast about fifty-five thousand votes for the five Populist Congressional nominees.

Republican Headquarters.
CLEVELAND, Ohio, November 13.—Mark Hanna said today that permanent Republican headquarters would be established at Washington, D. C. That the Chicago headquarters would be closed within a week, and the New York headquarters by January 1, 1897.

South Dakota for Bryan.
STOUT FALLS, S. D., November 13.—W. J. Bryan carried this State by four hundred.

Plurality in Kansas.
TOPEKA, Kan., November 13.—W. J. Bryan's plurality in Kansas is twelve thousand.

Bradstreet's Weekly Report.
NEW YORK, November 13.—Bradstreet's weekly trade review says: The volume of business improves slowly in nearly all lines. The most active demand is among jobbers in dry goods, millinery, clothing, shoes, leather, hardware in the leading industrial lines. Two hundred mills, manufactories and foundries have opened, and thirty thousand men given employment. The demand for iron and steel has not increased. Cotton goods are firm at unchanged prices. Wool is higher. Collections in the Western and Southern States is easier. Jobbers report an increase in their mail orders from the West. Bank clearings have increased 20 per cent.

NEW ORDER OF THINGS.

Recognition of the Monroe Doctrine Still a Topic of Discussion in Europe.

LONDON.—The Speaker publishes an article by "A Leading Publicist," in which the writer, after recalling Lord Salisbury's reply to Secretary Olney in regard to Monroism, says: "An entirely new order of things has been established by the Anglo-American understanding. Mr. Olney's extension of the Monroe doctrine itself, not before acknowledged by any European power, has now received the sanction of Great Britain. But it would be profitless as well as somewhat painful to touch upon this delicate ground. What had to be done had to be done, and that in the long and the short of it. We may not like it, but there ought to be no difficulty in choosing between the absurdity of complaining over the inevitable and the dignity of smiling acquiescence. The British government is perfectly right now without being wrong six or ten months ago. It is exact in a case of our policy of staying off as long as possible the dominations of Russia now so complete. To continue that policy when the game is up would be merely to cling to antiquated superstitions and antiquated diplomacy."

PARIS.—The Temps expresses itself as being greatly concerned at the "enormous extension of Monroism involved in the Anglo-American entente, adding: It confers upon America the right to settle any difference between an American State and a European power without the authority of the American State itself. This is a big innovation in international law, and endows the United States with absolute supremacy in their hemisphere. It must be a bitter pill to British pride to consent to this." In conclusion, the Temps expresses a doubt as to whether Europe will accept this agreement as a precedent.

San Francisco's food inspection stations were opened Wednesday night. There are four of them, erected at a cost of \$11,000. All provisions brought to market in the city must pass inspection at one of these stations.

THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

Wheat Makes Another Record. Stocks Decline on Cuban War News.
NEW YORK, November 13.—Wheat made a new record in this market today, selling at 91 1/2 cents. But the Cuban war news forced the local stock market down, and there was a rush to sell, which made the trade in stocks very excited.

Sugar Trust led the decline. Brokers were badly mixed on the situation. Realization sales of long stocks were large.

Tired of Being Advertised.
CANTON, O., November 13.—Major McKinley is manifesting a decided aversion to the advertising which Mark Hanna has been receiving in the East.

Hanna has been heralded as the parent of the next administration, and this announcement has stirred the ire of McKinley, who refused to attend the banquet to be given by the Union Club next Monday, in honor of Hanna.

The Cuban Version.
ST. LOUIS, Mo.,—A special to the Globe Democrat from Key West, Fla., says: "Captain General Weyler has at last met the Cubans on the field, and has suffered a repulse, according to the advice per steamer Oliveira, from Havana."

Weyler, it is said, was attacked while encamped in the Gobernadora hills, in Pinar del Rio province, by the Cubans under Perico Delgado and Perico Diaz. The Cubans surprised the Spanish out posts and for a time great confusion prevailed in Weyler's camp. Weyler is said to have fallen back about eight miles. During the retreat the Cubans killed 24 Spaniards and wounded 60 others.

Fight With Mexicans.
DALLAS, Texas.—Deputy United States Marshal Erwin arrived with a wounded Mexican prisoner named Hoses Cardenas, captured in a fight last Saturday in Childress county, in the Texas Pan Handle.

Marshal Erwin, the sheriff of Childress county, and a posse attacked five Mexicans who had stolen fifty head of horses in Oklahoma, and who had killed two men and committed a number of highway robberies in New Mexico and Colorado. In the fight two of the Mexicans were killed and one wounded, and two of the Childress county posse wounded. Two of the Mexicans escaped.

Ties Had Been Spilt.
MONTGOMERY, Ala.—The fast mail of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad for New Orleans, leaving here at 9:30 was wrecked when four miles from town, but fortunately no one was killed.

The engine, mail, baggage, express, smoker and one sleeper left the rails. The mail car was shot at least fifty feet from the track but landed right side up, and even the lights were not extinguished. The smoking car was thrown down the embankment and rolled over on its side. It was in this car the only damage was done. J. P. Latham, of Atlanta, was caught by the legs, and W. C. McCarrey, of Monroeville, Ala., by the arm. Each had to be cut out. These two were the most seriously hurt of any and their injuries are not dangerous. A number of others were slightly bruised. The cross ties had been split so as to get the spikes out and the rail moved in about three inches so that when the engine struck it the flange for the driver rods the rail.

THE COTTON MARKETS.

November 13.
The spot sales in Liverpool were only 10,000 and the general tone of business was quiet. Futures were about 1/2 point higher. In New York this has been quite a consistent day. January opened at 7.99 the same as yesterday's close and has had a declining tendency all day, finally closing at 7.78 a net decline of 21 points. Just what caused all this weakness is not yet known to this writer, but no doubt the heavy receipts, and the Cuban war news were the principal factors. New Berne market has been quiet at 7 to 7.50.

The Texas Investigation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 13.—The inquiry at the Brooklyn Navy Yard which was made behind closed doors, looking into the circumstances under which the warship Texas was sunk, has brought to light the fact that her bulkheads were seriously defective.

Rumors But no Truth.
WASHINGTON, D. C., November 13.—The Spanish Minister denies that there is any foundation for the supposed notes of Minister Taylor to the Spanish government. There is not the slightest foundation for the rumors, and he attributes them to filibustering rumors.

Gov. Atkinson Retires.
ATLANTA, Ga., November 13.—Gov. Atkinson this afternoon announced his retirement from the Senatorial race. This leaves the contest between Clay and Howell.

Telegraphic Items.
At the ninth annual commemoration of the execution of the Haymarket bomb throwers, held in Chicago Wednesday night, Mrs. Lucy Parsons was one of the speakers. Her language soon became violent and she was led from the stage by the police. Herr Most followed in very tame speech.

County Treasurer Burrus, who was injured in the reviewing stand accident at Burlington, Iowa, together with Vice President Stevenson and others on Governor's day of the Iowa semi-centennial celebration, died Wednesday night of his injuries. He was about 50 years old and highly respected.

The Federal Grand Jury of Kansas City, Mo., has indicted Frank Hudson, Arthur S. Kimberly and William J. McCarry, respectively president, treasurer and secretary of the Hudson-Kimberly Printing Company, for distributing advertising cards on which had been stamped the imprint of a \$20 gold piece.

It has been the custom to send liquor in jugs to express offices in the different Kansas towns and to send by mail to the purchaser an order on the express company for the liquor. A decision just rendered in the United States Court precludes these transactions unless the wholesaler shall first secure a retail license for the town to which the liquor is sent.

Thirteen members of the Salt Lake (Utah) Coal Exchange have been found guilty in the United States District Court. They were charged and indicted by the Grand Jury for combining to prevent persons not members of the exchange from obtaining coal at prices as low as were made to members of the exchange in order to destroy competition. The case was before Judge Hallett.

A burglar, name unknown, was shot dead while resisting arrest at Elba, Gosport county, N. Y. His companion, George Stevens, was wounded, and surrendered. The burglars were detected trying to rob W. A. Hundreback's general store. The proprietor called out a number of citizens, and a battle ensued with the burglars, in which numerous shots were exchanged.
