WASHINGTON NEWS.

ELECTORAL VOTES BEING PRESENTED.

Secretary Francis' Confirmation. In several Preparations. Ways and Means Committee Work. Senator Sherman For the Cabinet.

Washington, D. C., January 14, '97.—It is not yet certain whether the silver Democrats and their allies will insist on holding up Francis' nomination until the expiration of his term, but it is plain that so far as the Missouri Senators are concerned they are quite willing that it should remain suspended in the air.

Notwithstanding the attitude of the Missouri Senators, and the fact that they are supported by other silver Senators, it is probable that Mr. Francis will be confirmed. This is owing to the fact that several prominent silver men believe that the President's right of selection of his own advisers should not be questioned by the Senate. But their attitude in the matter of Mr. Francis' confirmation does not imply any alteration of purpose in the determination to defeat all the gold men named for Federal places to succeed silver men removed for their fealty to the regular ticket.

The electoral votes of Maryland and North Carolina were presented to the Vice President by the special messengers from those States. The messengers from North Carolina, Locke Craig, had the satisfaction of filing the report of the first Bryan electors.

The Maryland messenger was introduced to a number of prominent Senators by Senator-elect Wellington, but neither Senator Gorman nor Senator Gibson exhibited the least interest in the messenger, personally, or in his feat of depositing Maryland's first Republican electoral votes in a third of a century. Senator Chandler's little plan to create a Republican majority in the new Senate by reviving the defunct Dayton contest carries with it little prospect of success. Dupont and his friends assert that as the Senate is a continuous body it can reconsider the action of last May, by which Dupont was declared not entitled to a seat. Good Senate authorities regard it as settled by precedent that when a Senator's title to a seat is once passed upon it is a final determination of the question.

However, it was the almost universal desire of the individual members of the guard to be accorded the privilege of participating in the inaugural ceremonies as in former years. Particularly was this so as the personnel of the guard has largely changed during the past four and eight years.

For this reason other plans have been devised to bring on the guard, which will insure their attendance in thousands and which will add materially to the spectacular appearance of the parade. Plans for their accommodation have been going on for some days, and are now understood to be completed as well as for their equipment.

Chairman Wright of the public comfort committee reports that he has already secured places where 30,000 visitors can be accommodated during inauguration week, as well as provision for the service of 8,000 extra meals per day.

The Pennsylvania National Guards, or at least a large number of them, will attend the inauguration, it can be said with certainty.

Notwithstanding the fact that Governor Hastings gave out a lengthy statement last week, which seemed to throw cold water upon the prospects of the participation of the Guard, it is the general impression that from eight to ten thousand of them will be here, and Maj. Penny states that arrangements have been made to this end.

It is said that the State has no fund out of which to pay the expenses of the guard on the trip, and in view of the enormous majority given the Republican candidates in Pennsylvania the official thought that the breaking off of the practice of sending the Pennsylvania National Guard to Washington on inauguration could not possibly be construed to have any political significance.

The Ways and Means committee has begun its sittings. It proposes to finish its bill by the first of April. To do it it will be necessary to burn midnight oil and consume more or less enthusiasm. Oil is cheap and enthusiasm plenty among the younger politicians of the committee.

It is the intention to take up schedules after schedule until the bill is finished. The committee will go on sitting after March 4. It will continue up to the meeting of the extra session. The day after the new Ways and Means Committee is appointed the Dingley tariff bill will be presented.

The hearings which have been held for the past three weeks were of some importance. They have helped determine in a general way what the Dingley bill shall be. No one imagines for a moment that any special attention was paid to any of the recommendations made by friends of particular interests. It is only in their general views that the members of the committee were affected.

Senator Sherman declines absolutely to discuss the Cabinet group connected with him with the portfolio of the State Department.

He even goes so far as to refuse to answer the question whether he was going to Ohio to confer with President-elect McKinley.

It is understood from another source, however, that Mr. Sherman will leave the latter part of this week, certainly

THE STATE CAPITAL.

The Assembly's Work. Comments Regarding Capital Club Reception. Gubernatorial Discontent.

JOURNAL BUREAU, RALEIGH, N. C., Jan. 14, 1897. In the Senate on Wednesday bills as follows were introduced: To establish reasonable rates on railroads, telegraph and telephone lines; to establish uniform standard of time in N. C.; to amend the school laws of the State; by Mr. McCarry a resolution allowing the judiciary committee a clerk.

In the House Dr. Dixon's bill in regard to the reform school, provides for the discipline training and education of youthful criminals and provides for an appropriation of \$10,000 for each race for the first 2 years, and the purchase of from 300 to 600 acres of land for farming purposes.

A resolution to pay the Arrington Committee was tabled by a unanimous vote. Thus Campbell, of Cherokee; Phillips, of Chatham, and Parnell, of Raleigh will get no money.

Sutton of New Hanover, offered a resolution to print 10,000 copies of Governor Russell's message. It caused a lively debate and was referred to the Finance Committee.

The House will adjourn at 10 o'clock Saturday until 4 p. m. Monday so that the Hall can be thoroughly cleaned. So many members are sick it was decided it came from the carpet.

Gov. Russell did not come to the Executive office at all yesterday.

There is much comment pro and con of the Capital Club reception to Governor Russell, also of the actions of Governor Carr upon retiring from and of Governor Russell upon entering the Executive office. That Governor Carr was, all along treated with discourtesy no one should blame him.

At Mrs. Cheshire's funeral there were the four ministers here—the minister from Charlotte, Scotland Neck, Goldsboro and Henderson. Dr. Marshall, of Christ Church here was not sufficiently recovered from his attack of Sunday to be able to attend. He is not so well to-day.

The majority Populists have asked the Republicans to caucus and say whether they will co-operate with them or with the minority caucus. An answer will be given tonight, of course this means much wire pulling today. Pritchard's fall will be decided then.

Auditor Ayer says if the Republicans side with the minority Populists, that hereafter they will find that the whole force of the majority Populist will be against them. Congressman Settle, Republican, considers Pritchard so sure that he will return to Washington tonight.

Rain has begun and the snow is rapidly disappearing.

Telegraph Items.

During a wrestling match at Port Griffith, Pa., John Kayser, one of the contestants, plunged a knife into Joseph Kowitzer's neck. The latter fell dead on the spot.

Five children were drowned at St. Louis while skating on thin ice, which gave way. John Gleason, aged fifteen, attempted a rescue, and nearly lost his life. He is in a serious condition.

George Kilo committed suicide at Menominee, Wis., by placing his head under the wheels of a locomotive. He was a bookkeeper for a prominent firm. Domestic troubles and a shortage are hinted at.

John W. Glover and Harry Glover, contractors, and T. A. Degarmo and John W. Shriver were killed by the explosion of thirty-five pounds of giant powder in the Adis Mining Company's tunnel, near Ward, Col., Tuesday night.

Joseph Burkhardt, a well-to-do Edwardsville, Ill., contractor and builder, shot and killed his wife and then committed suicide. The husband built a new residence and because the plans were not to her liking, his wife declined to live in it.

The Roentgen X ray was used in court at Wapello, Iowa, for the first time in Iowa as evidence in a case against Dr. Overholt, whom Patrick Tobin, a farmer, charged with malpractice in setting a broken limb. A radiograph produced showed a misjointing of the fracture.

Harry Ferguson, postmaster, and P. F. Hoop, money order clerk, at Colorado Springs, Col., have been arrested, charged with the embezzlement of government money. It is claimed the embezzlement has been going on for three years, and that Ferguson is short \$5,000 and Hoop \$8,000.

Raleigh, N. C., January 14.—The Grand Lodge of Masons adjourned today. The portrait of B. N. Duke, Esq., was ordered to be placed in the Duke Building, at the Oxford Orphan Asylum, and the annual meeting to be held at Oxford. The officers were installed. Walter E. Moore is Grand Master.

Hal Ayer resigns as the Populist State Chairman, and W. E. Fountain, of Tarboro succeeds him.

Oliver H. Dockery and Governor Russell adjusted their differences today.

The Populist State Committeemen declare that if the Republicans desire to deal with the bolting Populists they must understand that in the future they must fight alone, so far as the Populists are concerned.

Populist majority is in caucus tonight. Republicans are worried at its demand made last night.
