**WASHINGTON NEWS.**  
Inauguration the Sole Topic of Conversation.  
Greatest Sight in Display Ever Witnessed. Large Amount Money Contributed. Large Parade. Railroad Traffic.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 17.  
The main topics of conversation in this town these days are the inauguration, and the chances of having pleasant weather on the 4th of March. If this is not the greatest show inauguration this country has ever seen, it will be because those who constitute the committee in charge of the affair are incompetent and not because they haven't money enough. More money has been raised for this inauguration than for any other, and more aid has been received from the Government than was ever given any other inauguration committee. It speaks well for the non-partisanship of Congressmen when a Democratic administration lavishes in its appropriations and favors to the committee in charge of the inauguration of a President of opposite political faith.

Sixty thousand dollars was raised by those in charge, and this helped out by Government aid has enabled the committee to arrange most elaborate and extensive schemes for decorations, illuminations, fire-works and every possible kind of display. There will be the greatest display of flags ever seen in this city. Congress has passed a resolution directing the Secretaries of War and Navy to loan to the inauguration committee, all the flags and emblems which these two departments have in their possession for decorating for the inaugural ceremonies, and these together with the 50,000 flags purchased by the committee for distribution along the line of parade will make a tremendous display of bunting.

All the public buildings are to be brilliantly illuminated by electric lights, and from the roofs of nearby buildings search lights will throw their powerful rays upon them. During the grand army encampment in 1893 powerful search lights were located on the roof of a tall building nearly a mile from the capital and their rays concentrated on first the capitol, and then the tall shaft of the Washington monument and the effect was most beautiful and was one of the features of the illumination at that time. It is now proposed to carry this scheme out on a larger scale so that all the great white public buildings may be made to stand out in the darkness in magnificent glory. The firework display is to be the greatest ever had here and is to be the most costly.

The parade which is to pass in review before President McKinley is to be the greatest in point of military display ever had at any inauguration. General Horace Porter has adopted a schedule which will enable 25,000 an hour to pass before the reviewing stand. Military and civil organizations are to march 24 abreast and are to march in close order. General Porter's experience in handling the monster McKinley parade in New York will enable him to properly handle the 30,000 men expected in line on the 4th of March. One of the unique features of the parade will be the presence of 154 Indians from the several tribes in their own distinctive dress, with all the point and feathers and ornaments they are wont to wear on extraordinary occasions. These are to be followed by the Indian students from the school at Hampton. It is designed in this way to show the great progress made by the young men at the Carlisle schools.

Another interesting feature of the parade will be the blue jackets from the vessels of the White Squadron. Many of these vessels will not be able to reach Washington because of the shallowness of the Potomac river, but they will send their men up to the city on smaller boats. It is a shame that Congress does not provide sufficient funds to keep the river open so that one or more of our best ships could be at the city during an event of this kind when there are so many visitors from the interior who would like to get a sight of one of these 4,000,000,000 machines for which they help to pay.

Civil organizations must number at least 50 in order to secure a stated place in the parade. It is expected that at least 15,000 members of the Republican league clubs will be in line.  
It is expected that there will be at least 125,000 visitors in town during the inauguration and to bring them in and take them home again is no small task for the railroads. From now until after the 5th or 6th of March the traffic will be very great and all trains will be delayed.

**IMPORTANT LEGISLATION**  
Bills for Two State Reformatories Passed.

Reduction Railroad Fares, Telegraph, and Telephone Rates Defeated. Howe Demands Committee to Investigate.  
RALEIGH, N. C., February 17.—The Senate passed by a vote of 41 to 8, a bill to establish two reformatories, one for each race, for youthful criminals. The House tabled by a vote of 57 to 54 the bill reducing railway fares to 14 and 2 cents per mile, also the bill to reduce telegraph and telephone rates. Representative Howe spoke again today about his row with Gov. Russell and demanded a committee to investigate the charges of bribery made against him by Gov. Russell.

Bill introduced today taking away the appropriations to Geological Survey and the University.  
**THE STATE CAPITAL.**  
C. C. Railroad Lease Discussions. Governor's Recent Action. New Paper to Start. Bills Introduced.

RALEIGH, N. C., February 17, 1897.  
Of course on all sides is heard discussion regarding the sale in the House yesterday on the bill to amend the 29 year lease that the Southern has on the N. C. R. R.  
If the bill passes the Senate, as it did in the House, it only gives ground to bring out in the courts, and if they declare the lease annulled. It does not necessarily give the S. A. R. the 29 year lease. It has done for, but only opens the way for other roads besides the Southern to bid for the lease.  
The chances are that the Southern R. R. will bid out bid the Seaboard, thus putting more money in the State Treasury and not changing the working of the road as it now is. How can directors who are only elected or appointed for four years, care property beyond their term of office to a question heard yesterday?

A bill will be introduced today to give the Governor, and not the R. R. commission, power to appoint the clerk to the railroad commission.  
The leading Populists and their Republican friends will shortly start a paper here to be called the "Protagonist."

In the Senate bills were introduced to incorporate the auxiliary Board of Health, also to establish a Board of Steam Locomotive and Boiler inspection for each county of the State; to amend Code relating to foreclosure of trust, and to give suitors time to bring suit after adverse decisions of Supreme Court. To incorporate the Pigford Sanatorium for treatment of the colored consumptives. James and also the bill to keep in force the charter of the Wilmington, Norfolk and Charleston Railroad.  
The reformatory bill was made special order for Wednesday.

The special order for today was to provide for the supervision of Railroads, steamboats, express and telegraph companies. It reduces rates and forbids free passes to public officers. After a long debate it was tabled.  
In the Senate in the afternoon a bill passed to amend the charter of the Raleigh and Gaston R. R. giving them the right to change the route after they get the consent of the R. R. Commission.  
At the session of the House last night the bills giving the Republicans control of the penitentiary, and the Populists control of the Agricultural and Mechanical college passed. The bills were introduced by Duckery (Republican) and he indulged freely in flings at both Populists and Democrats.  
Yesterday Howe (colored) one of the representatives from New Hanover county, Russell's home, was sent for by Gov. Russell. He was asked how he stood on the question of the lease of the N. C. R. R., and replied he was for the lease so far but was open for conviction, and wished to hear what the Governor had to say. Whereupon the Governor forgot the dignity of his office and flying in a rage cursed Howe rudely saying he had been bought by the Southern R. R. Howes on the floor of the House later made the startling statement that Governor Russell was in the pay of the Seaboard Air Line. The thinking of this affair will come later.

The public this winter has been treated to many astounding incidents.  
The next thing that will probably engage the special attention of the Legislature will be the question of the public printing. The extra cost for the last two years is being freely discussed.  
Senator Butler's paper declares the "hush money" is being offered to the regular Populists.
