WASHINGTON NEWS.

Tariff Bill Debate Until April First.

Bailey to Present Minority Report. Arbitration Treaty. Chicago Lake Front Case. Presents Coming to McKinley. Base Ball for McKinley.

JOURNAL BUREAU, WASHINGTON, D. C., March 24. }
On Monday, March 23, began the debate on the new tariff bill, and if the plans of the Republicans in the House do not carry the bill will pass the House before April 1. Chairman Dingley prepared the majority report on this measure and made the opening speech in the debate, and Representative Bailey of Texas will submit the report of the minority. Mr. Dingley says that if the bill becomes a law by May 1st, he expects the revenue under it for the first year to be \$75,000,000. If it is not enacted until July 1st, he says the government will lose at least \$15,000,000 of the revenue as speculators will import large quantities of goods on which it is proposed to increase the duties. Mr. Dingley in his report declares it to be the "imperative duty of Congress to so adjust duties as to secure the needed revenue to carry on the government and to better protect the industries which have suffered the past three years from unequal foreign competition." The debate on the bill will continue every day from 10 a. m. to 11 p. m. until March 31 when a vote will be taken if the bill will be passed without any difficulty.

Mr. Bailey's report is expected to be conservative and will not treat the subject of free raw material upon which it is understood there is a difference of opinion among the democratic members. It will refute the arguments advanced in the Dingley report that more revenue is now needed, and that a protective tariff is for the best interests of the people. Mr. Dingley confidentially predicts an increase of \$100,000,000 in revenue under the new law. Some of the largest revenue producers are sugar \$21,000,000; wool \$17,500,000; manufacturers of wool \$7,000,000; tobacco \$7,000,000.

The Senate while waiting for the tariff bill from the House is spending some time on the treaty of arbitration with Great Britain. Senator Davis who has succeeded Mr. Sherman as chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, says that as amended the treaty avoids all the specific objections made to the original location. Senator Stewart is still opposed to the treaty, declaring it a practical abdication of the power of Congress to declare war.

It is rumored that the Secretary of the Interior, Bliss is about to resign because the President did not agree with him in his decision of the Chicago Lake Front case in which he so severely arraigned Judge Lamereux the late Land Commissioner. The Secretary in commenting on the decision of Judge Lamereux, said it was without "faith or credit" whereupon the Land Commissioner immediately sent in his resignation. The Secretary did not accept it and was considering the question of dismissing the Commissioner when the President ordered the Secretary to accept the resignation of the Commissioner. He further sustains Judge Lamereux's decision. This was a direct rebuke to the Secretary, and he contemplated severing his connection with the administration. This is the first rumor of the kind affecting the present cabinet, but it is reasonable to expect many more.

Secretary Sherman has found a good birth for his son-in-law, Mr. James McCallan, as compiler of laws under the State Department. The compensation is \$3,000 per session, and the position is considered a regular plum. It is interesting to note that Mr. Olney stole a march on the present Secretary and shut some good Republican out of a \$10,000 job. An act was approved February 2, 1897, providing for the revision of the second edition of the international laws of the United States appropriating \$10,000 for the work, and before March 1, '97 Olney had given the work to Hallet Phillips, of this city. In view of the embarrassment of the chiefs over the lack of places for party workers it is hard that this job escaped.

The deluge of useless and unwelcome gifts to the President has begun. He has already received a big dog, a model of a boat, and a long wooden cable chair with an anchor attached. The dog Moscow is a really fine specimen of the St. Bernard breed and is much admired by the President. Mr. Porter the President's private secretary is anxious that the impression shall not get abroad that the President is a dog fancier and that Moscow who weighs 150 pounds fully satisfies his love for the canine race. The boat model was presented by ex-Governor Pinchback, of Louisiana and is the work of a colored cabinet maker of the State. It is four feet long and is enclosed in a glass case. It required four men to carry it. The donor expressly states that he is not a candidate for any office. The President wants it understood that while he is steering the Ship of State he doesn't really need any more than one boat.

THE STATE CAPITAL.

Changes Made in Departments. New Jersey Editors to Visit the State. Wants the Army Post.

Governor Russell has named J. M. Newbourne, Populist, as the successor of Mr. Patterson as Commissioner of Agriculture in spite of the fact that Dr. Reid Parker, Republican, was named by the caucus and backed by Senator Pritchard. J. L. Ramsey, editor of the Progressive Farmer succeeds T. K. Bruner, as secretary, and Jim Young, col., chief fertilizer inspector. All the other members of the Agricultural Department are also changed.

The directors of the Insane Asylum at Goldsboro yesterday elected Dr. Alexander of Tyrrell as the new Superintendent. This is not calculated to please the negroes as they had claimed the control of their own (colored) asylum.

There is a very furious wild cat at the State Museum which in a few days will be chloroformed and then the taxidermist, Mr. Brimley will mount him to go in the collection of animals in the museum. A Mr. Pearson from Guilford wants to succeed Mr. Brimley as curator of the Museum.

On April 2nd the 69 New Jersey editors will be here and spend a night and part of a day. They will be hand somely looked after.

There is a fight on here between the Raleigh Gas Company and the Raleigh Electric Company that will evidently be to the advantage of the patrons of each. Ex-Postmaster-General Wilson is to deliver the address June 1st at the commencement exercises at the University. The establishment of an army post here is again being urged.

Greeks are Warned.

CANE, ISLAND OF CRETE.—The foreign admirals have issued a fresh proclamation announcing that the insurgent and Greek troops must not attack the Turkish fortifications (which they claim, are needed to "maintain security and quiet") at Kissamos, Suda, Malaxa, Petimo, Candia and Hierapetra, where foreign troops have been landed; otherwise, the admirals say, they will employ force.

It is not considered likely that this proclamation will have much effect in view of the declaration of the insurgents that they will shed the last drop of their blood to secure the union of Crete with Greece.

Except at the points occupied by the powers in this island anarchy and famine are feared. Both the Turkish and Greek troops are quite undisciplined. Turkish sentries prevent the Christians from traversing the looted quarter, but this does not prevent other pillagers from doing so.

NO STATE EXHIBIT

At Tennessee Centennial. Agricultural College Borrows Money to Build Hospital.

RALEIGH, N. C., March 24.—The Board of Agriculture decides not to make an exhibit at the Tennessee Centennial Exposition, as the tonnage tax suit decision in the U. S. Supreme Court may be adverse and cripple the department.

The Board lends the Agricultural College \$5,000, to build a hospital.

Telegraphic Items.

Schaufroth & Co., manufacturers of boots and shoes, at Buffalo, are financially embarrassed. Six chattel mortgages have been filed to protect creditors, and the Sheriff has seized the stock and machinery and closed the factory.

William Leland, a real estate dealer in Chicago, attempted suicide in the Wood lawn police station by hanging himself from the top of his cell by means of a sheet which he had twisted into a rope. He is not likely to recover.

Benjamin Snyder was instantly killed and Will Roth and L. O. Blase seriously injured at Allentown, Pa., while working at the bottom of the Consolidated Lehigh Slate Quarry, near the Slate City. Discoveries just made add \$16,000 to the embezzlement of Cyrus E. Breder, the defaulting cashier of the First National Bank of Bethlehem, Pa., who disappeared a few weeks ago, leaving a shortage estimated at the time to amount to \$13,000. He also stole \$1,000 from a building.

Marshall F. Homer, who was arrested in Philadelphia, on a warrant sworn out by Damon Peet & Co., dealers in printers' supplies, at 41 Beckman street, charging embezzlement, was given a hearing before Magistrate Jermon this morning and held to await the action of the New York authorities.
