Bailey to Present Minority Report. Arbitration Treaty. Chiengo Lake Front Case. Presents Coming to McKinley. Base Ball for Mc-Kinley.

JOURNAL BURRAT, WASHINGTON, D. C., March 24. Con Monday, March 22, began the de bate on the new tariff bill, and if the plans of the Republicans in the House do not mis-carry the bill will pass the House before April 1. Chairman Dingley pre pared the majority report on this meas ure and made the opening speech in the lebate, and Representative Bailey of fexas will submit the report of the miacrity. Mr. Dingley says that if the bili becomes a law by May 1st, he expects the revenue under it for the first year to be \$75,000,000. If it is not enacted unti July 1st, he says the government will pose at least \$15,000,000 of the revenue as speculators will import large quanti ties of goods on which it is proposed to increase the duties, Mr. Dingley in his report declares it to be the "imperative uty of Congress to so adjust duties as to ecure the needed revenue to carry or he government and to better protect the ndustries which have suffered the pas three years from unequal foreign competition." The debate on the bill will conunue every day from 10 a. m. to 11 p. m antil March 31 when a vote will be taken

Mr. Bailey's report is expected to b onservative and will not treat the sub ject of free raw material upon which i is understood there is a difference of pinion among the democratic members it will refute the arguments advanced in one Dingley report that more revenue is now needed, and that a protective tarity a for the best interests of the people. Mi Dingley confidentially predicts an in crease of \$100,000,000 in revenue under the new law. Some of the largest reveaue producers are sugar \$21,000,006 wool \$17,500,000; manufacturers of wool \$27,000,000; tobacco \$7,600,000.

CONSTANTINOPLE-Authentic details of e outbreak on Sunday last at Tokat, in the Sivas district of Asia Minor, when the Turks attacked the Armenians while the latter were in church, show that 100 Christians were massacred. The Armenian quarter and bazsar was given over to pillage for eight hours.

The diplomats here are said to be once more turning their attention to the conduct of the Sultan, and it is semi-officially intimated that they are again of the opinion, so frequently attributed to them that the system of friendly representations on the subject of Armenia which has hitherto been followed must be changed for sterner methods of dealing with evils complained of. The Sultan, however, has heard this story many times during the past few years, and he consoles himself with the belief that he will survive this new fit of righteons indignation as he has tided over others of a much more serious character. 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
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
