NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST.

Penitentiary Shows Up Well. A. & M. College, Republican Daily Paper at Raleigh, Association to Aid Common Schools.

RALEIGH, Dec. 3.—The Penitentiary makes a fine showing. It has cost the State nothing this year.

John Simms, of Cabarrus county, will be Auditor Hal Ayer's chief clerk. This is the only appointment yet announced.

The Board of Agriculture examined the Agricultural and Mechanical College to day. It reports the attendance the largest on record. In preparation and students as in their personnel it is much better.

A Republican daily paper will be started here in January and will be a permanent fixture, it is said.

Several of the presidents of Christian Colleges met here to day and formed an association which is intended to include all of the twenty of such Colleges in the State, and its object is to be, it is asserted, to aid the common schools of the State by urging the legislature to make an appropriation for keeping them open for four months in each year.

A Kentucky Feud.

LEXINGTON, KY., Dec 3.—In a fight between old man Harris and his two sons on one side, and Morgan and his two sons, Tom and Caleb, on the other, the result being the death of the elder Morgan, and both of his sons are dying.

Outlook Still Gloomy.

CHIPPEWA FALLS, Wis., December 3.—The thermometer is hanging about zero, and the flood is still rising. The outlook for the valley is very gloomy.

South America Their Field.

NEW YORK.—The Pacific Company, with a capital of \$20,000,000, owned by some of the most substantial businessmen and financiers of this city, has been formed for the purpose of bringing the Latin American countries of South America into closer business relations with the United States.

The undertaking is a purely commercial enterprise, the new company planning to do shipping and mercantile business on the Pacific coast and develop mine and other properties in the southern hemisphere.

Telegraphic Items.

The fire in the mines of the Gilson Asphaltum Company, at Fort Cleane, in Utah, has been extinguished.

President Cooper, of the California Fruit Growers Association, urges further importation of lady bugs from Australia to destroy insect pests. He says the annual loss by insect pests in the United States is over \$3,000,000.

All records as to receipts at the Kansas City stock yards were broken Tuesday when 1,000 carloads of live stock were received. This beats all previous records by 139 carloads. There were received 46,607 animals.

Expert crackmen blew the safe open in the jewelry store of H. Hirschberg, Omaha, Neb., and got away with \$5,000 in diamonds and cash. The place is located in the heart of the business district of the city.

The new twin screw steel yacht Varuna owned by Eugene Higgins, arrived at New York from Greenock after a very rough passage. The Varuna was built on the Clyde by A. and J. Inglis from designs by G. L. Watson.

Judge W. L. Cundiff, one of the most prominent lawyers in Oklahoma Territory, has been committed to the Norman Insane Asylum. He has become crazed over politics. Cundiff is a personal friend of W. J. Bryan, and nominated the latter for Congress the first time.

Steps have been taken toward a consolidation of the Mennonite and Amish religious denominations in the United States and Canada. The aims and objects of the two denominations are similar, and the proposed amalgamation will unite in one body two powerful religious sects.

Judge Danbar, in the Superior Court at Boston appointed Alfred B. Chandler temporary receiver of the Arena Publishing Company. The company publishes the Arena Magazine, which, for several years has been edited by B. O. Flower. The authorized capital of the company is \$100,000 and its liabilities are about \$85,000.

A natural gas explosion at Mountville, W. Va. Tuesday night, followed by fire, totally destroyed the \$10,000 dwelling of Mr. V. A. Weaver, Mrs. Weaver, her six months' baby and four-year-old son, was blown from a second-story window into the front yard, with no harm to the baby. The servant girl at the back kitchen door was blown across a log, and the plumber, whose carelessness caused the explosion, came off with a few scratches.

Favors a High Tariff.

CANTON, O., December 3.—Senator Thurston, who represented the McKinley tariff in the debates in Congress, was here today, and said he favored a high tariff, and would work for it to that end.

Half Million Dollar Fire.

OTTAWA, Ont., December 3.—Holbrook the clothier, MacDonald Bros. furniture, the Masonic Hall, C. Ross, dry goods, were destroyed by fire, today, the loss being \$500,000.

Judge Russell's Inauguration.

RALEIGH, N. C., December 3.—Judge Russell desires his inauguration to be quiet, and to consist only of his taking the oath, and perhaps making a few remarks and then sending message to the Legislature.

Played With Matches.

CHICAGO.—Four children locked in a house at 1216 Fifty-third avenue were smothered to death during a fire in a pile of clothing in the room where they were all playing. Mrs. Mary Barth, the mother, left the house to go to the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway yards to pick coal, locking the door behind her. The children, Joseph, six years, Rosie, four years, John, two years, and Louis, one year old, were playing in the living room.

During the absence of the mother they secured a box of matches and it is supposed ignited the clothing in their play. The curtains over the only window in the room were burned and the cemented were scorched.

The distracted mother returned two hours later to find the house filled with smoke. The heap of burned clothing was still smoldering and the bodies of the little ones were lying on the floor. An empty bucket was near by, indicating that an attempt had been made to extinguish the blaze.

Unable to open doors, or windows, and having exhausted the supply of water in the house, the four children were overcome in the dense smoke that filled the whole house and were dead before assistance came.

Madrid Crisis Rumor.

WASHINGTON, D. C., December 3.—Respecting the rumors of a cabinet crisis at Madrid, it is regarded in official circles here as not unlikely that one or two members of the cabinet might retire, but this act would be in no sense significant.

If Senor Canovas, the Spanish premier, or the Duke of Tetan, the minister of foreign affairs, or Senor Ascarage, the minister of war, should resign that would be regarded as significant, and grave consequences might follow.

It is authoritatively stated, however, that each of these gentlemen is not only well satisfied to remain in the cabinet and continue the present policy of the government, but that they are equally acceptable to the Spanish people with whom they are not only popular but highly esteemed as well.

A Ship at Germany.

Lower Freights on Cotton Wad Fed.

St. Louis, Mo.—At a meeting of the directors of the St. Louis Cotton Exchange it was decided to make a fight for the reduction of freight rates on cotton from the Southwest to this city. A meeting of merchants, manufacturers and bankers has been called to discuss general freight rates affecting St. Louis. The cotton men say cotton has to bear the brunt of the operating expenses of the railroads that tap the Southwest, the rate being fully double that for any other commodity of like value.


