**Russell's Plurality, 10,000.**

RALEIGH, N. C., November 23.—Republicans have official returns of the vote of the State Ticket from all but five counties and they say these show that Russell's plurality for Governor will certainly reach ten thousand.

**Refuses to Discuss.**

NEW YORK, November 23.—General Alger, of Michigan, arrived here, today, he refuses to discuss his chances of becoming a member of President McKinley's cabinet, but says there is a decided change for better business in the West.

**Pops Will Not Vote For Pritchard.**

RALEIGH, N. C., November 23.—A prominent Populist says he wrote to the twelve Populist members elect of the legislature whom the Republicans have asserted would vote for the re-election of Pritchard for U. S. Senator, asking them if it was true, and that he has replies from seven of them saying they would not support him.

**The Incoming Congress.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 23.—The order of business for the coming Congress as agreed upon, provides first for restriction of immigration, a measure to that end being immediately passed. Members who are arriving expect little save routine business for the coming session. They don't think the Dingley bill will be considered. It is expected that McKinley will call an extra session in March for this purpose.

**Spanish Spies.**

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., November 23.—Several new spies have been detected at the sea front near Moro Castle, Havana. Two Spanish spies have arrived here and are studying our fortifications.

**Ten Wrecked By Insurgents.**

HAVANA, November 23.—The insurgents have dynamited a pilot train near Corriera, upsetting the same and burning the cars. A passenger train which followed was fired upon.

**Stocks Dull.**

NEW YORK, November 23.—The stock market opened dull and was spiritless during the day.

**Weyler Falling Back.**  
KEY WEST, Fla.—Weyler has failed in his campaign against Maceo. Though no accurate data is available as to the latter's movements, all reports agree that he has divided his forces into small bands who harass Spanish troops but present no chance for pitched battles or decisive results. Weyler's matches have been exhausted and his soldiers have suffered from hardship. In consequence 1,000 soldiers have been sent to Cuba for sick. Most of Weyler's staff are ill and are returning to Havana. The Spaniards in Havana are indignant at Weyler's inability to crush the insurgents in Pinar del Rio and mutterings are heard. All are despondent in Havana and consider the outlook gloomy.

The important town of Victoria de las Tapes, in Santiago province, is besieged by a strong force of insurgents. The train starting from Cardenas Sunday was obliged to return on account of large masses of rebels crossing the line. They are said to be the vanguard of Gomez, who is reported already in Santa Clara province marching west.

**Two New Federal Judges.**  
WASHINGTON—The President has appointed William D. McHugh United States District Judge for the district of Nebraska, and Andrew Kirkpatrick to the United States District Judge for the district of New Jersey.

**Otoe Indian Lands.**  
WASHINGTON, D. C.—The long pending case between certain settlers in Kansas and Nebraska and the Otoe and Missouri Indians, the lands of the latter being purchased by the settlers and never paid for, seems no nearer solution than when they were bought. Bad crops, it was claimed, prevented the settlers from meeting their obligations to the Indians. From time to time they have made concessions to the settlers, but the latter have failed to pay.

The last proposition of the Indians was that the settlers were to pay the remainder due, about \$250,000 and interest, within one year. The settlers now make a counter proposition. They bought these lands during the boom time and agreed to pay high prices for them, but now want to pay the value appraised by the government, with interest at 5 per cent. per annum from the date of sale, instead of the price agreed upon by them, when the various tracts were sold at public auction. They claim that the official who ordered the lands sold at public sale was acting contrary to the law under which all ceded Indian reservations are disposed of and therefore the agreement to pay the higher price was null and void.

**Enormous Expenditure for Fertilizers.**

RALEIGH, N. C., November 23.—State Treasurer Worth reports today that during the fiscal year beginning December 1st, last, the enormous amount of 151,666 tons of commercial fertilizers had been bought by North Carolina farmers and that at the average price of \$22.50 per ton the cost is \$3,412,485. The Treasurer also says that nearly all this amount is for fertilizers made outside of the State.

**Cruiser Marblehead Returns.**

NEW YORK, November 23.—The Cruiser Marblehead arrived from Smyrna India this afternoon where it was relieved by Hancock. She brought a number of sailors from the San Francisco and Minneapolis whose enlistments have expired.

**Another Bank Officer Gone Wrong.**

LEBANON, Pa., November 23.—John J. H. Est, Cashier of the First National Bank of this city is under surveillance at his home, it is alleged that he is short a hundred and nine thousand dollars, which he lost through speculation.

**Scores a Victory in London.**  
LONDON.—The judicial committee of the privy council has allowed an appeal with costs to the Edison Electric Company against the Westminster and Vancouver Tramway Companies, the Bank of British Columbia, and others. The Edison Company appealed against the decision of the Supreme court of British Columbia granting a judgment in favor of the Bank of British Columbia against the tram companies to the prejudice of the Edison company, who are creditors of the tramways. The decision of the judicial committee of the privy council declares the judgment of the Supreme court of British Columbia against the tramways to be null.

**Mining Towns Without Food.**  
SEATTLE, Wash.—The Post Office authorities announced that but one Eastern mail had been received in Seattle since the 15th inst. That one mail in quantity, got in Tuesday morning. Owing to the complete isolation of the Great Northern and Everett and Monte Cristo Railroads there is to be a serious food famine in the mining towns of the coast district. Mr. J. C. Cook, a merchant of Sultan, says, who is now here, that it had all to be done.

A special dispatch from Spokane says: "The first party of 200 miners who left Monte Cristo early this week to walk out to the lower town reached here Thursday. The reason for this wholesale exodus of miners is a lack of provisions in the mountain stores. From the reports of the condition of the Everett and Monte Cristo Railroad, it is evident that it will be three weeks before a train can reach Monte Cristo. All the big mines at Silverton, Goat Lake, and Monte Cristo have sent out their men until the railroad could bring in more provisions."

**Telegraphic Items.**  
San Francisco, Cal.—The whaling steamer Beluga arrived from the north with the largest catch of the season. She had twenty-three whales, 37,000 pounds of bone and 730 barrels of oil.  
Port Morris, N. J.—The planters and shippers of the Maurice River Cove oysters report that the present season's crop is nearly exhausted.

Martinsville, Ind.—H. M. Wellman's daughter was burned to death near Wakarusa, her clothes having ignited while she was building a fire. Mrs. John Peters, only six months married, was fatally injured by falling into a fire place.  
Guthrie, Oklahoma.—Deputy United States Marshal, brought to this city and lodged in the Federal jail George Lanes, the half-breed desperado, who led the revolt at the United States jail on July 4 last, which resulted in the escape of fourteen prisoners, including himself, "But" Doolin, and "Dynamite" Dick.

Lancaster, Penn.—Bertha McConnell, the young woman who shot her paramour, H. D. Thompson, in this city, last March, and then shot herself, neither shots, however, proving fatal, was convicted of felonious assault and battery, and sentenced to pay a fine of \$1,000 and to undergo five years' imprisonment.
