**WRECKED BY WIND.**  
Southern Pines Swept and Buildings Wrecked.

Trustees Appointed for Blind Institution. Washington County Commissioners Indicted. School Election Laws of 1897.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, N. C., June 12.—A heavy wind storm swept through Southern Pines late this afternoon, wrecking several buildings and damaging some others. George Tonnoffski and R. C. Rivers, both of Raleigh are appointed trustees of the Blind Institution.

Superintendent of Public Instruction directs the indictment of the commissioners of Washington county for refusing to give notice of the August school election.

Upon examination it is found that both the school election laws appear in the Acts of 1897.

They are Acts to stimulate taxation in rural districts and to encourage local taxation.

**SOON TO BE LAW.**  
The Chances for Tariff Bill are Early in July.

The President will Take His Time on the Question of Cuba. Senators Each for His Own State. Jones Says No Monetary Commission.

JOURNAL BUREAU, WASHINGTON, D. C., June 12.

The outlook for the speedy passage of the tariff bill daily grows brighter, and well-informed Senators are now predicting that it will become a law by the 10th of July. This week the Republicans formally bound themselves in caucus to vote as a unit, which they have been doing under an informal agreement, upon all schedules of the bill, and as they are getting votes right along from both Populists and Democrats it looks like plain sailing for the rest of the schedules and for the completed bill. Talk with Senators and Representatives indicates that much less time will be required to agree on the amendments in conference than had been generally allotted to that portion of the work.

It is evident that President McKinley has no idea of hurrying himself in announcing any change of policy towards Cuba. He received the report of Consul General Lee, and that of Mr. Callahan, on the Ruiz investigation, before he left for the Nashville exposition, but the only announcement officially made before his departure was that ex-Gov. Jacob D. Cox, of Ohio, had been asked to go to Spain as U. S. Minister and that he had the request under advisement. It is generally understood among the friends of the administration that the first move in the new Cuban policy will be made by our new minister to Spain. As it will be a month or more before a minister can be nominated, confirmed, and get to Spain, it is just as well for the Cuban enthusiasts to cultivate patience.

Senator Allen told the Democratic Senators after six of them had voted for a duty on cotton that they had apparently abandoned their party tenets and adopted the plan of every man for himself and the devil take the hindmost, and Senator Clifton answered by reminding him that a Populist Senator—Jones, of Nevada—was acting with the Republican members of the Finance committee. Then Senator Stewart remarked that he endorsed the action of his colleague on the tariff, and that they both intended to secure for their State the same benefits that were to be given to other sections.

Senator Jones, of Ark., whose position as chairman of the Democratic National committee and leader of the party in the Senate give his words weight, says of the rumor that President McKinley will ask Congress to authorize the appointment of a currency commission as soon as the tariff bill is out of the way: "There will be no monetary commission authorized at this session of Congress. That can be set down for a fact. No matter whether we remain in session until next December, there will be no legislation of that sort at this session."

**FULL OF ERRORS.**  
School Election Law Omitted from the Printed Acts.

Mistake in Section Regarding Fishermen. Congressman Skinner's way. Tribune Plant to be Sold Tomorrow. The Agricultural College in Politics.

JOURNAL BUREAU, RALEIGH, N. C., June 12. It is now stated that the "school election" law, enacted by the late legislature is not in the printed volume of the acts of 1897. This news will cause a genuine sensation.

Another bad error in the acts of 1897 was today discovered by the Secretary of State. The act in regard to fishermen from other States imposed a license tax of \$2,500 on those who caught fish with seines for market. The act as passed was "non-residents." As engrossed, as ratified and as printed it reads "now residents." Of course the whole business is in-operative.

Charles H. Turner of Statesville is commissioned 2d lieutenant of Co. A, 4th, regiment, N. C. State Guard.

It is learned from Representative Cox, of Pitt (Rep.) that as yet not a single official commission has been issued to any one in Pitt; that the reason is that Congressman Skinner proposes to use all these positions to secure endorsements of his course this year as to Senator Pritchard. The program is that Skinner is to move along on Republican lines this year and next year.

The Daily Tribune plant here will be sold as a whole next Monday. The lawyer who represents most of the creditors insisted on the course. So the sheriff will thus make the sale. W. W. Hayward, the editor, counts on buying the plant.

It is the rumor that Judge Parnell will make changes two or three of the U. S. Court clerks in this district.

Republican State chairman will go in August 1st as attorney for the western district, to succeed R. B. Glenn, resigned.

E. V. Cox has resigned as a trustee of the Agricultural and Mechanical college. In an interview today he said it was because of the violation of the interest and purpose of the Legislature to keep the college out of politics. He says the outgoing part of the faculty is merely the entering wedge to the ousting of all. The purpose is to change all save Holladay. When Cox got here Tuesday he found the Governor wanted to oust the president and put in John Graham of Ridge-way. Cox said he would not throw the college into politics and so told the Governor, J. R. Chamberlain was the moving spirit in the changes, and Cox says he was animated by malice.

**STOCKS ACTIVE.**  
Jersey Central Advances One and a Half on Covering.

Wheat Rules Higher on Prospect of Further Eastern Trouble and on Manipulation of July Option. Cotton is Dull and Featureless.

**COTTON.**  
NEW YORK, June 12.—The half days session on the Cotton Exchange today was the dulllest that has been experienced for months. Liverpool spot business was reported very dull, with a decline of 1-16 and futures opened at a decline of one point, but gained one to one and one-half points during the day. Our market opened dull and irregular, the fall months were unchanged, while the summer months were about three points under yesterday's close. The market was exceedingly narrow throughout the half session and the close shows a gain of only three points which covered the extreme fluctuations for the day.

The conditions in this market are unchanged for the week with the exceptions of a slight rally which was caused by the recent cool nights throughout the Southeastern belt but this was soon overcome by good reports and the closing prices this afternoon are practically unchanged from a week ago. The statistical position of cotton is gradually losing its influence over prices and speculative attention is being confined to the growing crop, which bids fair to be the largest for years, notwithstanding the fact that the crop is at least three weeks late. We believe August cotton will reach seven next week.

**STOCKS.**  
New York, June 12.—There was considerable business done in stocks during the two hours session to-day. London opened about on a parity with our close yesterday, and only a small amount of business was received from that source during the day. Sugar was firm during the first hour and advanced about 1 point from the opening. This was followed by further realising, which caused a sharp decline of 1 1/2 points near the close. This stock had an uninterrupted rise of over ten per cent during the past week, caused entirely by the actions of the Senate in reference to the sugar schedule in the

tariff bill. Although this stock is of the "go as you please" kind yet we feel sure the present advance will not hold, and think it should be sold on all bulges. Jersey Central was unusually strong advancing 1 1/2 per cent for the day, closing at the highest, on further liquidation of the enormous short interest that has been held for sometime. The Grangers continue to show good earnings, and should be purchased on all reactions for good profits.

**CHICAGO MARKETS.**  
CHICAGO, June 12.—Early wheat cables were practically unchanged from our close yesterday, and our market fractionally lower, but quickly rallied and the entire session was one of strength, and the close this afternoon shows a net gain of 1/2 cent for the day. At the opening this morning the crowd became bullish on the possibility of further Eastern trouble and the shorts were inclined to cover in preference to carrying over Sunday. Crop reports for the week are all that could be wished for, and the unnatural strength, especially in the July option, is simply the outcome of manipulation. We reiterate our advice of last Saturday to sell the later months on all bulges. Corn was low on crop prospects which are unusually favorable for this season of the year.

Provisions were fractionally higher today on moderate buying by both the Western packers and English houses. We believe some money can be made on the long side of this market during the next few months and would advise our friends to buy on all breaks.
