## WASHINGTON NEWS.

### Shall Hawaii be Annexed to the United States.

### Partisan Wangle on Tariff Question Instead of Debate. Senate Vacancies. Offensive Partisanship Not Offensive. Rule of Appointments.

JOURNAL BUREAU, WASHINGTON, D. C., March 29.

The annexation of Hawaii seems about to be made a live question again, not by the negotiation of a treaty similar to that sent to the Senate by Mr. Harrison and withdrawn by Mr. Cleveland, but by a formal application from the government of Hawaii for the admission of the island republic into the United States, either as a territory or as a State. This application will, there are reasons to believe, be very shortly made to President McKinley, who will send it to Congress with his recommendation as to what shall be done with it. President McKinley has not committed himself, and nobody ventures a positive assertion as to whether he will favor or oppose. If he favored the application it would be granted by Congress in short order, but should he oppose it, the outcome would be in doubt, as there are a considerable number of men in both House and Senate who would hesitate to vote to admit Hawaii against his wishes, although themselves in favor of it.

It is to be regretted that the debate on the Dingley tariff bill, which good or bad is to be passed by the House this week, could not have been conducted on the actual merits or demerits of the duties which are to be imposed by that measure, instead of degenerating into a partisan wrangle in which both democrats and republicans tried to show that the "other party" is responsible for the existence and encouragement of trusts, as it has done. Partisan accusations seldom influence the intelligent citizen, who may often be made to change his opinion by calm argument backed with proofs. Some say perhaps we may have that sort of a tariff debate in Congress, but truth compels the statement that there hasn't been one of that kind up to this time.

### Complaints of the conduct of a lottery scheme by solicitors of patents have reached Congress, and Senator Hansbrough has introduced a bill making illegal for patent solicitors to offer or give any premium or prize to induce inventors to pay them a fee to enter any alleged competition. The bill provides a heavy penalty for violation of its provisions.

The committee vacancies in the Senate are still unfilled and they are beginning to make trouble. Senator Allen called attention to the fact that the democrats have no representative left on the committees on Post Offices and Post Roads, although that committee was going right ahead acting on nominations, etc. A motion is now pending to discharge this committee from further consideration of nominations until the vacancies have been filled. The various parties and elements in the Senate are apparently as wide apart as ever in their ideas of how the vacancies ought to be filled. A majority of the Senate must vote together before they can be filled.

A committee from the Indianapolis monetary convention of last year, called upon Speaker Reed several days ago in the interest of the talked-of bill for the appointment of a monetary commission by the President, which it will be remembered was endorsed by that convention. Mr. Reed did not commit himself, but he left his callers under the impression that he did not think the country was especially hankering after a Currency Commission, and that Congress did not as a rule set upon such questions until the sentiment of the country had unmistakably made itself known. He told them that the tariff was the first and principal work set out by this Congress, and they left Washington without much hope for their bill at this session anyway.

The Post Office Department threw a bomb among the politicians when it announced that "offensive partisanship" would not be sufficient cause for the removal of a postmaster, unless shown to have been detrimental to the business of the Postal Service. This is a continuation of the policy of the last administration, like the four year term of all postmasters.

If President McKinley lives up to his announced intention not to appoint those who held office under Harrison and who are now applicants for the same positions, he has made a big cut in the roll of applicants; but those who have a strong pull are still in the field and some of them will doubtless get appointed here or so. No President has ever been able to live up to an iron-clad rule. In the matter of appointments, and it is not at all probable that a man who is as anxious for the goodwill of Senators and Representatives as President McKinley has shown himself to be, will do so, but the rule will be used to shut out a great many of them.

WILMINGTON, N. C., March 29.—Wilmington had another fire Sunday night. About 11 o'clock the large warehouse belonging to Alexander Sprunt & Son, extending from the W., N. & N. railroad depot to the river was discovered to be on fire.

The building contained cotton, rosin and turpentine and both building and contents were consumed. The fire is supposed to have been started by an incendiary.

### THE STATE CAPITAL.

### Mrs. Russell Entertains. Electric Cars Running by May 1st. Will Bid to Name Exposition Car. Items of Interest.

There was considerable comment when it was learned Saturday night that Governor Russell had had a warrant issued on Treasurer Worth for \$350 in favor of Capt. W. H. Day, and ex-Judge MacRae who are to appear for the Governor in the injunction case at Greensboro. Both of these lawyers are general council for the S. A. L. The attorney general says the Governor has full authority to employ counsel.

The Capital club here has awarded the contract for the handsome \$20,000 clubhouse.

Mr. Ed. Chambers Smith, has been appointed to represent North Carolina on the executive committee of the National Association of Democratic Clubs.

Superintendent Ray of the Institute for the Blind, here has gone North to visit different Blind Asylums looking to an improvement here.

Mrs. Russell made it quite pleasant at the Mansion last week. She entertained the Women's Christian Temperance Union; the board of trustees of the Agricultural and Mechanical college, and gave a reception to Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Jolley.

Work begins this week on the new car house for the Raleigh Electric Street Car Co., and the cars are promised to be running by May 1st.

The newly appointed Adjutant-General A. J. Cowles is an applicant for the appointment of Minister to Greece to succeed Minister Eben Alexander.

The North Carolina Rolling Exposition Car will be finished by August 1st and it will be named for whatever city bids highest for the honor. Raleigh, Wilmington, Asheville and Charlotte will send in sealed bids.

Superintendent Smith, of the Penitentiary has returned from his first visit to the State farms on the Roanoke, and expresses himself as well pleased with their condition.

Still no appointment in regard to the U. S. Eastern Judgeship. The opposition to Price of Salisbury is increasing.

Mr. McCaskey, Populist member of the Legislature writes a letter exonerating Dr. Wood from the charge that he went before the bolting populist caucus and sought their support for the appointment of Superintendent of the Insane Asylum here. He says he was chosen before caucus action as the right man for the place.

## LOOKS RATHER LATE.

### Judge Simonton's Injunction Restraining Legislature's Acts.

### Concerning Amendments to Charter A. & N. C. R. R. Action Brought by W. R. Tucker. Judge Russell Claims he Made No Appointment.

SPECIAL. RALEIGH, N. C., March 29.—Judge Simonton, in Charleston, S. C., last Saturday, granted an injunction restraining Gov. Russell, Attorney General Waiser and the new directors of the A. & N. C. R. R. from carrying into effect the two acts of the last Legislature amending the charter, and giving the Governor control of the road.

The action was brought by W. R. Tucker, of Raleigh, the largest private stockholder in the road.

The order is returnable before Judge Simonton, at Greensboro, N. C., April 30th, the day after the hearing of N. C. R. R. in injunction case.

Governor Russell cannot yet appoint a State proxy.

Ex-Judge Boykin and Armistead Jones appear for Tucker.

In an interview concerning the above, Gov. Russell said that he had not read the papers served on him.

"I will appoint the State proxy if I choose, and when I choose. I shall not ask any United States Judge when I can do so, I have had no occasion to make any appointment. Mr. Dorch the former State proxy resigned his position six months ago."

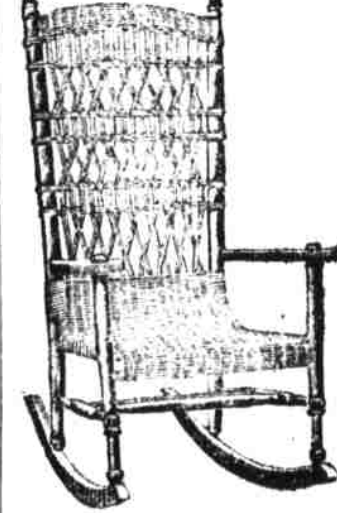
