THE AGONY OVER!

General Assembly of 1897 Adjourns Sine Die.

Restraint Orders Against Breaking North Carolina Lease. 400 Dead Bills. Dr. Norment President N. C. Railway. \$900,000 in Appropriations.

Raleigh, N. C., March 9.—Zeb Vance Walser, State Attorney General, is notified that Judge Simonton, of the Federal court, today granted an injunction restraining the North Carolina Railway, Gov. Russell and himself and all others from breaking, or threatening to break, the lease of the North Carolina Railway, or to disaffirm or cancel said lease.

There are two injunction cases, one by the Central Trust company, of New York, and one by the Southern Railway. These injunctions have caused great stir here.

Gov. Russell is very angry over this action.

The Legislature adjourned sine die at midnight.

It passed the bill allowing State convicts to be worked on the roads from July 15th to March 1st.

Four hundred bills died on the House calendar.

Speaker Hileman is here very sick with pneumonia.

James M. Newburne will be Commissioner of Agriculture.

Dr. R. M. Norment, of Robeson Co. will be President of the North Carolina Railway. This is settled.

The State Reformatory bill died on the calendar.

The appropriations made by the Legislature for this year exceed \$900,000, so says State Treasurer Worth.

STATE CAPITOL.

Last Doings of Assembly. Changes in State Officials. Matters of Interest.

Raleigh, N. C., March 9, 1897.

Senator Marian Butler is here to watch the end of this disgraceful legislature.

A speaker pro-tem had to be elected last night as Hileman is too sick to attend. Lusk was beaten by Blackburn in the election, and it was evidently a blow to the farmer to have to step aside for the young politician. Both are Republicans.

Capt. Roberts, the old Confederate soldier who for so long has been keeper of the Capitol, today yields his place to another old soldier, J. L. Burns, who is a Populist. Capt. Roberts has held the place for 15 years.

J. Y. Hamrick of Cleveland is the successor of Lacy as Labor Commissioner.

Dr. Wood succeeds Dr. Kirby at the Insane Asylum here and Dr. Murphy's place at the Morganton Asylum has been tendered to Dr. Monroe of Davidson College.

In spite of the fact that ex-Superintendent Leazar says that there is no need for an appropriation of \$40,000 was made. Six thousand dollars was appropriated for repairs to the Governor's mansion.

The colored Asylum goes to the control of the negro. The directors appointed will put in one.

The tax on drummers was killed, but the tax on doctors who do so much for "sweet charity's sake," was not taken off.

The Secretary of State is greatly surprised as regards insurance. The fire rate in Virginia. For company with an agent here or license can not having place insured.

Governor Russell appointed R. E. Lacy ex-labor commissioner, a director of the A. & M. College, and requested that he be not confined to the State.

The General Assembly will adjourn today.

The Park Hotel is to have an electric sign around the tower which can be seen all over the city.

The bill to create State board of equalization which was tabled Saturday in the Senate was taken from the table and passed.

A bill to increase the pay of the commissioners in regard to commerce passed, as did a bill appropriating \$5,000 to the colored A. & M. college. The white college gets the same.

In the House Speaker Hileman pointed Lusk, Republican, to be the next speaker. The vote N. C. R. R. less bill on quite a squabble was had. When as to 5, 9, 10 per cent. (it being made, but finally the bill tabled to be campaign stuff in 1898.

What They Are Doing.

Carson, Nev.—From now until he steps into the ring, Robert Fitzsimmons will do no more wrestling and very little boxing. Fitzsimmons trains on methods as unconventional as those upon which he fights, and he has never made any pretense of boxing while in preparation for his battles. He has, since he has been at Cook's ranch, done more boxing than any other time when training. Wrestling he says, if done violently is apt to strain the forearms, and as Fitzsimmons put it, "I would not be able to lick a teaspoon let alone a big fellow like Corbett if my forearms should happen to be in bad shape."

Fitzsimmons wanted road work. At the meal was frozen the going was not bad. As soon as the sun got fairly over the mountain top, it made mud at the rate of an inch a minute and Fitzsimmons gave up his idea of trotting through slush.

He played handball two hours, making the games fast and furious. Fitzsimmons is far behind Corbett at handball, but he gets much exercise out of it. Corbett plays to win. Fitz plays for diversion.

It is a common freak of his to make a rush for the ball and indulge in a wild wrestle with anybody who happens to be within reach. Fitzsimmons sparred with Hickey, Roeder and Stender. The work was very fast. Next he wrestled with Roeder. Fitz has an enormous appetite.

After dinner Fitzsimmons went into the yard to play with the big dog which he admires so much, and which every body else would delight in seeing turned into sausage meat. After this came a run to Carson, where he met Martin Julian and Mrs. Fitzsimmons, who had just arrived.

As the train rolled up to the station Fitzsimmons spied Martin Julian standing on the platform and yelled out "There is Martin; she has come this time." And he was right, for in another minute Fitzsimmons kissed her and made a grab for his baby boy. After bestowing a few fatherly attentions on the infant, he put Mrs. Fitzsimmons and the nurse in the carriage. He started for Cook's ranch on foot.

Fitzsimmons complained considerably of his arms hurting him and said they were sore as a result of his wrestling.

The Corbett brothers, Jim and Joe, played handball. Jim was having luck and was taking the most desperate chances at the ball in order to pile up his score. He was wet with perspiration and played with the utmost violence. He seemed to be at all times bringing enviously to the front his boxing and wrestling as usual.

Telegraphic Items.

John Dunlap, engineer, was killed, and William McKeever fatally injured, by a boiler explosion on a farm near Butler, Pa.

James Powers, a Chicago cabman, shot and instantly killed his wife and then fatally shot himself. Jealousy is supposed to be the motive for the deed.

The hotel at Rodeo, Cal., was burned to the ground Sunday night. It was unoccupied, and cost \$50,000 a few years ago, when the stock yards at Rodeo were started.

Warrants have been issued for twenty-five Paterson (N. J.) strikers, who are charged with assault in annoying silk weavers who had taken their places.

St. Gallen's equestrian statue of John A. Logan in Lake Front Park, Chicago, will be unveiled July 22. The work of the noted sculptor is now being cast in bronze in New York.

Andrew Carnegie is not yet able to leave his bed, and may not be for a long time to come. He is improving slowly. It is expected that he will remain in Greenwald, Conn., a month longer.

Justice Gary, of the Illinois Appellate Court, has ruled that it is error for a judge to issue an injunction at his residence.

"Midnight" was the decision in Illinois.

Edward J. Russell, convicted of attempting to bring to this country a small quantity of dynamite, was sentenced to Sing Sing for ten years. Russell attempted to commit suicide last Friday by taking a morphine.

John Giesey Rindblat committed suicide at the Albor House, New York City, just as two deputy United States marshals were about to arrest him. He was a lieutenant of the Holland's battalion and manager of the Provincial hospital at Helsingborg, Sweden. On February 29 he absconded with \$25,000 of public money.

A Demand for Annexation.

ATHENS.—It is stated in official circles that the reply of Greece to the identical notes of the powers demands the annexation of Crete to the kingdom on the broad grounds of historic rights and of a community of religion and race, and offers to withdraw the Greek fleet on condition that the powers intrust to the Greek army in the island the task of pacification.

After a night of dissipation Gus A. Northing, a Kansas City stenographer, aged 45, shot and fatally wounded his wife, and killed himself. Entering the room, Northing gave the woman two minutes to leave the house, pointing a revolver at her. Mrs. Northing defied him to shoot, bearing her breast, and a moment later, fell, fatally wounded.
