WILL IT ALWAYS CONTINUE.

The closing of the Greco-Turkish war, and the indemnity demands of Turkey, makes this war between these two countries, one that is not simply a human contest, but one of gain and aggrandizement to the conqueror.

The fact that the wars of today are generally called "bondholders wars," and are to a great extent governed by those who hold claims in the shape of bonds guaranteed by the countries engaged in the war, destroys every patriotic sentiment that has been associated with the wars of history, and makes the war of today a contest of money, with human beings as instruments, who strive and give up their lives in the interest of those who know nothing about them, and have no concern as to their end.

Should the war indemnity demanded of Greece be paid, who will be the gainer, the people of Turkey, the families whose men were killed or wounded? Nothing will go to the relief of those who suffered, except indirectly, for with the huge indebtedness now hanging over Turkey, and the cost of the war with Greece, her creditors must first be satisfied, and the people will return to their occupations with nothing except wounds to show for their part in the war.

Will it always continue, this constant armament of European countries, with the latest and most modern weapons of warfare, all applied to an annual cost of millions of money, piling up a bonded indebtedness that can never be paid?

And how are the masses of the people placed while this constant war preparation is going on? Are they not being reduced each year to a greater servitude?

The fact that an occasional war may give one country a claim over another for a money indemnity, is not helping the masses who are compelled to labor to produce what must be given, annually, to make good the demands of the war budgets.

There is a serious day of reckoning coming, when the masses of the people of Europe will declare that they will no longer be subjected to this war tax, when the bondholders may find that the bonds which they own will be repudiated, and there will be no army to rise up and enforce their demands for payment.

If Turkey comes out of this war, fully and more than indemnified, must not the creditors of Greece make good the latter's losses?

Only temporarily, for the people of Greece must eventually pay the cost, and at what a sacrifice! No matter how just the cause, how patriotic the sentiment which in-

A Fortune in Coffee.

Thirty-five years ago a poor German lad named Carlos Schmidt emigrated to South America and settled not far from Santos in Brazil. It was not long before it occurred to him that coffee was in large demand all over the civilized world and that a very good article was being raised in Brazil. He decided to give his life to coffee-raising. Land was cheap, and in the course of years he enlarged the bounds of the few modest acres with which he began business, until today he owns what is said to be the second largest coffee plantation in the world. He has 1,800,000 coffee trees in bearing on 9783 acres of land, upon which he gives constant employment to 1500 laborers. His plantation, with all the improvements in the way of houses, stores, bakeries and so on, is said to be worth \$3,000,000. The few hundred dollars with which he started to make his fortune in the far-away land has been nurtured with splendid results. Still, this is the very land from which Canadians have recently been assisted to return, as they could not make a living there. The truth is that they went to Brazil without knowing the conditions before them or how to meet them, and they failed, of course. When men cannot get along well in a new country it is not always the fault of the country—New York Sun.
