WASHINGTON NEWS.

The Immigration Bill Fails to Pass.

McKinley Administration to Prosecute the "Three Friends." Senator McMillan Invites a Rigid Investigation.

JOURNAL BUREAU, WASHINGTON, D. C., March 5.

If President McKinley can succeed in making his administration as brilliant as those who managed his inauguration, made that event, he can be re-elected almost unanimously, for it is generally admitted that it was one of the best managed and most brilliant inaugurations we have had, and that the crowd was larger than ever before. But there is a wide difference in arranging for an inauguration and in running an administration. An inauguration is a non-partisan affair in which everybody joins hands to make it successful and enjoyable, while an administration always has partisan opposition outside its own party, and very often inside of it too. A noteworthy feature of this inauguration was the fraternizing between the members of the outgoing and of the incoming administration. The inauguration parade was excellently handled, and the arrangements for the comfort of the two hundred and fifty thousand spectators were away ahead of anything in that line before, and the street decorations were not only more numerous but much more tasteful. About the only adverse criticism heard is that too much money was spent, and that, of course, is a matter of opinion, just as it is whether President McKinley's inaugural address was weak or strong, statesmanlike or demagogic. One thing is certain, visitors to Washington saw a great show, and aside from those who stopped at hotels where style figures in the bill, they probably all feel that they got the worth of their money. The flicker in Washington March weather was unusually kind to the visitors and the new administration.

A decision of the U. S. Supreme Court, handed down this week, makes it incumbent upon the McKinley administration to prosecute the Three Friends, a vessel alleged to have been a filibusterer, and its crew. This decision reversed the judgment of Judge Locke, of the U. S. Courts, for the Southern District of Florida, under which the Three Friends were released, and the vessel will have to be seized again. This decision may result in an earlier showing of the McKinley policy towards Cuba than was anticipated, but in any event, the action of the new Attorney General in this case will be watched with interest, as it had been unofficially stated that the new administration would not be as zealous in enforcing the neutrality laws, whereas the Cleveland administration was.

The hustle and bustle incidental to the change of administration has left the serious charges against John Wedderburn & Co. and a paper published by them called the National Recorder, filed with the Post-office Department by fifty odd prominent patent lawyers of Washington a few days ago, to be acted upon by the new Postmaster General. The men who make the charges are headed by four ex-Commissioners of Patents, and affidavits are submitted to show that Wedderburn & Co. and their papers should be on the fraud list, for receiving money under false pretenses, and for violating the postal laws. John Wedderburn was the manager of the Examiner Claims Bureau and the Press Claims Co., both of which were mixed up in a suit brought by W. R. Hearst, and both of which figured to a considerable extent in the advertising columns of newspapers a year or so ago.

It seems that every member of the House in the Congress just closed who failed to get re-elected, and who belongs to President McKinley's party is an applicant for office, and some of them are after very modest offices too. In one respect they have the advantage of the outsider; they know the ropes, but there are cases in which the chances for appointment are enhanced by the applicants being too well known to the appointing power. In order to ease the pressure a little it has been announced that no appointments, other than diplomatic, would be made until after April 1, but it has made no apparent difference. The rush is on.

Senator Helfield, of Idaho, says he invites the most rigid investigation of the charges made by twenty-six members of the Idaho legislature, that his election was brought about by the corrupt use of money. He has announced his intention to caucus with the Populists, and vote as the caucus decides on organization, tariff and silver.

President McKinley has followed the bad example set by Mr. Cleveland in allowing himself to be followed around by detectives who are supposed to protect him. The President of the United States needs no more protection than that which every good citizen is always ready to extend should it become necessary. It is really absurd to suppose that two or three detectives could stop any serious attempt upon the life of the President even were we living amidst a state of affairs which would warrant the expectation that some such attempt would be made, and they certainly afford no protection against such assassins as Booth and O'Connell; therefore sensible people were sorry to see the silly body

THE STATE CAPITAL.

Lieut. Gov. Reynolds' Case. The N. C. Railroad Lease. Dispensary Bills Being Passed.

The sensation of yesterday and last night was the arrest and trial of Lieut. Gov. Reynolds and Speaker Hileman for the forcible entrance into Enrolling Clerk Swinson's office some time ago when Swinson was ousted for not employing negro clerks. Swinson is terribly persistent and has said all along he would see this thing out. He demands full pay for the entire session of the Legislature, a decision in the case will be given to-day.

It is claimed that Governor Russell has only five friends in the Legislative membership. These are Representatives Hancock, Sutton of New Hanover, and Sutton of Cumberland; Senators Sharp and Cannon.

The bolting Populists have declared that their contract with the Republican caucus when the Legislature adjourns.

The Legislature has altered the license tax on insurance companies for \$200 fire and accident and \$250 for life insurance.

Many dispensary bills are being passed in spite of the fight made by the liquor men.

There is a big fight in the bill to put Goldsboro under police commission rule. Senator Grant, of Wayne, it is said, is urging the passage out of spite to some of the people in Goldsboro.

In a few days work begins on the new Presbyterian church here. It is to cost about \$25,000.

The North Carolina railroad lease bill is still before the House committee. They continue their investigation to-day. Governor Russell will ask the Legislature to adopt a resolution asking the Supreme Court whether the substitute bill passed by the Senate amends the charter of the North Carolina railroad, and whether it will have to be ratified by the private stockholders.

In the House on Thursday night the bill appropriating \$4,000 additional to the schools, passed with only two dissenting votes.

The Senate passed the bill to allow the Governor to name the directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical college. Also the bills to prohibit the sale of obscene and immoral literature; to regulate the liabilities of stockholders in banks chartered by the State, and to make railroad bank corporation officers take an official action.

The House put Orange county in the Fourth Congressional district and Vance and Surry in the Fifth.

To-day the visitors to the inaugural ceremonies at Washington began to return. The day was all they could wish and thus amid propitious weather the "gold bug" administration began.
