CRAVEN'S REPRESENTATIVE
ROBT. HANCOCK INTRODUCES IMPORTANT BILLS.
To Permit Vote on Bridge Question. On A. & N. C. R. R. Republicans in Different to Majority's Action. Not Tamman.

RALEIGH, N. C., January 28.—Robert Hancock introduced a bill to allow Craven county people to vote on the bridge question, also a bill which he says is intended to negative the action of the directors of the Atlantic & N. C. Railway in placing that road under the control of the chairman of the Finance committee. The bill introduced provides that if the State's proxy, or Directors do, or fail to do, various things, the Governor shall appoint others, and the latter shall elect the President, to whom the office must be turned over under a thousand dollar penalty, or six months imprisonment.
The Republicans say that they don't care one cent about the action of the majority Populists in covering all cooperation with them, and that ten or fifteen of the Populists majority will not act with the caucus.
Senator Butler's paper says, "We will be d—d if the Populists and niggers can ever co-operate in North Carolina, and the United States."
Senator Pritchard says the Republican party will in two years absorb all the Populists worth having.
The Populist bolters say that they intend to vote as independents.

Telegraph Items.
The lower branch of the Washington State Legislature has passed a bill to prohibit the manufacturer or sale of cigarettes within that State.

The twenty-second national convention of the Railway Mail Service Beneficial Association will be held in San Francisco during the week of March 15.

The boot and shoe departments of the Jockey India Rubber Company at Naugatuck, Conn., will suspend operations indefinitely. Eight hundred hands are thrown out of work.

The jury in the case of Jacob Klen, or trial in Brooklyn for arson, reported a disagreement after having been out nine hours. Klen's counsel will move for his discharge.

John Van Bost the Methodist preacher of Oswego, N. Y., who pleaded guilty to an indictment for felony, was sentenced to Onondaga county penitentiary for eighteen months.

Certain large stockholders of the Metropolitan Traction Company, of New York, acting as individuals and not for the company, have purchased control of the Second Avenue surface line in that city.

Judge J. Powers, of Leadville, Col., has been enjoined by the Colorado Supreme court from presiding at the trial of the Leadville strikers, charged with the O'Keefe murder, on the ground of prejudice.

Mrs. Gertrude Cregier, who, on December 18, killed Charles Anderson, colored, her lover, at Bloomfield, N. J., pleaded guilty to murder in the second degree. She was remanded for sentence.

Kansas City ticket brokers have secured the signatures of a number of wholesale houses to telegrams addressed Congressman to Van Horn and the members of Congress, protesting against the passage of the anti-scalping bill.

Owing to the strike of 250 broad silk weavers in the Phoenix Manufacturing Mills at Paterson, N. J., the other employees of the mills were unable to go to work. Six hundred and fifty hands are out of employment and the mills are closed.

Fire destroyed one of the Island Coal Company's houses at Lincoln, Ind., together with everything belonging to the family. Two children, aged respectively one and three years who had been left alone in the house by the mother, were burned to death.

An explosion in the Smuck mines of Hurst & Co., Uniontown, Pa., killed two miners and injured seven others, three of whom will die. The dead are Peter Houser and Charles McQuister. The explosion was caused by the liberation of a pocket of gas during blasting operations.

The Southern Building and Loan Association, the largest in the world, located at Knoxville, Tenn., has gone into the hands of a receiver. A Supreme court decision adverse to the interests of such associations was the cause. Several other associations in Knoxville are also in the hands of receivers.

A tract of land containing 125 acres has been bought on Point Loma, near San Diego, Cal., upon which it is said, the headquarters of the American Theosophical Society will be located. R. B. Hambo was the purchaser and \$19,000 was the price paid.

In a battle near Brownsville, Ky., between Engene and J. J. Carrier, Nathan Sniggs and Luther Sniggs on one side, and G. W. Haslip, Alfonso Haslip, his son, on the other, G. W. Haslip was shot in the groin and Alfonso in the breast. Nathan Sniggs was shot in the shoulder and a by-stander in the arm. The two Haslips will die. The trouble occurred over alleged betrayal of Carrier's side by Alfonso Haslip.
