## WASHINGTON NEWS.

Reed's Course in the House Discoursed by the Party.

Rule to Apply to Small Post Office The Question of Armor Plate. Roosevelt Expected to Stir Things up. Death of Ex-Senator Voorhees of Indiana.

Representative Jerry Simpson did not succeed in making Speaker Reed happen the House committee so that general legislation could proceed while the House is waiting for the Senate to act on the tariff bill, but by his continued presence he forced out the announcement from Representative Dingley, the floor leader of the Republicans, that in not appointing the committee, Speaker Reed was following a programme adopted by him and his party leaders, and a virtual endorsement of that programme from Representative Bailey, of Texas, the Democratic floor leader, who said that the Democrats preferred no legislation to the part of the Republicans to hold legislation which they could not prevent if the Republicans chose to put it through. These statements resulted in clearing the atmosphere very much, so far as the House is concerned.

Unless Postmaster General Gurnea changes his mind, there will be no change made among the postmasters whose income does not exceed \$100 a year, in a matter how long the office has been held by the same person, except in cases where a majority of the patrons of the office are for a change. Mr. Gurnea has notified a number of representatives that this policy will be strictly adhered to. The result will be that the postmasters embracing this classification will always be political sympathizers with a majority of the patrons of their offices. That policy is fair enough and good enough to be made into a binding law.

The fact that some of those who were prominently identified with the Cleveland administration have picked up some very nice plum under this administration is not altogether pleasing to the politicians who have failed to pick anything for themselves. Ex-Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Dohney has been made chief Statistician of the Department of Agriculture at the salary of \$1,500 a year, and Ex-Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Hamlin has been given a legal job in connection with the securities, for an indefinite period, at compensation of about \$15 a day.

Secretary Long has rejected the offer to furnish armor for \$950 a ton, if they were given contracts for all the armor plate used by the government for the next twenty years—submitted under the Act of the last Congress, limiting the price to be paid for armor plate for naval vessels to \$300 a ton, because it had no authority to make a condition contract, and the whole matter has been referred back to Congress and may result in the establishment of a government armor making plant, unless the Carnegie and Bethlehem companies recede from their present position or persuade Congress to raise the limit. It begins to look as though the vacancies in the Senate Committee would be filled. The new Senators, who have a committed assignments, make so much fuss about it that something had to be done. It is not probable that either of the parties can have their way about the committee places. In fact, there has been a combination agreed to by committees representing the populists, democrats and silver republicans under which the republicans are allowed three-tenths of the vacancies and the combination retains the rest, but this agreement has yet to be ratified.

If Hon. Theodore Roosevelt, who has been appointed Assistant Secretary of the Navy, doesn't kick up the biggest sort of a shindig in that department, he will disappoint all the Washington prophets. Said one of these prophets: "I cannot conceive Roosevelt as an autocrat anywhere. He is an able man, although some consider him impracticable, and if he cannot have his own way, or if he regards as good as his own, there is bound to be trouble. I expect the trouble will begin with some of the officers of the Navy, who feel pretty sure of themselves and will not like to see a civilian carrying a chip on his shoulder in the Department and at the same time interfering with their plans." Notwithstanding this sort of talk, which is general in Washington, it would be a good thing for the public service if a Roosevelt could be made assistant to the head of every one of the government departments. There is not a single one of them that a stir up would not benefit, although it might make things disagreeable to a few individuals.

The sudden death of ex-Senator Voorhees, of Indiana, removed a prominent figure in American politics. He was nearly seventy years old and had been in bad health for several years.

## THE STATE CAPITAL.

Asylum Cases Undecided. The City Election. Report of Expenses. Robinson Said to be Sure of the Judgeship. Baptist Revival.

The decision in the Asylum cases has not been made yet. For seven hours on Saturday up to midnight the argument went on before Judge Adams. It has been agreed that the cases of all three of the Asylums should be argued together. Dr. J. C. L. Harris, Judge Shepherd, Dr. W. C. Moore, Judge MacRae, District Attorney Aycock, Mr. R. O. Burton and Judge A. C. Avery, were the lawyers who appeared before Judge Adams. The Judge said he would give his decision by Wednesday, so that it might go before the Supreme Court and be decided immediately.

In the case before Judge Adams when the Governor sued the State Auditor for the poll tax on the tax lists to be sent out, Judge Adams decides that the poll tax must be made \$1.33 and not \$1.25 as an act of the last legislature. This is the last week will make the poll tax and personal tax conform to the constitution. The Auditor appealed.

At the Episcopal and Roman Catholic churches here yesterday, Palm Sunday was fittingly celebrated by most beautiful palm decorations. The decoration were most beautiful in the church of the Good Shepherd.

The Republicans and Populists here have decided to put up an important ticket and have nominated Mr. Frank Stronach as the opponent to Javor Russ.

On the Verge of War.

CONSTANTINOPLE.—Three thousand Greeks passed the frontier last Friday on their way to the Greek Army. The tremendous war at Kavkaz, the front were all fully manned and were the national estimates.

The Porte has invited two military delegates to its representatives. The first which went out on Friday last, declared that Greek regulars and Greek artillery companies led by high rank, have invaded Turkey and assert the right of Turkey to a repel. The second circular, which was dispatched yesterday (Saturday), announced the retreat of the aggressor over the frontier and the restoration of the status quo.

Late News Items.

Governor Pingree, of Michigan, has refused to surrender Sheriff Ferguson's trial in New York on a charge of aiding a prisoner to escape.

Mrs. Elizabeth Mill, Allentown, Pa., oldest woman, has died in her ninety-fifth year. Her descendants include 4 children, 33 grandchildren, 71 great grandchildren and 5 great-great grandchildren, a total of 115.

Jos DeArceva, an American citizen, a dentist, formerly a resident of Matanzas, who was arrested April 7 and confined in Fort Cabanas, has been released, according to a cablegram received at the War Department from General Lee.

The fact that Emperor William sent a message of congratulation and other greetings to Prince Bismarck on his birthday, has been severely commented upon by the German press and has rendered the Emperor, for the time being very unpopular.

While sauntering along the beach at Palm Beach, Fla., in the guise of a fisherman Colonel Emilio Nunez, of Philadelphia, the leader of the Cuban insurgents in the United States, was arrested on a charge of violating the health laws and was placed in Quarantine. All communication with outsiders is prohibited.

W. REED ON THE SOUTHERN RAILROAD.

Bad Railroad Accident. Three Men Killed, Six Injured.

CHARLOTTE, N. C.—A most fearful railroad accident occurred Sunday morning at Harrisburg, a small town about 10 miles north of this city.

Train No. 22, the north-bound train, on the Southern, and train No. 11, the south-bound local passenger, collided killing three persons and wounding six.

The accident occurred at 11:15 A. M. Train No. 22 was headed by Charles Campbell, Fireman Donaldson and Conductor Gentry. It left Charlotte 10:15 and was en route to Harrisburg.

The truck engine No. 22 of the Harrisburg, perfectly straight, was at that point, where there was a small curve, and was going at a considerable rate.

Conductor Donaldson was thrown from the engine for 200 yds, but he was not injured. The engine was stopped by the brakes, but the truck engine, which was in the lead, was not stopped.
