APRECIATORS AND DEPRECIATORS.

The South today offers untold advantages to the settler and the investor, and that these advantages are being seized by new people, is seen in the rapid building up and development of various sections in the South.

But while certain localities seem to be receiving favor, from the fact of their receiving accessions of people and capital, and other sections more generously endowed with resources are but slightly noticed, it is often argued that investors do not know a good thing when they see it as localities richly blessed in natural wealth, they neglect, while seemingly poor places are made into cities or great farms.

The reason for the non-development of many sections in the South that offer splendid opportunities to the new comer is largely due to local influences in those sections, which do not extend the proper encouragement to outsiders or to those persons who would develop the section if given the opportunity to do so.

There have been thousands of dollars kept out of Eastern North Carolina through the mistaken policy of its people, who have failed to see that the reclaiming of lands now worthless, even if those who reclaimed them made money in the operation, would prove of immense benefit to every citizen in the section, as work would be provided for the home people and money would be brought in to pay for the labor returning them.

There has also been State Legislation which has driven away our side would be buyers of our sea food products, the reason being given for this legislation that the supply of these products might become exhausted. The people of a specially favored locality are too often afflicted with the idea that their is the only section in the country, and if investor want a sure thing, they must pay what the people of that place demand, or go elsewhere. And the investor does leave such localities to remain in a wretched, lonely and undeveloped condition.

A great hindrance to the South is the fact that such a low valuation is placed upon its land, its assessed valuation being perhaps one tenth of its real value.

If the people of the South place such a low value upon their own property, will any investor place a higher valuation upon it, or be anxious to place money for investment in a locality where depreciators abound?

The South must show to investors that it has something of value to offer. That its land has an appreciated, not depreciated value, and that it is valuable because it is productive; that our industries are
