WASHINGTON NEWS.

Senate Likely to Butcher the Tariff Bill.

Speaker Reed's Move on Appropriation Bills. The Homestead Bill. Two Kinds of Tariff Democrats. Rumor Maker Kept Busy.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22.

The Senators do not propose to wait until the House passes the new tariff bill upon which the debate was opened today to last until the 31st inst., when it will be voted upon and passed. The Senate Committee on finance has decided to take the bill up at once and to "perfect" it. That may mean an almost entirely new bill by the time the Senators get through their perfecting process. The Finance committee has two vacancies, caused by the retirement of Sherman and Voorhees, which are not likely to be filled at the present session. Assuming that Senator Jones, of Nevada, will vote with them,—he has said that he would—his Committee will be controlled by protectionists, and therefore friendly to the underlying principles of the Dingley tariff bill. But, although none of them will agree to be quoted to that extent, it is understood that members of the committee do not like the bill itself and intend to go over it item by item and amend it until it meets their ideas. This isn't a bit pleasing to the gentlemen who have been working for months to prepare the Dingley bill, but they can hardly be surprised. The constitution gives the House the exclusive right to originate bills dealing with the revenue, but the Senate has used its right to amend to such an extent, of late years, that the McKinley and the present tariff law were both practically Senate-made.

Those who thought that the failure of four of the regular appropriation bills at the last session would make it necessary for Speaker Reed to at least appoint the Committee in the present House to handle those bills, must feel a little bit dazed. Speaker Reed has shown them that he knows a lightning legislative trick or two. He has rushed all of those bills through the House just as they stood when passed by the last Congress, and that without the aid of a single Committee, except that on Rules, of which he is the Chairman. It is daily becoming more evident that so far as the House is concerned, there is no general legislation upon Speaker Reed's programme for the extra session. The House has allowed itself mileage for the extra session.

The Senate committee on Indian affairs has favorably reported the Free Homestead bill in practically the same shape it was passed by the Senate and hung up in the House at the last session. It is pointed that some of the Senators are in favor of using the tariff bill to compel the Republican leaders of the House to allow the Free Homestead bill to pass that body.

There are two kinds of tariff Democrats, as well as of money Democrats and it is by no means certain that the majority of the House will act as a unit in opposing the Republican tariff bill. So far as the bill itself is concerned, it makes no difference whether the Democrats vote against it or split up for an against parts of it, but it may have a very important bearing upon the future of the Democratic party and incidentally of the Populists. Although denied by men of prominence, it is none the less true that Mr. Bryan is being made a figure in the squabble among the Democrats in the House to a certain extent. That Representative Bailey, of Texas, the new leader of the Democrats, is not partial to Mr. Bryan, is well known.

President McKinley after investigating the connection of Land Commissioner Lamoreux with the Chicago lake front case, concluded that there had been nothing illegal or improper done by him and directed Secretary Bliss to accept his resignation, which was tendered before the new administration came in. Mr. Lamoreux is now sick at his home in Wisconsin, but his friends say that as soon as he gets well enough, he is coming to Washington to make things lively for those who mixed him up with this land claim scandal. It was in connection with this case that the new administration met the first Cabinet resignation rumor in its career. Secretary Bliss was the man to resign by rumor, because of his resentment at the order issued by the President. So far as known in Washington, this rumor had no better foundation than that Secretary Bliss went over to New York to attend to some private business. He has been doing this every Saturday since he entered office and remaining with his family, who have not yet moved to Washington, until Monday morning; but this time he went over Friday and the rumor-maker at once jumped to the conclusion that he had resigned on account of the Lamoreux case.

Senator Rodriguez, Minister of the Great Republic of Central America, the gentleman who upset the Nicaragua Canal bill in the Senate at the last session of Congress, makes no secret of his hope of negotiating a treaty with the United States for the building of the Nicaragua Canal by this Government.

THE STATE CAPITAL.

Annex to Experiment Station. Harrel Reappointed Quartermaster-General. News & Observer Russell's Official Organ.

RALEIGH, N. C., March 22, 1897.

State Treasurer Worth has issued the following letter to the heads of the educational institutions and to the State departments to which special appropriations were made by the General Assembly. The appropriations run up to nearly a million dollars:

"I am sorry to inform you that owing to the large appropriations made by the late General Assembly and the decreased valuations of property in the State, I must advise you that I cannot pay any extra appropriations during this year or until I find that I will have a surplus after paying the interest on the four per cent bonds and the necessary running expenses of the State government. I advise you of the situation at this time so that you may avoid making contracts that might embarrass you."

The handsome annex to the experiment station will be completed by April 1st. The work was done by the North Carolina Car Company and cost \$9,000.

Governor Russell will reappoint Col. Eugene Harrell Quartermaster-General. Tomorrow night the "Karnival of Commerce" will be given here for the benefit of St. Luke's Home for old ladies that is kept up by a circle of King's daughters.

Governor Russell will have to fill one vacancy on the Board of Agriculture. It is the place offered Mr. B. H. Lacy and which he declined.

Mrs. Lizzie Darby of Wilmington is to be Governor Russell's executive clerk.

There are very strong indications that there will be a large cotton crop planted this year.

The Supreme court has reached the 8th district and this week will hear arguments from that district.

Quartermaster General Harrell has been to Washington to see the Secretary of War regarding a battery of 4 breech loading howitzers. There are plans for organizing a battery here.

Governor Russell on Saturday afternoon named the new directors of the North Carolina Railroad, but only gave the names to the News & Observer, here all other newspaper people being shut out. The News & Observer seems to be the mouthpiece of the Republican Governor although there is a Republican paper here while the News & Observer professes to be a Democratic paper. The directors are as follows:

R. M. Norment, of Robeson; N. S. Lusk, of Buncombe; Wm. Gilchrist, of New Hanover; H. U. Butters, of Columbus; C. A. Cook, of Warren; J. S. Armstrong, of New Hanover; A. W. Graham, of Granville; Joe Graham, of Warren.

Cineros Reported Dead.
HAVANA.—It is reported from Camaguey that Salvador Cineros, president of the Cuban republic, is dead; that Vice President Bartolomeo Maso succeeds him as president, and that Dr. Capot, ex-professor of Havana University, will be appointed vice-president. Gen. Quintin Bandera has returned to Camaguey.

A large body of insurgents is concentrated near Sancti Spiritus, and a combined movement of Spanish troops against them is expected.

For the last few days Captain-General Weyler has been greatly annoyed by a serious affection of the throat, with suppuration of the glands of the pharynx. On Wednesday, after a consultation of his physician, it was decided that for a time the patient must have absolute repose. As he suffered severely from dysentery when last in the field, his medical advisers will not allow him to return there for some time on that account also.

In addition to the lad Wilson, several other American boys have arrived at Havana within the last few days with the intention of joining the insurgent army, but the advice given them is to return to the United States. The boy Holt, of Summit Scully, of Somerville, N. J., who came to join the insurgents, will probably be shipped back to New York at the request of his family and of the American State Department.

THE DIRECTORS

Commissioned for Atlantic & North Carolina Railroad.

Important Railroad Meeting. Where Was it Held? What the Old Board Directors will do. Ready to Go.

RALEIGH, N. C., March 22.—The new directors of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad were commissioned today by the Governor, and they will hold an important meeting at New Berne, to-night.

The above dispatch was received last night, and the JOURNAL at once made a search of investigation to discover what the meeting was, but found that no meeting was held here.

President Chadwick, of the A. & N. C. R. R. was seen last night regarding his side of the question, and said that he was ready to turn his affairs over to his successors, as soon as they presented the proper credentials, and he also added that it would be with a protest.

Northern Cotton Mills.

FALL RIVER, Mass.—The agitation over the proposed reduction in hours of labor for cotton mill employes is strong here at present, both for and against the movement.

A statement by Secretary Howard, of the Spinners Union, that the competition of the Southern manufacturers would not be increased by the adoption of a shorter working day in this section is met by a declaration by one of the most prominent manufacturers that in spite of the strong efforts made in New England to improve trade conditions by a reduction of stock the curtailed production has been more than made up by the new mills and increased production of the South. It is pointed out that in about three and half years the mills of Fall River have been closed about six months in an average.

For this sacrifice, it is said, no corresponding benefit has accrued, but Southern competitors have run on full time, and filled up the vacuum which Northern manufacturers have been trying to create. Fall River owners state that it can be proven beyond question that Southern mills producing the same fabrics as those made in this city are realizing satisfactory profits at present market prices. Their taxes are nominal; fuel, in many cases, is less than its cost here; the hours of work range from 66 to 72 hours weekly and labor will average 40 per cent less in price.
