WASHINGTON NEWS.

Legislation Extra Session to be Confined to Tariff.

Allen's Resolution Passed. Chandler's Words of Wisdom. Richmond Pearson's Sound Speech. Favors Cuba.

JOURNAL BEHAVIOR. WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 19. Speaker Reed's alleged determination to confine the legislation of the extra session to the tariff bill by not naming the committees of the House other than the Ways and Means, Rules, Mileage and Accounts, is not pleasing to many members of the present House who will also be in the next, and hints have been dropped that he may be compelled to name the committee on Appropriation by the failure of one or more of the regular appropriation bills at the present session. Whether these hints have anything substantial behind them must soon be apparent. It is admitted that some of the appropriation bills will have a close shave to get through even with everybody working harmoniously to the end, so that if there are any considerable number who are desirous to have one or more of them fail it will be comparatively easy for them to accomplish their purpose by raising obstacles to delay action, something that skilled parliamentarians can almost always do without resorting to direct filibustering.

The Senate adopted Senator Allen's resolution calling upon the Civil Service Commission for an explanation of the alleged dismissal of two women employees in a branch of the Agricultural department at South Omaha, Nebraska, for no other cause than that they displayed Bryan's pictures in their window during the recent campaign. No Senator opposed the resolution. The first National Congress of Mothers, which was in session in Washington this week, fairly divided honors, so far as public attention was concerned, with the other Congress, and its proceedings were just as important, in the eyes of many, as the eighth annual convention of the Supreme court of the Farmers' Alliance and Industrial Union was also held in Washington this week. Whatever may have been the object of Senator Chandler, who is known to be over friendly towards Maj. McKinley, in making that speech in favor of his resolution declaring the funeralism, all unprejudiced men will admit that his warning to President McKinley contained words of wisdom which are not affected by the motive actuating the speaker. In this warning Mr. Chandler said: "If the Republican party should content itself with seizing and enjoying the spoils of office, surrendering unreservedly to the money power which so effectively contributed to its recent victory, acquiescing permanently to the existing gold standard and treating bimetallicism as a 'juggling humping' and the promise to promote it as a pledge never intended to be fulfilled, Republicans will speedily find the title of political battle once more turned against them and they will soon exchange places with their now score, bleeding, and prostrate foes. To the coming triumphant President, hopeful and overconfident, rejoicing as a strong man to run a race, and to his chosen advisers, soon to challenge all the adverse currents of the future, I cannot help saying warningly concerning the pending world wide controversy over the burning question of money, 'Unsettled questions pay no heed to the repose of nations.' 'Be wise today; 'tis madness to defer.'"

Representative Pearson, of North Carolina, who was elected to Congress as an independent protectionist, made a very warm five minute protest against the waste of money in the appropriation carried by the Sundry Civil bill, which was rushed through the House under suspension of the rules. After calling attention to 37 appropriations for rivers and harbors and 27 for public buildings contained in the bill, Mr. Pearson said: "If I had the opportunity, I would move to strike out the appropriation of \$400,000 fixed in the bill for the improvement of the mouth of the very river upon which I was born, because I know that it is useless and an extravagant appropriation. I certainly would not ask what I proposed by this bill, the sum of \$400,000, for the improvement of Winyaw Bay, S. C. The collector of customs only takes in \$250 a year, and it will be two million years before he will take in enough to pay the amount of the appropriation provided by this bill, which is only a beginning of the outlay." At this point Representative Sawyer interrupted half-jocularly: "Where is Winyaw Bay?" The laughter raised by the question was not subsided before Mr. Pearson promptly replied: "About 8,000 miles from Keweenaw Bay, for which an appropriation of \$400,000 is also made. It is also about a thousand miles from the Yazoo river, which gets \$400,000, and about the same distance from Bayou Plaquemine, in Louisiana, which also gets \$400,000. He closed by naming the members of the committee on River and Harbors, nearly every one of whom, he said, had secured a \$400,000 appropriation for his district or State, although the chairman

RESPECTED HIS MEMORY

Flag at Half Mast For Judge Seymour.

Great Regret Accrual Judge Seymour's Death. Leave Bill Before Special Committee, Monday. New Berne Fair Bill.

RAVENON, N. C., February 19. Great regret is expressed here at Judge A. S. Seymour's death, the flag on the Government building was half masted today out of respect for him. The Senate special committee will hear the North Carolina railway bill this Monday afternoon, and notices President Hoffman of S. A. L., Ex-Governor Carr, Col. A. B. Andrews, President Alexander, and others to be present. The bill to put Greenville under the control of the police board was before the committee this afternoon, and ex-Governor Jarvis argued against it, but the committee will report it favorably. The bill giving Wayne county and Goldsboro a dispensary law passed the senate, today. Representative Hancock, today, tried twice to get the resolution to visit the New Berne Fair upon its 3rd reading, but young, colored Republican, objected.

THE STATE CAPITAL.

Walter R. Henry to Succeed Judge Meares. Hancock's Gas Bill. No vital Items. Legislative Happenings. JOURNAL BEHAVIOR. WASHINGTON, N. C., February 19, 1897. The minority President in their caucus last night named Walter R. Henry of Charlotte for Judge of the Eastern criminal court. The Republicans are hoping a coalition will fall to James E. Boyd of Greensboro. Rev. Sam Jones will lecture here in the interest of the Wall Saving circles of the King's Daughters. The Raleigh caucus club were last night handsomely entertained at Capt. S. A. Ashe's. Mr. Hancock, introduced a bill to raise the price of 1,000 feet the legal price of gas, not to be exceeded, said gas to have 24 can per hour, and requiring gas plant owners to furnish sworn statements as to quality of gas furnished a city or town. The midwinter concert given at Peace institute last night was an elegant one and the big audience fully enjoyed the performance. Gov. Russell says he did not send for Howe to come to his office when he became angry and cursed him. Howe is the negro representative from Russell's county. The Chairman of the House committee on education says the bill appropriating \$100,000 to common schools from the general fund will be unfavorably reported. In the House last night the bill appropriating \$34,500 to the improvements for the white blind asylum was referred to the finance committee. The trustees of the State University yesterday met in regular session and decided to admit as past graduates women to the University. Prof. Tom of Durham was elected Professor of Polology. The revenue bill was prepared today and sent to the finance committee. It levies \$1.25 poll tax; 23 cents State tax for general purposes; 31 cents pensions; 20 cents for public schools; 46 cents on \$100 valuation of real and personal property. The bill is very long and a very important one. Bills to the House on yesterday were: To prohibit Confederate soldiers in the Soldier's Home from drawing pensions; to require all children between the ages of 5 and 14 to attend school to establish the relation of master and servant be-

tween municipal corporations and their employees; to designate as legal holiday: January 1st—19th; February 22, May 10—30; July 4; 1st Monday in September, December 25th and all Saturdays from 12 noon to 12 midnight; to make the Railroad Commission a board for the equalization of all taxes.

In the Senate a committee was appointed to investigate the memorial of the officers of the North Carolina R. R. regarding the lease to the Southern rail road.
