Governor Still Pardons Criminals. Woman in the Church. Commencement Exercises. Weekly Crop Bulletin.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 18.

Bishop Cheshire has gone to New York to fill some appointments of Bishop Potter of that State. Bishop Potter has gone to England earlier than the other American bishops so as to fill several appointments before the meeting of the Lambeth Conference.

During the Brotherhood meeting one of the speakers, a Mr. Plummer, said that the women in the churches were mostly responsible for the creeping in of ritualistic tendencies. Upon what grounds he based his statement I do not know, but I think if the women in the church as a general rule, had any voice in the matter, the services would be simpler and more beautiful. It is generally the minister who brings in these innovations so as to try and draw a large audience, whether from curiosity or from the simple desire to worship God, and give us the privilege to vote and we will see where the blame lies.

Quite a number of persons from Raleigh have gone to Greensboro to attend the commencement exercises at the State Normal and Industrial school.

Governor Russell has pardoned two more criminals. He has been most severely criticised for his tendency to pardon, and especially for pardoning those who have been convicted of murder.

Last night the leading literary society of the city, "The Monday Evening Club," held its last meeting until autumn. The club was entertained at a dinner by W. A. Montgomery's. Officers for the year were elected as follows: President, Mr. W. S. Primrose; Vice-President, Miss Eliza Pool; Secretary, J. E. Asbury.

On Friday evening May 21st, at the A. M. College there will be a debate by the Pullen Literary Society, the subject being "Is Man Degenerating?"

State Treasurer Worth has sent out a circular letter to all dealers in pianos and organs in the State, stating that a tax of \$10 must be paid on each style of instrument sold.

Federal Court meets here next Monday, Judge Furell presiding.

Last night Mrs. J. S. C. Carpenter gave a delightful progressive euchre party to 40 ladies and gentlemen in the parlor of the Park Hotel. Delightful refreshments were served and it was after midnight before the guests departed. Tomorrow Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter leave to spend the summer in their Kentucky home.

St. Mary's Alumnae held a meeting on Saturday and elected the following officers: Mrs. Iredell, president, Miss Mary Jones of Asheville vice president, Mrs. F. C. Harris, secretary, Miss McKimmon, treasurer. The funds for the Albert Snodgrass scholarship. After that is ended they will endow the Sarah Snodgrass scholarship.

The State Association of Funeral Directors meets here on June 15-16, in their annual convention.

There were present at the railroad commission meeting today the following railroad and telephone officials, Messrs. A. B. Andrews, T. M. Emerson, J. W. Fry and W. E. Kyle; Shaw of Durham, Stearns and Bridges, Hogan of N. Y. and McClosse of Richmond.

Col. J. B. Carr has asked Treasurer Worth the amount of pensions carried by the "confiners" bill which the Lt. Gov. did not sign at the last legislature and was therefore no law. He was told this amount was \$5,007 covering 150 pensioners. It is understood to be Col. Carr's intention to pay this amount, of course it will be refunded by the next legislature. At the close of the session Col. J. B. Cunningham member from Person said he would be one of 10 gentlemen to pay that money.

The Weekly Crop Bulletin for the week ending Monday, May 17th, was very favorable for agricultural interests and the crop prospects have decidedly improved throughout the State. The drought was broken by warm and gentle rains on four days of the week averaging nearly 2.00 inches over the State, and was too heavy with a little hail at only a few places. The temperature was above the normal to the 15th after which it turned cooler and growth slightly checked. The season was especially favorable for transplanting tobacco which made good progress.

Extensive Dipping—A very nice week, quite favorable for growing crops which have improved materially. Warm first of the week with fine rains from 15th to 18th, but cooler 19th and 20th. Land now in good condition for cultivation. The turn has turned crops green and started them to growing. Corn looks better but the stand is rather poor, caused chiefly by damage of cut worms. It is now being plowed. Cotton replanting about done, it is coming up better and has planted has good stand. Chops

DIVORCE PROCEEDINGS

Instituted by Mrs. Glass Against Her Husband.

Public Sentiment Favors Her. Railway Commission Hear Telephone Cases. Bell Company Given Time.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 18.—Mrs. Glass today instituted suit for a divorce. She has a able counsel.

Public sentiment is powerfully in her favor. The railway commission heard all the telephone companies today on the rate reduction. The Bell company was given to June 1st to make a statement of its business. Private company rates are not to be lowered it appears.

GREEK-TURKISH WAR.

Is Over. Turkish General ordered to Cease Operations.

NEW YORK, May 18.—Turkey stops the war against Greece.

Edem Pasha has been ordered to stop hostilities against Greece.

GREEKS IN RETREAT.

Thirty-four Officers and a Thousand Men Lost in a Fight With the Turks.

ATHENS.—The Greeks have retreated to the frontier of Epirus after a heavy fight. About thirty-four officers and a thousand men were lost.

A panic prevails at Arta, on the Greek frontier, as Turkish invasion is feared.

Colonel Manos has been recalled, and Nicholas Smolenski, brother of General Smolenski, takes command.

A dispatch sent from Domokos by way of Lania, says: "Thirty-five thousand Turks, infantry, cavalry and artillery, have attacked the Greek line at several points of the left wing and the centre with a view of penetrating southward and surrounding Domokos. Large forces are also attacking General Smolenski."

A dispatch was received from Crown Prince Constantine, dated Domokos, saying that the Turks, numbering about 10,000 men, had appeared in sight, marching on Domokos, and that the attack would apparently be directed against the two wings, and especially the left wing of the Greek forces.

The most intense excitement prevailed here. All the cabinet ministers have been assembled since upon at the ministry of marine, where the dispatches from the front are being received. The gravity of the situation cannot be overestimated.

The Turkish attack on the Greek right wing began at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Two Greek cannons did great execution on the principal Turkish columns as they advanced through the hills. The Turkish infantry at several points came in contact with the Greeks.

It is believed that the attack on General Smolenski near Almyros is only a strategic operation and that the Turks will endeavor to cut between the two Greek armies, occupy the road leading to the Othry mountains, and thus cut off the retreat of the Crown Prince.

All the powers have agreed to protest against the invasion of Thessaly to Turkey and the abolition of the capitulations.

The representatives of the powers here held a long meeting Saturday and drew up a note which will be presented to the Turkish government as soon as one of the ambassadors receives the necessary instructions from his government. This note does not deal with the peace conditions, but merely repeats the request for an armistice and declares the powers will not permit Greece to be crushed.

Although it is assumed in some quarters that the Porte, in accordance with Eastern usage, has demanded more in order to obtain less, it is pointed out that if the Turkish government desired to bargain it would not have formulated its conditions officially.

The tone of the military officials here and elsewhere is most emphatically against abandoning Thessaly. They argue that if Europe has been unable to make Greece evacuate the Island of Crete, how will Europe be able to force Turkey out of Thessaly?

uneasy holders. It was said that the unexpected demands made by Turkey upon Greece caused the weakness in Liverpool. The market opened 5 points lower on summer deliveries and the offerings continued until August declined to 7-8 while the winter month remained comparatively steady. This divergence is partly accounted for by the fact that good many people were induced by the strong statistical position to buy the Summer and sell the Fall as a hedge. Today this operation was reversed. The closing prices show a net decline of 11 to 13 points on this crop and 4 to 6 points on next.

Now as the future, as we have before stated, the demand from spinners (the remaining stocks will be the most important factor in fixing prices of Summer positions. We must rely upon trade demand to sustain prices.
