Therefore the tobacco planter has soil, an easy market to reach, with cheap transportation, and all that remains is for our people to provide a good market where the tobacco planter can readily sell his staple, at good prices.

Making New Berne a tobacco market, opens up trade and increases business to everyone, to a greater or less degree. It will make a market for our surplus labor, and put to work hundreds who are now seeking employment, and by its being a cash product, it will put and keep in circulation in this city many thousands of dollars, which will be new money to this section.

The development which this tobacco industry will bring to New Berne will be limited only by what our people may do in the way of assisting it. There is no limit to its possibilities, and the merchant or citizen who fails to assist in this development does not deserve his citizenship, and should not be entitled to participate in the prosperity which is to come.
