**Governor Russell and Party
Leave for Tennessee.**

Telephone and Telegraph Charter
Granted. Republican State Or-
gan Advises Against Endors-
ing Governor Russell. Big
Brewery at Greensboro.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 29.
Governor Russell and party leave for the Tennessee Centennial Exposition on a special car on the Seaboard Air-Line tomorrow afternoon. Some changes have been made in the personnel of the party. It will be as follows: Gov. and Mrs. Russell; Mrs. W. H. Chadbourne and Miss Kate Johnson of Wilmington; Miss Briggs of Wilson; Misses Laek and Rollins of Asheville; State treasurer and Mrs. W. H. Worth; Capt W. H. Day, private secretary; J. E. Alexander, H. S. Leard; adjutant general Cowles; Cols. Royster, Harrell, Cook, Leybrook and Holt; Majors Hayes, U. S. A., Macon and Brown.
The 4th story of the Baptist State Female University building here is nearly completed, the executive committee is well pleased with the progress of the work.

The State grants a charter to the Tarboro Telephone and Telegraph Company, the incorporators being George A. Holderness, J. Y. Melegan, W. N. Smith, Julie Cobb, J. N. B. Battle, A. M. Fairly and W. H. Powell, Jr.
Fine rains fell today and are needed. The next crop report will no doubt be more favorable than that of last week.
June 7th has been designated as "Baird's Day" at the Tennessee Exposition.
The newly elected State board of public school examiners met today. Present L. L. Hobbs of Guilford college, W. L. Pate of Wake Forest college and M. C. S. Noble of Wilmington.
The council of State which by an act of the last legislature was made the public printing board, met today to specially consider the matter of the printing.
The reports show that so far this year there is very little log cholera in this State.

The Lonsburg dispensary does not go into effect until July 1st.
The Republican State organ calls on the party not endorse any of Governor Russell's acts, but to wait until the party holds its State convention in 1898 and see whether he is to be endorsed or not.
At the Agricultural and Mechanical college here last evening the League literary society had its annual declamation for prizes. M. W. Danforth won the medal. F. M. Foy was the prize essayist. In the debate on the question whether the wide use of machinery injures the working classes, there was a tie between D. O. Uzell and A. E. Cohn and they drew to decide it, Uzell winning. Judge Montgomery made an address in presenting prizes and took occasion to score hard holders, who he asserted were not bearing their part of the public burdens the real burden being borne by people of moderate means and the workers.
A saw fish 12 feet long from Cape Lookout near Beaufort is the latest arrival at the State Museum. It, as well as a score of other fine specimens, was caught in the big seine of J. H. Potter & Sons.
Greensboro's brewery, which the State granted a charter this week, will have \$150,000 capital and will make 50,000 barrels a year. There are only two breweries in the State.

The Aurora fire insurance company of Philadelphia is doing business in this State without license. It is the fifth company thus detected in the last 60 days.

President Hancock of the A. & N. C. E. R. was here yesterday and today. An effort is being made to secure a \$3.00 round trip rate from Raleigh to Morehead City. A \$2.00 rate has been arranged from Goldsboro to Morehead City.

Latest News Items.
Special dispatches from places in New York State, state that a severe earthquake shock was felt there. The inhabitants were greatly frightened and rushed out of their homes in their nightclothes. Houses were shaken, windows and dishes were broken and lamps overturned. In some places heavy doors were shaken from their hinges.
The winter in Chili promises to be very severe. The snow has already stopped all traffic between Chile and Argentina.
The will of Wm. Lamson, the Leroy banker, who left nearly a million dollars to Yale University, will be contested by Mrs. Laura Ann Brooks, of St. Paul, Minn., his aged aunt.
John E. Richmond, the Parnellite leader, was suspended in the House of Commons, owing to his persisting in an irregular discussion of the financial relations between Great Britain and Ireland.

Right Rev. John Brockenborough, New-York, bishop and auditor of the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia, died at his residence, 717 East Grace street Richmond. He was stricken with heart failure during the night when, realizing the serious nature of his trouble, he roused his wife, and she to turn called the other members of his family in the house to his bedside.

THE SUGAR SCANDAL.

Senator Tillman Demands a Full and Thorough Investigation. (Makes Some Sensational Charges.)

WASHINGTON, May 28.—After a long period of silence, Senator Tillman, of South Carolina, startled the Senate today by a speech no less dramatic in its delivery than sensational in its allegations. He proceeded to give a presentation of a resolution for the appointment of a special committee of five Senators to investigate charges of speculation by Senators while the tariff bill was before the Finance Committee. In advocating the resolution, Mr. Tillman threw aside the usual conventionalities of the Senate, and with a plainness of speech seldom heard about the halls of Congress called on his associates to investigate the published charges of senatorial speculation, and, if found true, purge the Senate of those who had debauched it.
The Senator had published articles read from the desk stating that Senators had recently made large sums of money in speculation in sugar stock, and in one instance the name of a Senator was mentioned. Mr. Tillman spoke for nearly an hour, every line of his speech being punctuated with intense investigation.
Mr. Tillman asked consent to make a statement on the resolution, and this being granted, began a speech which proved to be one of the most sensational the Senate has heard in recent years.
"We have arrived at a time," he declared, "when the Senate can no longer afford to rest under the damning accusations made against Senators. If there are men here debauching the Senate then we should be purged of them. If these reports are shandlers then the press galleries should be purged. We cannot afford to lay back on our dignity any longer and say we will not investigate."
Both parties were free to face with this scandal, he said. The former sugar investigation sought to learn whether members of the finance committee, then Democrats, were "bought and sold like cattle." That investigation involved the President, the Secretary of the Treasury and the finance committee. Now, he added, we have the same question, but the parties are changed and nothing but cowardice would prevent Senators from energetic action to protect our good name.

FRENCH BIMETALLISTS.
Their Cause Declared to be 'Honesty, France and America May Unite.'
PARIS, May 28.—There were 400 delegates present today at the annual meeting of the National Bi-Metallic League. Deputy Fongolord presided. M. Thery, secretary of the league, read the report. It set forth that the leading event of the year was the election of President McKinley, which gave great satisfaction to bi-metallics. He dwelt upon the necessity of bringing the movement to a definite issue before the expiration of President McKinley's term of office. The French government had done excellent work, which the international negotiations would reveal. It had persevered in seeking the co-operation of Great Britain because the latter's participation would disarm the worst opponents and give international bi-metallicism a permanent and solid basis.
The report added: "The English horizon is less dark than asserted. The presence of the American delegates in Paris may greatly hasten a solution of the question. France and America could easily come to an agreement if England was inclined to a serious effort in favor of silver, and Germany would follow her example. It is upon this that the question of international bi-metallicism therefore, depends for its practical solution."

New York, May 28, p. m.
The Liverpool stock is 1,125,000 bales, of which 979,000 is American, against 1,080,000 bales a year ago, of which 917,000 bales were American. The Houston "Press" says editorially: "Cotton is backward, reports of squares and blooms are coming in daily while a few places mention the formation of bolls. The large acreage in cotton in South and Southwest Texas indicates a good August movement, which means that by the middle of July the cotton pickers will be at work." A good many people who bought cotton from 71 to 73 on the theory of much higher prices, while we were advocating a decline, are now hanging on with margins narrowing each day and some of them holding large and small lots are being compelled by changing sentiment to unload. We think cotton a better value for \$150 or \$200 profit per contract than at any time since we began talking bullish about it.

CRISIS IN ATHENS.
King George is Reported to be Practically Imprisoned in His Palace, Preparing to Leave Greece.

London, Last Friday the embassies received word from their respective ministers at Athens that the position of the Greek royal family is now critical. King George is practically imprisoned in the palace, and it is reported that he is making his preparations to leave Athens in order to evade the fury of the populace. The relations between the King and M. Fallis, the premier, are very much strained, and the general situation is extremely precarious.
Elaborate measures have been taken to keep order at Athens. The police and gendarmes consist of 15,000 men, rolled from among the most trusted individuals.
The minister of the interior, M. Theodoraki, is reported to deal severely with any insubordinate movements.
The fact that the war-ships of the fleet are ready to land troops and artillery in the event of disorder occurring, has deterred the revolutionists from making a demonstration.
