THE STATE CAPITAL.

Visiting Druggists Given Banquet and German.

Governor Cannot Attend Mecklenburg Celebration. Railroad Meetings, Episcopal Convention, Grape and Fruit Brandy.

JOURNAL BUREAU, RALEIGH, N. C., MAY 13. Governor Russell is invited to attend the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence celebration and to be a guest of the city of Charlotte. There will be a military display on the 20th and a sham battle on the 21st in which seven companies will participate. Other engagements will prevent the Governor attending.

"The wet spell in May" is upon us, and soon will come the cry from all sides of "too much rain."

There was a called meeting of the stockholders of the Raleigh & Gaston R. R. yesterday. It was held for the purpose of agreeing to minor changes in the new five per cent. bonds and endorsing the issuance of them by resolutions. President Hoffman, Vice-President St. John and others came here in private cars to attend the meeting.

The Railroad Commissioner has had complaint made before it, by the people of Halifax and Northampton counties in this State, and Brunswick, Va., against the changing of the line of the Raleigh & Gaston R. R., as it abolishes the depot at South Gaston and causes great inconvenience to shippers in that section. Railroad Commissioners S. O. Wilson and D. H. Abbott are attending the National Convention of R. R. Commissioners at St. Louis. They will return for the next meeting of the N. C. Commissioners on next Tuesday.

The druggists of the city gave an elegant banquet to the visiting druggists last night and tonight the Capital club gave a German complimentary to the convention.

The convention of the Episcopal church which is in session here in the Church of the Good Shepherd is well attended. A motion was made yesterday during the session to allow women to vote in all parochial elections. It created quite a discussion, but was carried over until today when it will no doubt pass. St. Mary's school entertained the convention from 5 to 8 p. m. this evening. The treasurer of the diocese reported a balance on hand of \$5,100.39. Mr. C. F. Johnson was re-elected treasurer. The revenue department is making enquiry regarding the amount of grape and fruit brandsy that will probably be made this year. There was only a very limited quantity last year.

LEE REPORTS ON CUBA.

All of Weyler's Statements False. In Arguments are Gaining Ground, and Spanish Authority in Cuba is in a Very Bad Way.

WASHINGTON.—Consul General Lee has made a report to the State Department descriptive of the situation in Cuba which is said to be very startling in its character. On account of the revolutions made therein, President McKinley, it is said, is reluctant to make it public. He has no desire to precipitate a crisis in the Cuban matter at this time, fearing its effect upon the tariff middle.

The report which the Consul General has made in regard to the general situation in Cuba is dated a few days ago. He makes an attack upon General Weyler which is said to be very savage. He declares that General Weyler has no grounds for stating that the Island has been pacified; as a matter of fact, General Lee declares the insurrection was never stronger than at the present time.

The Cuban forces have increased in number since the time of his arrival in Cuba, but on account of their policy and peculiar methods of warfare they are pursuing the plan of harassing the Spanish army by means of guerrilla tactics. He expresses the firm conviction that the rebels will be successful in driving the Spaniards from the Island.

The Spanish authority in Cuba, according to the Consul General, is in a very bad plight.

The Spaniards are discontented because of their failure to get their pay. From present indications Spain is having great difficulty in getting another loan. The money obtained a year ago by this method was exhausted some weeks ago, and she has no funds with which to carry on the war.

While ostensibly William J. Calhoun has gone to Cuba to represent this government in the Ruiz investigation, the real object of his visit is to investigate and report upon the situation on the Island.

TYPHOON II WINS.

Kentucky Derby Goes Against Calculations of the Sea Who Guess.

LOUISVILLE, Ky.,—The twenty-third Kentucky Derby has passed into history, and with it the winter and spring calculation of the knowing ones. Ornament, the much-touted son of Imp. Order, that game chestnut colt whose two-year-old performances stamped him the king of the Western turf, lowered his colors this afternoon before a gamer and a better animal. Without being touched and with only a little shaking up near the wire, Typhoon II landed the coveted prize, showing the way the entire distance of one mile and a quarter. The finish was not of the sensational kind, for Typhoon's victory was won with an ease that clearly proved his superiority over the five other colts.

ARMISTICE PROPOSED.

But the Powers Have Heard Nothing From Turkey. Crete Will Not be Satisfied.

LOXOS.—The Ambassadors of the Powers held a prolonged conference at the close of which they presented to the Turkish government a collective memorandum proposing an armistice between Turkey and Greece on the basis of the negotiations for peace now in progress through the Powers. The memorandum, which was presented to the Turkish minister of Foreign Affairs, by the Dean of the Diplomatic Corps, enumerates the conditions which have been accepted by Greece and begs the Porte to issue the necessary orders to arrest the progress of the Turkish troops.

It is officially announced that the Powers have notified the Greek government that the Greek troops may leave the Island of Crete, and that the admirals of the international fleet will release the steamers which have been seized during the blockade.

The Times correspondent at Candia says that it is feared that autonomy will fall to purely Crete, owing to the opposition of the 30,000 Cretan Mohammedans on the Island who fear that autonomy will end with union with Greece, while the insurgents are still defiant and actually talk of resisting the departure of the Greek troops.

Latest News Items.

There was a sharp frost in London and in the inland counties.

Apparently reliable news of the most important insurgent success in months has just reached Havana.

Another break occurred in the Hurt on leave, at Baton Rouge, La. It is widening and deepening rapidly.

Heavy snowstorms have prevailed over the counties of Berkshire, Lincolnshire and Herefordshire in England.

In Scotland there have been heavy snow on the highlands, and the weather has been cold as during the month of November.

Telegrams from Rio Janeiro, Brazil, state that the failure of several big companies have been announced, and that business is paralyzed.

New Orleans is to have a new court-house, to cost about \$50,000. The site is to contain not less than nine thousand square feet, in a central portion of the city, fronting on not less than three streets.

A special dispatch from Naples says that two large streams of lava that have been flowing down Mount Vesuvius for the last two days have united at the deposit from the eruption of 1891. The activity of the principal crater is normal.

The Ocean Steamship Company's vessels sailing from New York, Boston and Philadelphia will now cease to purchase supplies in those cities. With the sailing of the vessels from those ports Monday the last of the supplies to be bought for the company in the North were brought out, and hereafter all supplies will be purchased in Savannah. All repairs that can be made there on the company's vessels, will, when necessary, be done in Savannah.

Gen. Nelson A. Miles, United States Army, who arrived in England Wednesday by the American Line steamship St. Paul from New York on his way to the scene of the Greece-Turkish war, was asked whether the conclusion of peace, when brought about, would change his plans. The General said it would not, that he would start tonight for Constantinople and that he intends to see the Turkish army and the armies of Europe generally before returning to the United States.

Broker Chapman's Case.

WASHINGTON, May 12.—A rumor was circulated today that Broker Elverton R. Chapman, of New York, already convicted and sentenced to serve thirty days in jail for refusing to answer the questions of the Sugar Trust investigating committee, had been summoned to appear here immediately to receive his sentence.

The revival of the sugar scandal, which

attended the passage of the present law through the Senate, by the resolution of Senator Allen today is regarded as a very adroit effort to force Broker Chapman to give to the Senate the information he refused: the investigating committee or serve a term in jail.

The resolution and discussion which it caused will, it is believed, make it very difficult for the President to intervene in Mr. Chapman's behalf, and as the latter will probably not tell the Senate which of their number in 1894 used the information they possessed about the provisions of the sugar schedule to speculate in stocks, his imprisonment is considered likely.

It is stated tonight that Broker Chapman has telegraphed to his attorneys in this city to withdraw his application for pardon, as he will come at once to Washington to serve out his sentence. This action is said to be the result of the discussion in the Senate today.

The Tennessee Exposition.

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—In the presence of a large attendance there was unveiled in the Terminal Railroad building of the exposition a bust of President John W. Thomas, of Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis railroad. John C. Kimmey made a brief speech, and President Thomas, visibly affected, responded briefly. The statue is an excellent one and was presented by the officials of the road longest in its service. Railroad men from Atlanta, Chattanooga and all points on the line attended.

The Red Men and companies of the State and National Guard engaged in a sham battle on the military field, representing the Custer massacre. This feature of the Improved Order of Red Men's celebration drew a large attendance and was immensely enjoyed.

The presence in the city of the delegates to the State Medical Society's Convention and the annual meeting of the Knights of Pythias, as well as the Red Men's celebration, have increased the numbers of visitors greatly, and the first organization from another State, the Wolverine State Press Association, arrived, several hundred in all, to remain several days.

The exposition executive committee has invited the delegates to the World's Fair Congress to attend the exhibition and also the National Farmers' Press Association.
