POPULIST NOMINATION

OF CY THOMPSON TERMED A BOMBSHELL.

Will Democrats Vote For a Populist. Colored Legislators Want Recognition. The Grip Spore. Water Works Ownership.

Matters were at fever heat here today so far as the Senatorial contest is concerned. The nomination of Cy Thompson for Senator by the Populist majority caucus last night was a bold stroke. Dr. Mott terms it a bombshell.

The remark was made to your correspondent last week by Dr. Mott that in every calculation of the Senatorial matter the Democrats always entered as an important element. He spoke wisely. Today Populists and Republicans are asking the question: "Will the Democrats vote solidly for Thompson?" The Democrats in the caucus last week unanimously voted to support any good silver man named by the Populists. That was a masterful stroke. The Democrats hold the key to the situation. They are the balance of power.

Republicans were today declaring that some Democrats would not vote for Thompson. The Democrats when asked this, said no one had the right to make the assertion.

The fight for supremacy between Butler and Pritchard has almost reached its highest point. The Republicans were wrong to have Congressman Skinner as their Populist conductor and worker. They also erred in allowing the Populist bolters to bolt too soon. The bolter ought not, according to good politics, to have occurred until next Monday evening. The Populists have had two days to work on the 19 Populist bolters and 5 of them have already returned to the Populist caucus. Two more will do so, McCaskey and Fagan.

It is said Representative Brower, Republican, will not vote for Pritchard for Senator, but will vote for some pronounced gold man. Brower has all along hoped the Senatorial lightning would strike him.

The legislative joint committee to investigate the charges of bribing and fraud in connection with the Senatorial contest is appointed. Schuelken, Lusk and Nelson, (one of each party) from the House committee.

The fact that today the colored members of the legislature, ten in number, had a meeting and agreed not to go for Pritchard unless something substantial was done for them. They declared that they saw white Republicans pouring in here, to get the patronage and that it was their duty to look out for themselves.

John C. Dancy, an influential negro Republican, got wired of their movement and hurried here. It is said by the person who gives this bit of news that as Dancy's suggestion Senator Pritchard hauled up the negro members and that they signed an agreement to support him upon his promise that some North Carolina negro should get the big paying position of recorder of deeds of the District of Columbia.

The House and the Senate were in session only ten minutes today, giving way to an army of carpet cleaners and renovators. The idea got a footing in the minds of the members (or some of them) that the carpets were full of grippe microbes. So the carpets are being treated with a solution of bichloride of mercury which the legislature experts declare will kill the impalpable germs. Ex-member Campbell of Cherokee electrified a lot of the members by declaring last night that he would take a lot of able-bodied negroes and ship them overseas to death in a few minutes. When asked to tell how large the microbes were, he said they were about the size of rats.

The Speaker of House has appointed the quarter number of the committee, but active legislative work will not begin until next Tuesday, when the Senatorial vote will be taken.

Republicans are asserting today that it is Senator Butler's earnest desire to have a dead lock in this Senatorial matter and prevent an election. They say he and Cy Thompson are both from the west and that Thompson will in 1900 overthrow Butler. They also say that if Butler's plans succeed there will be permanent out of session of Republicans and Populists, and that the Democrats will have about one-third of the office out of the general wreck.

The Republicans say they wish to know whether all the majority of the Populists will abide firmly by the caucus and vote for Thompson.

Several persons from this city were at Fayetteville today to attend the funeral of the venerable Rev. Dr. Joseph C. Hulse, Bishop Watson of the Diocese of East Carolina, officiated. Many of the clergy were present.

The municipal ownership of water, sewerage, and lighting franchises which all great cities enjoy, is beginning to be seen in this State. The city of Charlotte has purchased and now owns and operates the water supply. Wilmington is negotiating the leasing of a sewerage system to be owned by the city, and also talking about better water.

A STARTLING DECLARATION.

Harris of Hyde denies that he has left the bolters and says he will certainly vote for Pritchard.

Republicans now count on 5 majority for Senator Pritchard.

ASSEMBLY PROCEEDINGS.

Yesterday a Short Session. Committees Appointed and Additions Made.

The house met at 9.50 and Representative Lawhorn prayed. Only 2 bills were introduced; those being of no importance. The session lasted barely 10 minutes and there was an adjournment until 4 p. m. Monday, in order that the bill might be cleared of microbes.

Speaker Fite announced the following committees, Insurance: White of Randolph, Fagan; Price, Pool, Allen, Harris of Halifax, Cunningham, Lawhorn, Eddins.

Fish interests: Hancock, Duncan, Sabbit, Pool, Hodges, Alexander, Parker, of Perquimans, Harris of Hyde, Elliott, Cox, Daniels, Fagan, Routtree, Chapman, Spruill, Dixon, Hare, Burgess, Gallop and Howe.

To investigate charges of fraud in Senatorial election: Schuelken, Lusk and Nelson.

Additions to committees: McPeters, to Agriculture; Hartness to Judiciary. Duly to privileges and elections, Hartness and Young to insane asylums.

The testimony in the two contested election cases from Mecklenburg county was been filed.

Telegraph Items.

The Iowa Iron Works has paid \$1,800 to the estates of David F. Coby and Joseph A. Hamilton, victims of an explosion on the torpedo boat Ericsson two years ago.

Gov. Adams, of Colorado, is making a personal investigation of the strike situation at Leadville, Colo. It is believed the non-resident militiamen will be withdrawn.

Fire completely destroyed the large plant of the Fox Paper Company, at Zanesville, Ohio. The loss is estimated at \$150,000, of which there is only \$35,000 insurance.

Nearly a whole block of brick buildings in the city square, Milan, Mo., were destroyed by fire. Loss, \$71,000, distributed among fifteen firms. Insurance \$13,500.

Employees of the Golden Rod Manufacturing Company, of Paterson, N. J., manufacturers of silk, to the number of 100 went on strike against a reduction of wages.

A great demonstration has been arranged to take place at Chicago February 23, in celebration of the successful negotiation of the treaty of arbitration, which, it is expected, the Senate will ratify.

Benjamin Gandy and Seabright Berry, both of Gloucester, N. J., were instantly killed by walking in front of an express train on the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad in Philadelphia.

Mag. G. M. Wing Price, Dolan agent at Kansas City, Mo., was found unconscious in his room at the Victoria Hotel, from the effects of an overdose of chloral. He was revived, and says the overdose was accidental.

Prof. Lewis Swift, of Mount Lowe Observatory, California, has received notice that the Royal Astronomical Society of England, has awarded to him the Jackson gold medal in recognition of his astronomical discoveries.

Fire Thursday night destroyed the famous old stone barn opposite General Wayne Hotel, at Barbours, Pa., which had been a familiar landmark for more than a century. Gen. Washington's troops were quartered there on one occasion.

Michael Klerman and Lawrence C. Stoy have been arrested on a charge of embezzling \$5,987 from the Plain and Ornamental Plasterers' Society of New York. Klerman was a member of the board of trustees. Stoy is a keeper in the Tombs. Timothy Sullivan, another member of the board, is accused of complicity in the embezzlement.

January 16. LIVERPOOL is down to \$31.32 1/4 for midling spot cotton which is the lowest point reached this season.

NEW YORK closed at 7c. for March delivery. This is a net decline of 4 1/2 since yesterday.

NEW YORK, January 15, 1897.

DEAR SIR:—The market has declined some from last week's prices, but not on account of any weak development in the situation. At the close of last week the price had advanced because the market had taken on a hopeful aspect which enlisted the sympathy of the local trade, but when these holders tried to realize on Monday, the demand was so limited that a great weakness followed, resulting in a very disappointing market. Since then the prices have not changed materially.

We have heard reports that Eastern mills would resort to short time in order to curtail production as a method of reducing present excessive stocks of goods. Such a condition would not materially affect prices, while foreign trade continues so good. Receipts are now considered by far the most important element affecting the futures of prices.

Between Nell's and two other recent crop estimates, there is such a wide difference as to arouse unusual interest in the outcome of this crop. The movement this week is moderate. The large exports continue and their effect is felt in higher prices at the South, and in the reduction of stocks at interior points.

Market closes at decline of 12 to 15 points from last week's prices. March delivery closes at 7.04.

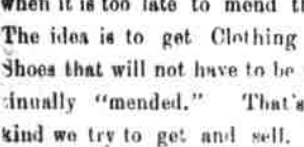
