THE STATE CAPITAL.
Only Twenty Working Days Remains.
Anything Which Opposes Democrats. N. C. R. R. Lease Monday. Russell Wants Butler's Place, Not Seymour's.

RALEIGH, N. C., February 20, '97.
Today was the 40th of the legislative session. There yet remains 20 more working days. The rush of business is now sure to be very great. The Republicans are angry and desperate at the delays in putting measures through. Their constituents, particularly their negro constituents are pressing them. A bolting Populist said last night at the session of the house that his line of policy was to do the reverse of anything which the Democrats do. This man is about two removes from an anarchist.

The session of the Senate special committee next Monday afternoon to consider the bill to annul the lease of the N. C. R. R., will attract a great many people. I will expect in interest the noted session of the House committee. The presence of President Hoffman of the S. A. L. will add a new feature.
The president of the North Carolina railroad declares he is more convinced now than ever before of the excellent business success of the lease. He says the Southern can if the lease be annulled build a link to Mocksville, or else can build a link from Kernersville to Reidsville and make a route from Greensboro to Norfolk much shorter than the one via Selma now in use.

A new section has been put in the revenue act. It imposes a tax on legacies and inheritance as follows: Those in a direct line of 1 per cent, and to those collaterally (save for charitable uses) 1 1/2 per cent. No administrator or executor is to be permitted to file final account until such tax is paid.
It is said that next Monday a commission will be issued to B. S. Royster of Oxford as inspector general of the State guard. He had for several years been assistant inspector general.
There was some talk last night and today about Gov. Russell as a successor to the late Judge Seymour as judge of the U. S. district court. A Republican said that even if the position were tendered Gov. Russell he felt sure he would not accept it, as he would give up his position as Governor for only one thing—that of U. S. Senator. He added that the Governor greatly desires to succeed Butler as Senator.
It is stated that the Seaboard Air Line proposes to build the recently chartered Moore county and Western railway, from Aberdeen to Concord, and that it will put a surveying party in the field next week.
Two negro clerks, Quick and Young, are now in the enrolling clerk's office and last night the bolting Populists had a caucus and named 3 new clerks. There are now two chiefs, at \$5 a day each, and 18 assistants at the same figure, a total expense of \$75 a day. The ex-enrolling clerk A. L. Swinson files a demand for the whole session and notifies the president of the Senate and the Speaker of the House that he is ready to attend to the duties, and is still enrolling clerk. Swinson says that he did not certify to the time of 3 of the Populist assistants who were put on January 13, but that Hill King, principal clerk of the Senate certified them, and put them on as from January 8. Swinson swears to this before committee.

Among today's arrivals here are Congressman-elect John E. Fowler, of the 1st district, and Col. W. B. Rodman, of Washington, N. C.
The scramble of the Republicans for the position of railway commissioner is now livelier than ever. Some are dropping out, but new ones come in. At least a dozen want the place.
While the House refused to take a day's holiday to attend the New Berne Fair, after the Senate had adopted a resolution to that effect, yet a great many members will go. It is said only local bills will be considered on Wednesday.
The revenue act will be considered in committee of the whole next week and will provoke a sharp fight. The section requiring all evidences of indebtedness, such as bonds, stocks, notes, &c., to be taken to the tax assessors, listed and stamped, greatly provokes the bank people. The penalties for failure to pay taxes are very severe, for instance a failure to pay taxes under schedules A, B & C, renders the delinquent person or corporation liable to \$500 fine or six months imprisonment. The Sheriff is required to report to the Judge whether all such taxes have been paid, and the Solicitor is to prosecute. There is also a severe penalty for not having licenses in one's actual possession.
In the House today the following bills were introduced: To prohibit the sale of beer, liquor or wine out side of the limits of an incorporated town or city; to incorporate New Hanover Society for prevention of crime, giving it power to establish a children's home to which all colored children under 14 years of age without home or parents to be admitted. from \$6,000 to \$16,000 and annual allowance to each company from \$100 to \$200.
A Senate bill to stimulate local taxation for schools by allowing the State board of education to use as much as \$30,000 to rural districts which for 3 successive years vote to tax themselves, passed.
Bill making appropriations to the three insane asylums was taken up and passed 3rd reading. It gives the Raleigh \$63,000; Morganton Asylum \$100,000; and \$43,000 to the Goldsboro (col.) Asylum—an electric plant for the latter is allowed, \$2,500. This bill caused a hot debate between Republicans and Populists.

IMPORTANT BILLS.
Impending Row Between Republicans and Russell.
Fellow Servant Bill Passes. Misdemeanor to Sell or Give Cigarettes to Minors. Challenge Bill.
RALEIGH, N. C., February 20.—The Senate passed unanimously the "Fellow Servant" bill and it is now a law.
It also adopted the resolution raising the committee to investigate Mrs. Patis Arrington's charge.
The House passed the bill to make it a misdemeanor to sell, or give cigarettes to minors or for minors to smoke them, the penalty being \$10 fine, or thirty days imprisonment.
The Senate passed the bill reducing the number of Preemptory challenge allowed prisoners in criminal trials from 21 to 10.
There are signs of an impending row between the Republicans and Gov. Russell.
They do not think he will heed their caucuses selections, when he makes his appointments.

Telegraph Items.
Fire destroyed the Webster block, one of the best business buildings in Gloucester, Mass. Loss, \$70,000.
The George H. McCall Company, dealers in coal and builders' material, of Wilmington, Del., has confessed judgment in favor of the Union National Bank and other creditors. George H. McCall and De Haven Morris were appointed receivers.
New York and Boston artists, and fine arts craftsmen will present a petition to Congress relative to injury to stained glass interests alleged to be due to provisions of the present tariff.
During a trial before a justice at Piquette, fifty miles east of Guthrie, O. T., John Dolbert, his son, and John and Samuel Larkins assaulted Amos Atkinson and his two sons, Jim and William, with knives, and killed the two sons.

An attempt was made to wreck a Big Four train, near Berea, Ohio, on a bridge twenty five feet high. The obstruction was discovered by a track walker shortly before the passage of an east bound train. There is no clue to the perpetrators.
The Sunday Lake and Chapin mines in Northern Michigan, have reduced wages 10 per cent, and that the Pewabic and Van Iron company mines, near Iron Mountains, will probably do the same. They employ 1,300 men.
Six persons belonging to the family of Jacob Ciesler, of Cleveland, Ohio, and two boarders in the family were badly burned by flames due to a gasoline explosion. The father, mother, and three of the children will probably die.

THE COTTON MARKETS.
February 20.
The news from Liverpool showed an advance in both spots and futures, though the sales of spot cotton were small.
New York opened 8 points higher than the close yesterday, but there seemed to be plenty for sale therefore most of the early improvement was lost. The close is 6.98 for May.
