VERY INAPPROPRIATE.

Governor Russell's Speech at St. Mary's Commencement.

Charge Against Marshal Carroll Not Made Public. Judge Purnell at Asheville. Changes in A. & M. Faculty Probable. Conflict in New School Law.

JOURNAL BUREAU, RALEIGH, N. C., June 10.

Today about finishes up the various commencement exercises. The papers make a great howl about the fact that they are always glad when they are over and yet some papers should be glad for them to be in progress for they otherwise would be minus much matter.

At the Agricultural and Mechanical College yesterday, Gov. Russell delivered the Diplomas and made an address to the graduating class. For inappropriateness, it surpassed any speech many of us had ever heard. He criticized the cost of the school and told the young men their education "came high." He forgot to tell his audience that the government bore a large part of the expense, but spoke as if the State of North Carolina had this "heavy burden" alone.

Mr. A. R. C. Bryan agent of the Southern Express Co. here is very ill.

The Capital club gave its last german of the season last night to the University students. Tomorrow night the Euphrosyne club give their last german.

The charges against U. S. Marshal Carroll are said to be graver than was first thought, but his friends say he will come out clear. These charges do not seem to be given to the public. His term does not expire until February.

Hot weather has suddenly come upon us, and today is a genuine hot June day.

At St. Mary's there were five graduates today each reading good essays on their different subjects. The exercises were particularly good. The address to the graduates was by Rev. Dr. M. M. Marshall.

The sheriff's convention will be held in Morehead August 1st, every one concerned in the listing and taking of taxes will be invited to attend.

Judge Purnell left for Asheville today to hold U. S. Circuit Court for Judge S. M. Norton.

Arrangements are on foot here for the publication of a new North Carolina commercial guide and business index.

State Auditor Ayer is in Winston to see the Stewart Bros. Public Printers. Their successors will have to be appointed by the end of June.

The board of trustees of the A. & M. College are still in session. Some of the members were caucusing with Governor Russell until late last night. It is generally believed there will be many changes in the faculty for the next session.

There is a conflict in the new school law which provides for the August election on the question of local aid to public schools. One section says the judges of election shall be appointed by the county commissioners; another section says that the register of deeds, clerk of court and chairman of county commissioners shall appoint them.

CHINAMEN DROWNED.

Five Hundred Fishermen Perish in a Great Storm

VICTORIA, B. C.—Mongre particulars were brought by the steamer Empress of Japan of a disaster which befell the fishermen of Chusan Archipelago, off the coast of China. On May 6th when all, or at least, of the fishing boats were out on the fishing banks, a terrible sea sprang up. Of the several hundred boats out at the time, very few returned, and it is estimated that some five hundred men lost their lives.

The storm was one of those sudden ones for which the coast of China is noted and the fishermen had no chance to seek shelter. Their life-boats were smashed to atoms, and they were left to fight a hopeless battle with the merciless waves. The storm swept over the entire archipelago, which extends across the mouth of Hangchow Bay, on the Eastern coast of China. Several large junks were lost, in which scores perished.

Latest News Items.

Socialists peasant riots have taken place in the communes of Hungary. The gendarmes at both places were obliged to fire upon the rioters. Two peasants were killed and forty were severely wounded. Twenty-one agitators were arrested.

It is believed in Havana now that the long-suppressed news of affairs in Madrid has been made public, that General Weyler's return to Spain will be the most important result of Canova's success in retaining power.

A syndicate of London capitalists are negotiating for the purchase of the Rapahannock Gold Mine in Stafford county, Va.

J. M. Culp, traffic manager of the Southern Railroad, was robbed of a \$500 diamond stud on a Baltimore and Ohio Southwestern passenger train, near Rollburg, W. Va. The gem weighs about three carats.

SUGAR DROPS.

The Decline is Caused by Profit Taking.

Cotton Declines on the Government Crop Report Which Shows Conditions Favorable. Wheat was Firm Higher Foreign Cables.

CORROS.

NEW YORK, June 10.—The feeling in cotton market was somewhat divided at the opening this morning, and the general inclination was to wait until after the Government report was issued. During the early hours there were some few contracts covered, which caused a slight advance for both the summer and fall months. When the bureau report came out at eleven o'clock it was considered bullish, and caused considerable liquidation which was followed by a decline of 9 to 10 points from the highest with a slight reaction at the close.

New York, June 10th.—The department of agriculture in its crop report for June says consolidation returns show State percentages of acreage as compared with last year to be as follows: Virginia 106, North Carolina 106, South Carolina 103, Georgia 102, Florida 95, Alabama 102, Mississippi 98, Louisiana 100, Texas 106, Arkansas 105, Tennessee 106, Missouri 107, Indian Territory 134, Oklahoma 150. General average 108.5. Total acreage 24,091,394 as compared with 23,271,504 last year. The average condition is Virginia 87, North Carolina 84, South Carolina 87, Georgia 84, Florida 80, Alabama 81, Mississippi 76, Louisiana 84, Texas 87, Arkansas 83, Tennessee 77, Missouri 90, Indian Territory 83, Oklahoma 72. General average 83.5 against 97.2. June condition last year crop is from one to three weeks late weather being cold and damp, stand irregular and poor in many localities.

STOCKS.

The stock market was irregular at the opening this morning. The actions of the Senate in over reaching the committee's sugar schedule was a signal for higher prices in that stock, but those who have been holding for good profits were quickly satisfied, and on profit taking alone a decline of 2 per cent was scored with a gain of 1 near the close. Jersey central advance 2 1/2 per cent to 80 on liberal buying which was generally accredited to the insiders, inasmuch as the remainder of the anthracite coalers failed to show sufficient sympathy. The Grangers continue firm but fail to score any material gains. The stock market has had an uninterrupted rise for nearly a month, therefore we would not be surprised to see a slight reaction throughout the entire list, before financial agitation is over.

CHICAGO MARKETS.

CHICAGO, June 10.—Higher foreign cables were encouraging this morning, which accompanied by a better cash demand, caused some covering in the wheat market today, which was followed by a net gain of 1 1/8 cents from the opening to the highest, with a reaction of 1/2 cent at the close. The strength was equally divided between the early and late months. We look for a bearish bureau report this afternoon, and believe much lower prices will follow. Corn was firm on moderate buying for strong accounts. Provisions noted narrow and featureless.

Offered to Ex-Governor J. B. Cox, of Ohio. Additional Tax on Beer and Tea to be Withdrawn.

WASHINGTON, June 9.—It was learned today that the President has offered the post of minister to Spain to ex-Governor Jacob D. Cox, of Ohio. Whether or not he will accept is not known. General Cox is an old personal friend of the President and one in whom Mr. McKinley has a great deal of confidence. Although almost seventy years of age, General Cox is still a man of vigor and energy.
